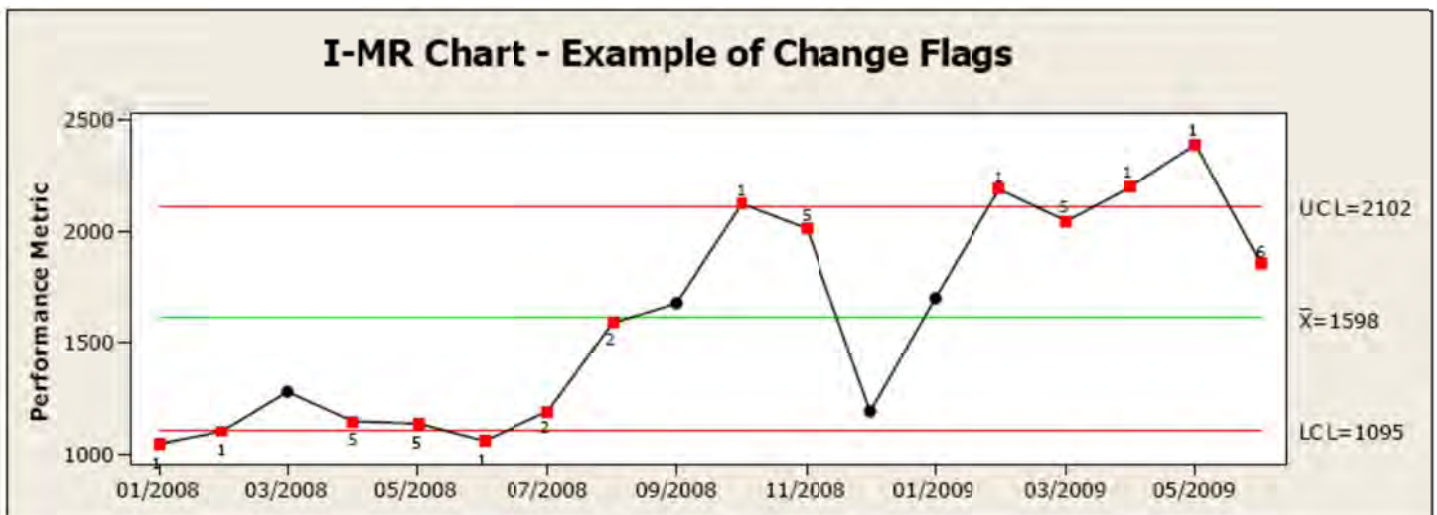
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# AIM Statistical Analysis for August 2010

Every month, the performance metrics for the various units of SPD will be analyzed to determine if there has been any statistical change in performance. This analysis will be conducted using software<sup>1</sup>; if a unit's metrics show no change, it will simply be noted there was no change. However, if a change was noted, the graph will be attached along with a brief description of the metric in question. If a reason for the change is known, it will be noted. If the reason for change is unknown, further follow-up will be needed; results of that follow-up will be published the following month.

## Analysis Interpretation

The statistical software uses graphs to indicate when a statistical change has occurred. It flags that change with a red box and a corresponding number. Please use the following graph as reference for a translation of the various numbers and what they mean.



The green line indicates the average over the time frame displayed for the data set being measured. The two red lines represent three standard deviations both below and above the average. It is normal to have fluctuation over time; in general, a single data point within three standard deviations would be considered normal change (unless otherwise indicated).

Please reference the following for an explanation of what the different numbered flags represent:

1. One data point over three standard deviations from the average;
2. Seven data points in a row on one side of average (over or under);
3. Six data points in a row, either increasing or decreasing;
4. Fourteen data points, alternating up and down;
5. Two out of three data points in a row are above/below two standard deviations from average;
6. Four out of five data points in a row are above/below one standard deviation from average;
7. Fifteen data points in a row within one standard deviation from average;
8. Eight data points in a row above/below one standard deviation from average.

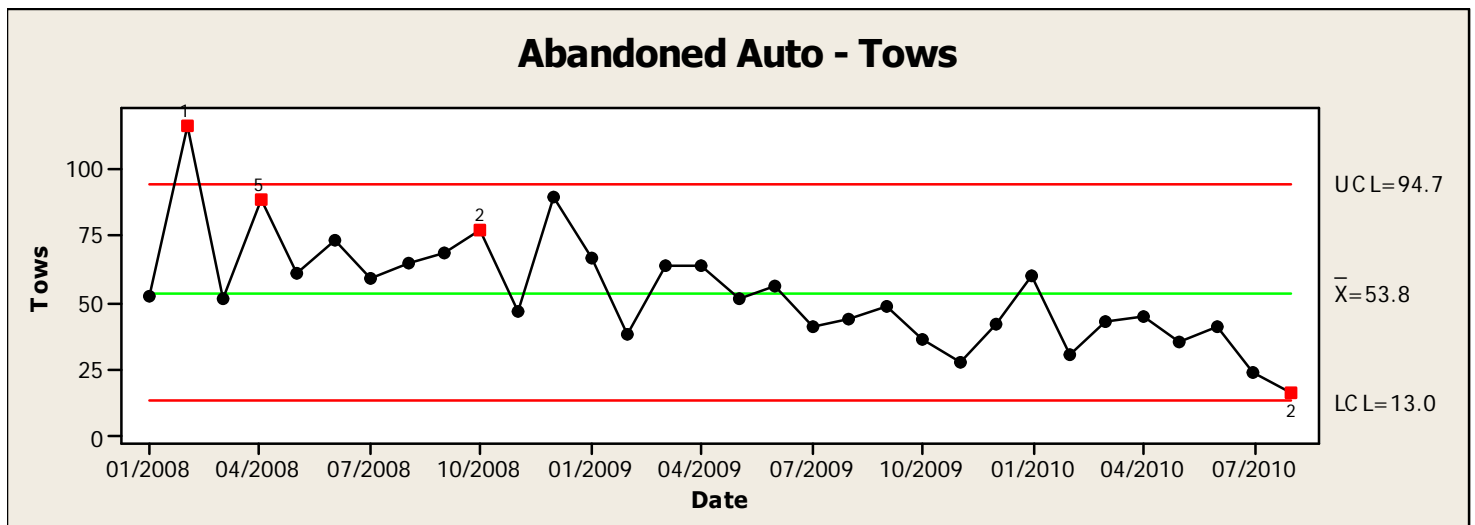

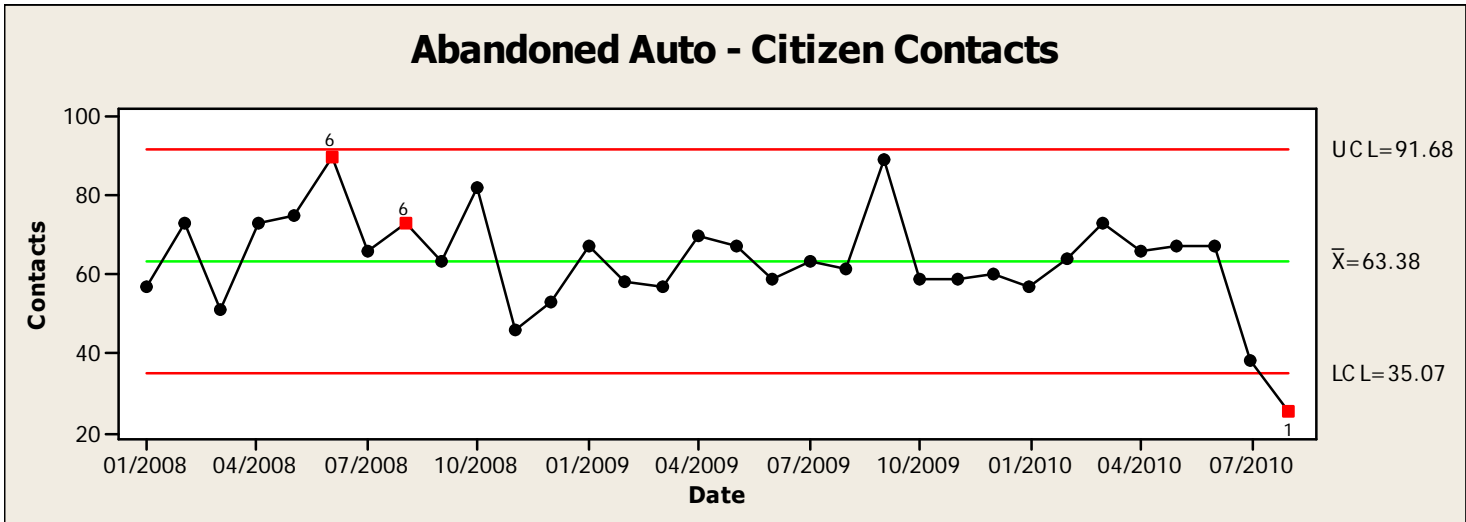
## **Abandoned Auto**

There were two performance metrics with statistical anomalies for this unit: *Tows* and *Citizen Contacts*. For *Tows*, the February-August 2010 data is all below average. Though the two most recent months were impacted by absence in the unit, there does appear to be a gradual decline in the number of tows over the last three years. Further explanation is necessary.



For *Citizen Contacts* (please see graph on following page) the August 2010 data is more than three standard deviations below average. This can be explained by a long-term absence due to injury in this unit. There are only two people in the unit, so this absence decreases work production by half. No further explanation is necessary.

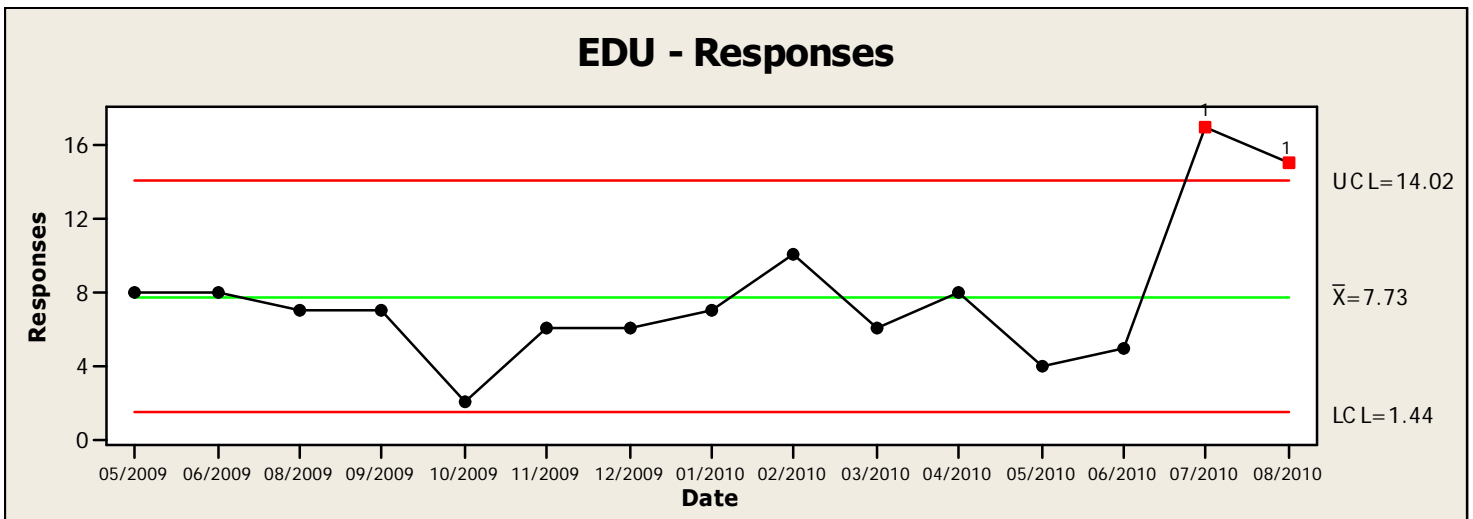

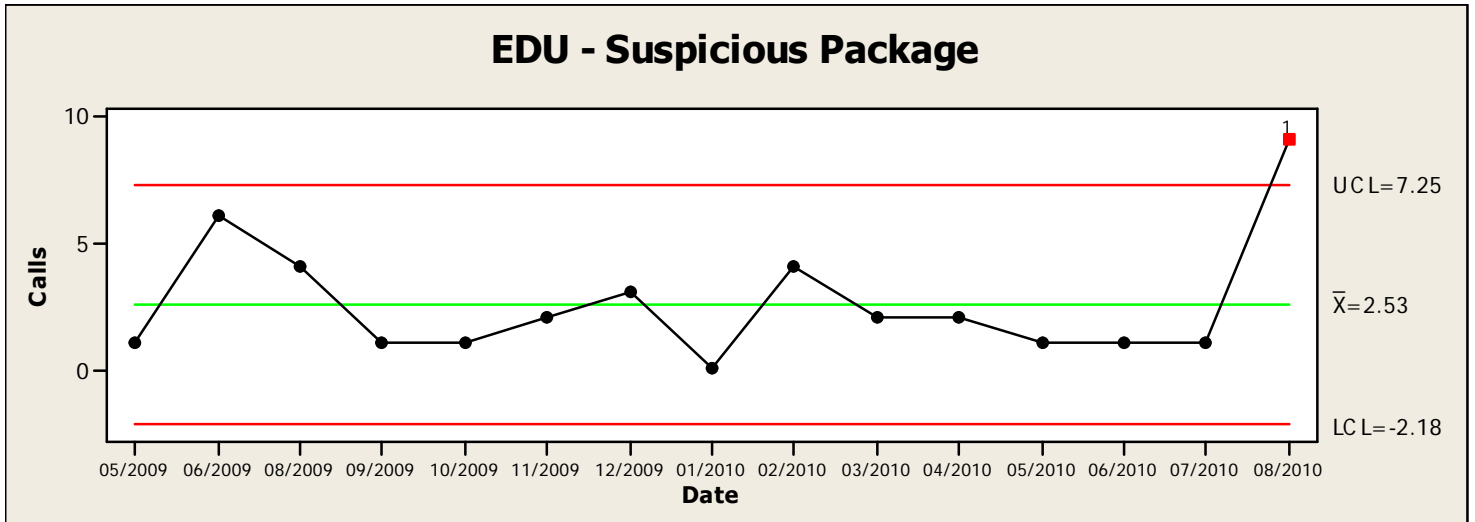
No change in performance metrics; data was not available for Extra Duty and will be analyzed when the data is submitted. No follow-up from prior month.

## Explosive Disposal Unit

There were two performance metrics for EDU with statistical anomalies: *Responses* and *Suspicious Package* (please see graph on following page). As these two are related, they will be discussed together. *Responses* was more than three standard deviations above average for August; part of this can be explained by the increase in calls regarding suspicious packages. *Suspicious Package* was also more than three standard deviations above average for August. EDU will be investigating this increase, but it is believed this increase is in response to the above average number of IEDs discovered in July 2010. As media reports these IEDs, it is typical for citizens to call in more suspicious packages as they are more aware of the potential threat. This metric will be monitored, but at this time, further explanation is not necessary.

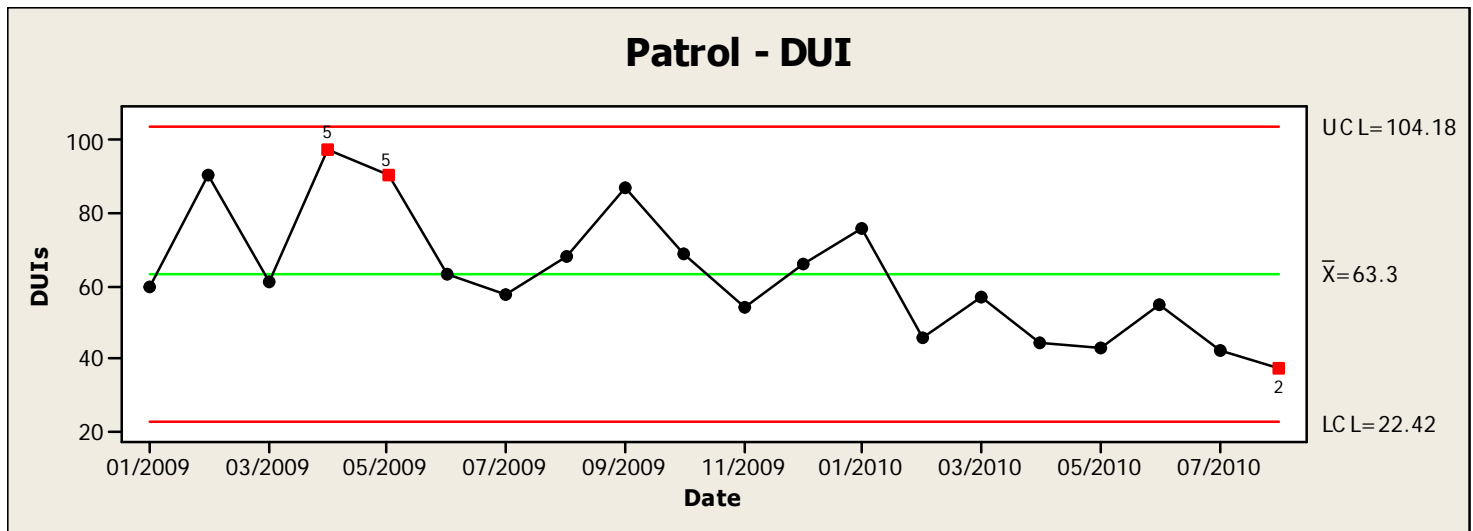

## Patrol

The *Self-Initiated Calls* and *Traffic Non-Hazardous Infractions* continue to be well below average (as discussed in prior AIM reports). A related performance metric with a statistical change is *DUI*. This metric has been below average since February 2010. Since DUIs are most often self-initiated activity, this gradual decrease is most likely due to the increase in 911 calls and staffing limitations, decreasing self-initiated activity. Further explanation is not necessary.

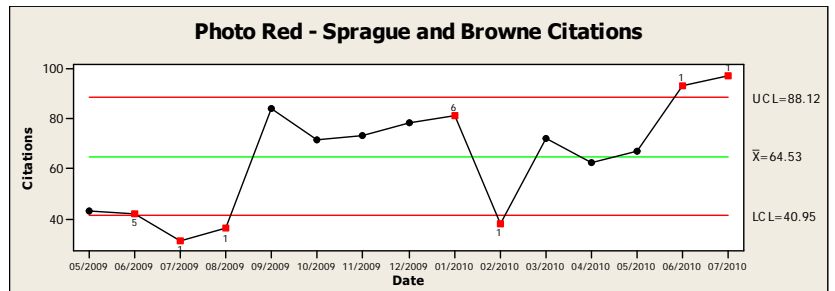

## Photo Red/Intersection Safety Program

No change in performance metrics.

Follow-up from last month on *Sprague and Browne Citations* (see graph to the right) revealed no known reason for the apparent increase. However, it was felt that the data has been relatively consistent since September 2009, with the exception of February 2010 (which was a low month for all the red light cameras). With that observation,

analysis was conducted excluding the May-August 2009 data. Once this data was excluded, the remaining data except February 2010 all fell within normal range.



It is believed the reason the May-August 2009 was abnormally low was due to construction on Browne between Spokane Falls Blvd and Main during those months which created a bottleneck. This congestion slowed down drivers and most likely altered their behavior from trying to beat the red light. At this time, further explanation is not needed.

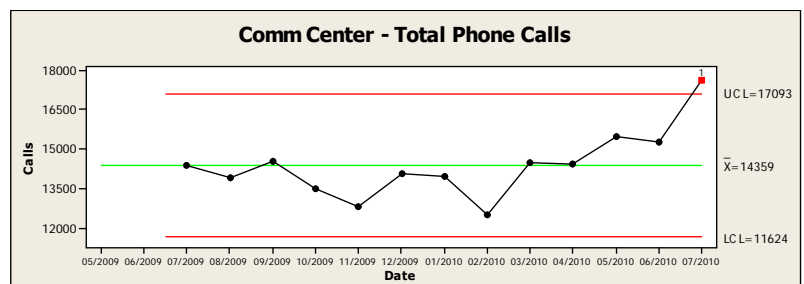

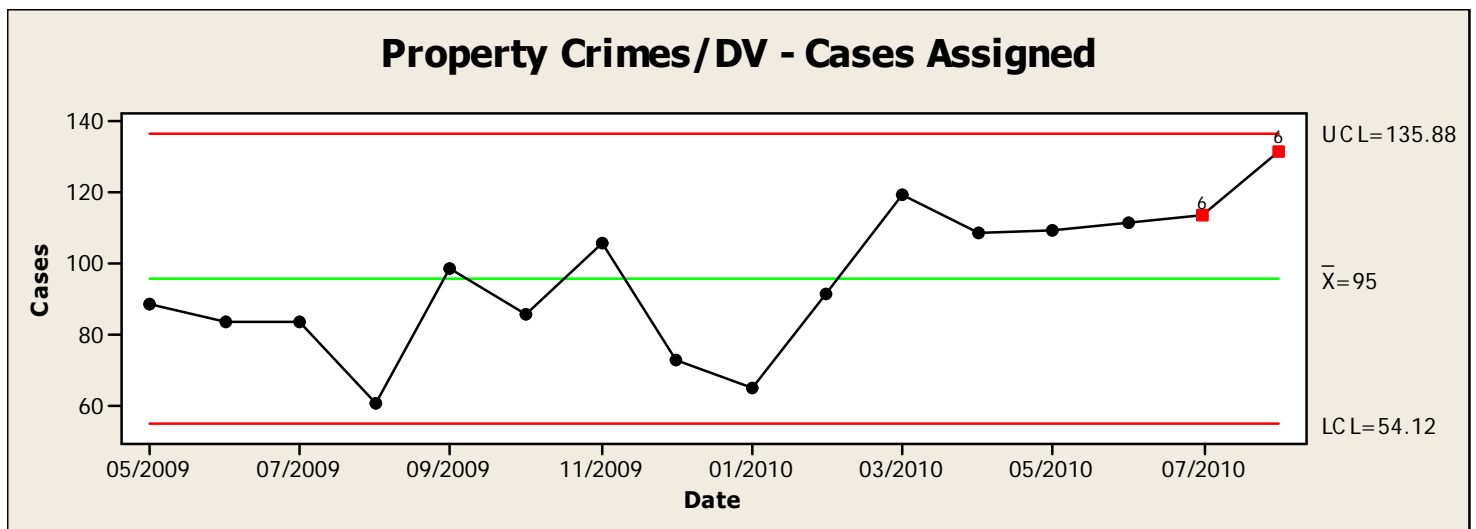

## Property Crimes and DV

The *Cases Assigned* metric shows anomalies for both July and August 2010 (both data sets were analyzed at same time since July data was submitted late). Both months indicate the March through August 2010 data is at least one standard deviation above average. This unit gained two new detectives in January 2010, though they were temporarily assigned to Patrol until summer of 2010. This increase in resources allowed additional cases to be assigned. No further explanation is necessary.

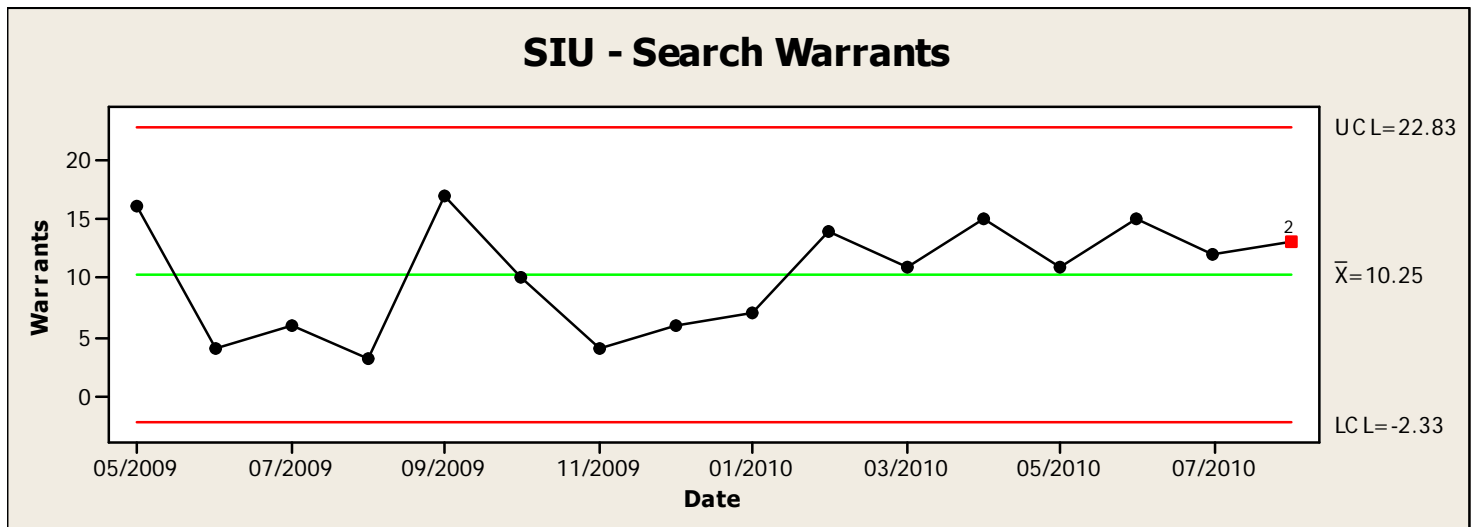
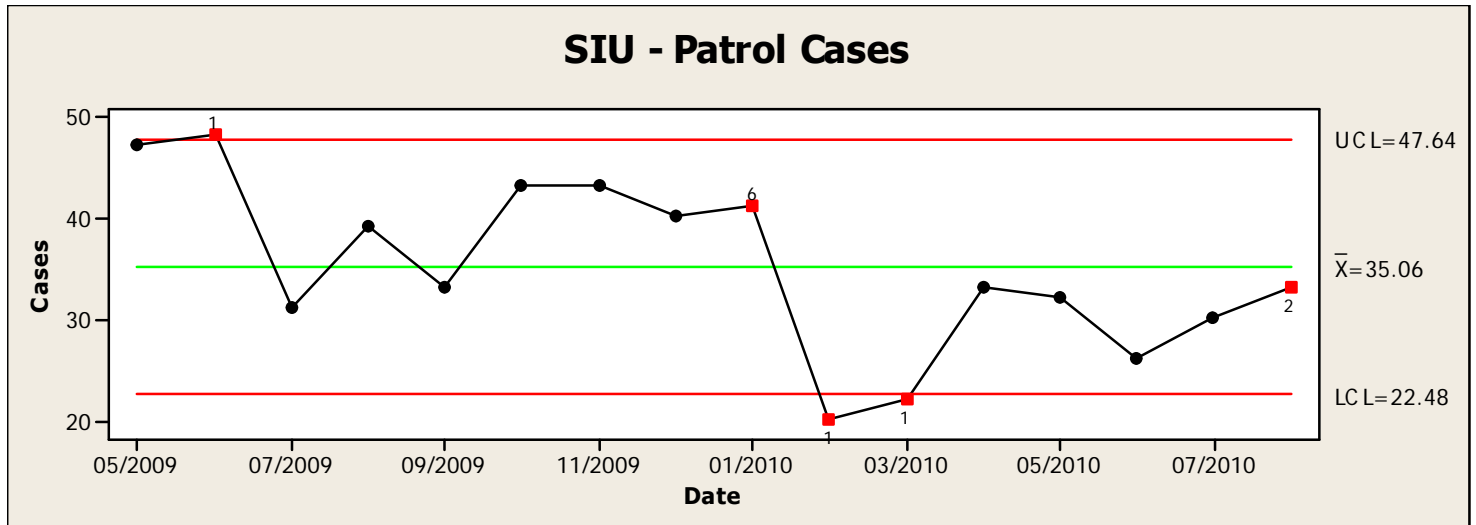

## Special Investigations Unit

There were two performance metrics for this unit that had statistical anomalies for August: *Patrol Cases* and *Search Warrants* (please see graphs on following page). These two metrics both show the February through August 2010 data is below average for *Patrol Cases* and above average for *Search Warrants*. This change is most likely due to a court ruling that limited the ability to search incident to arrest. As such, the number of *Patrol Cases* did drop slightly, while the need for *Search Warrants* increased. No further explanation is necessary.

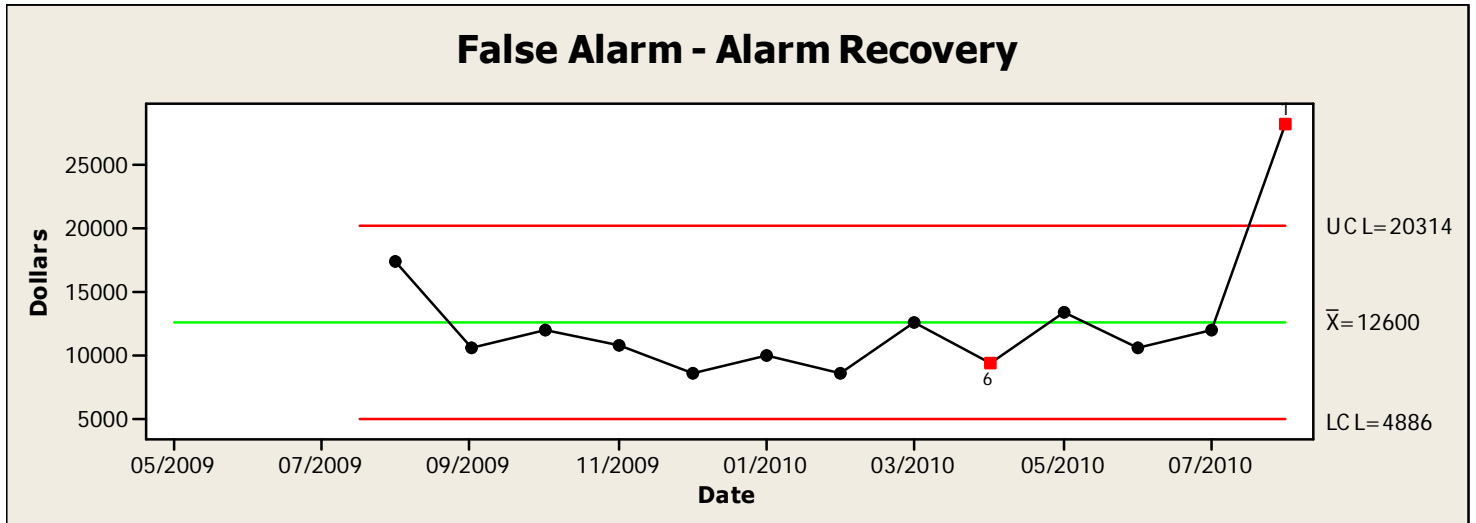
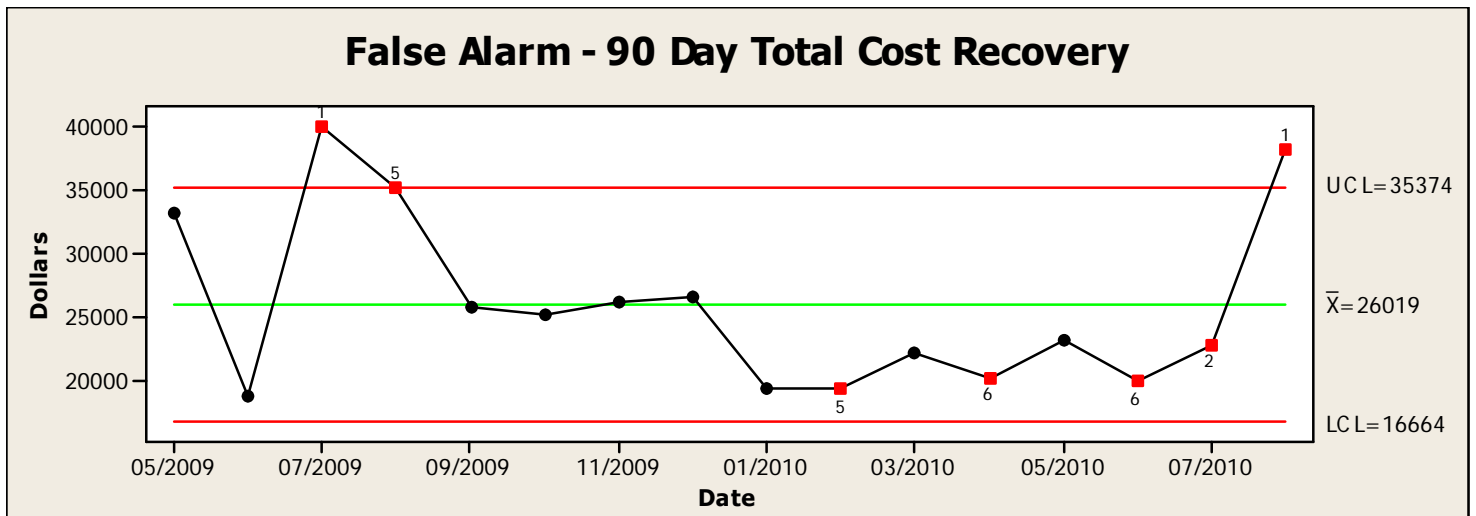

## False Alarm

The *90 Day Total Cost Recovery* and *Alarm Recovery* performance metrics for False Alarm show the August 2010 data for both is more than three standard deviations above average. This can be explained by a rather dramatic increase in first time false alarms over the last 90 days. There was an increase in new alarm systems sold door-to-door to consumers and the alarm companies typically fail to advise purchasers of the City of Spokane alarm ordinance, creating higher than normal false alarms. No further explanation is necessary.

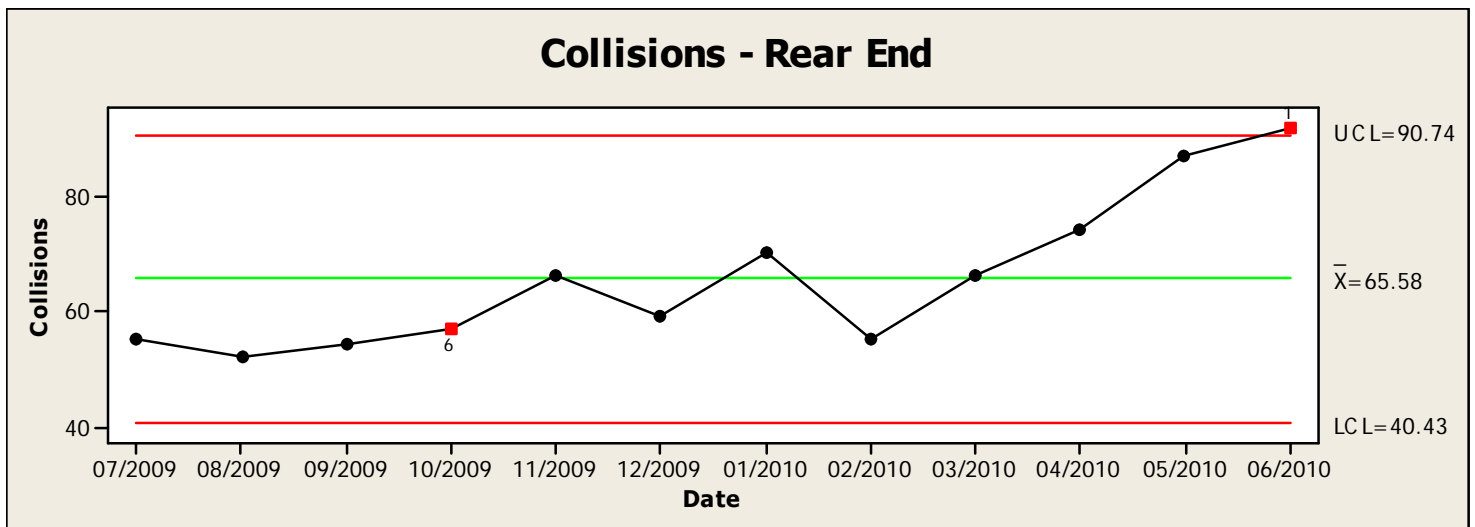

## **Collisions**

Due to backlog in the Traffic Unit, the July data was not available. Analysis will be conducted when data is received. However, the June data has been received and reviewed, and statistical anomalies were found for *Rear End* collisions, which were three standard deviations above average. In fact, rear end collisions have been increasing steadily since February 2010. Further investigation for the cause in this increase is needed.

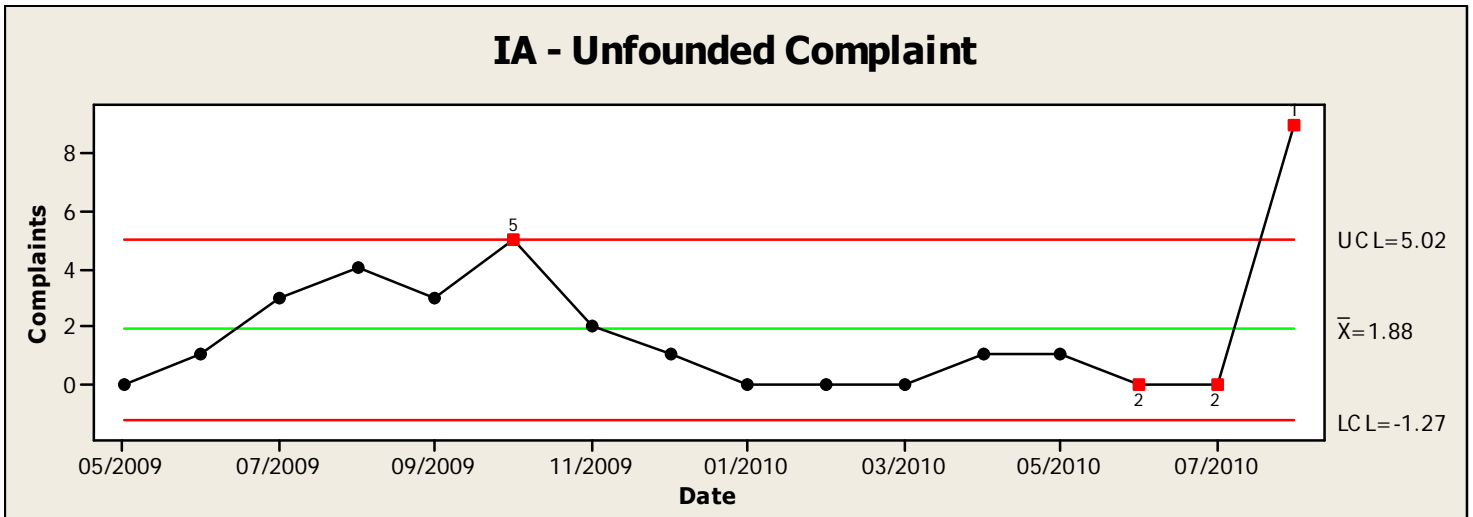

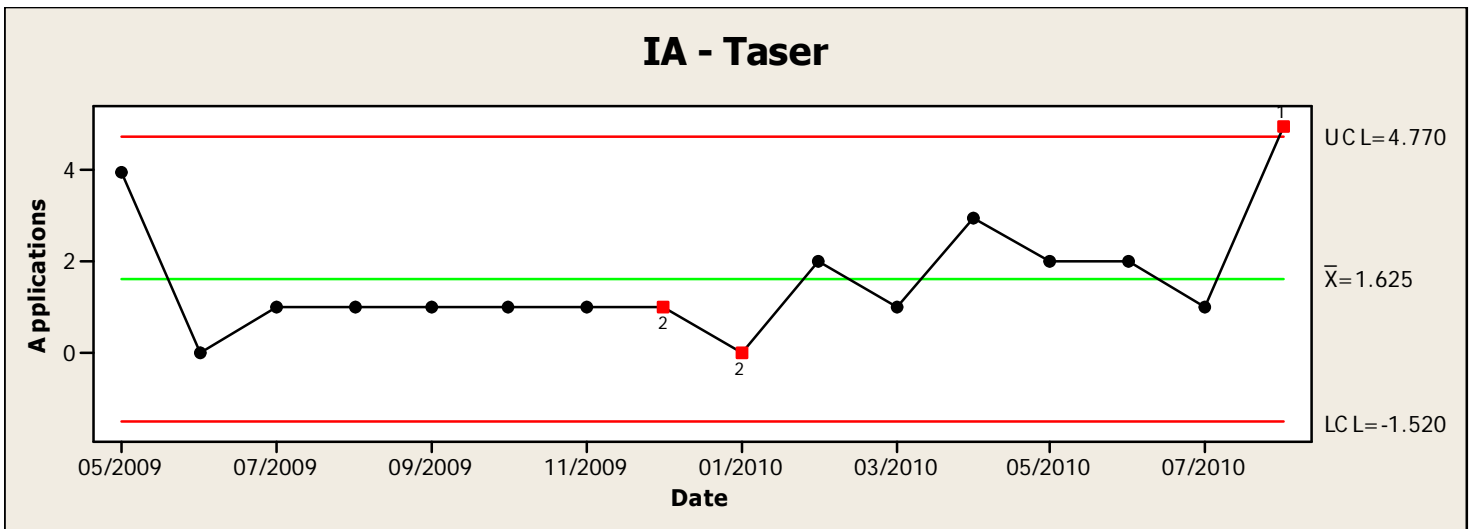
## **Internal Affairs**

There were two performance metrics with statistical anomalies for IA. The first was for *Unfounded Complaint* (please see graph on following page), which was more than three standard deviations above average for August 2010. A large number of cases were closed in August and as such, there was a higher number than average for the number of unfounded complaints. As can be seen, the January through July 2010 data was flagged for being below average; this anomaly for August simply reflects the cases closed in a single month as opposed to being spread out. No further explanation is necessary.

For *Taser*, the August 2010 was just at three standard deviations above average. As explained in the Use of Force report in the Personnel Section, officers were involved in a number of situations requiring the use of the Taser in August. While this was an exceptional month for Taser usage, no further explanation is necessary.

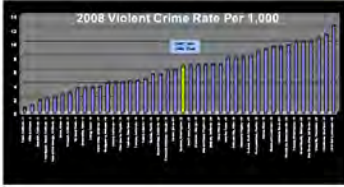

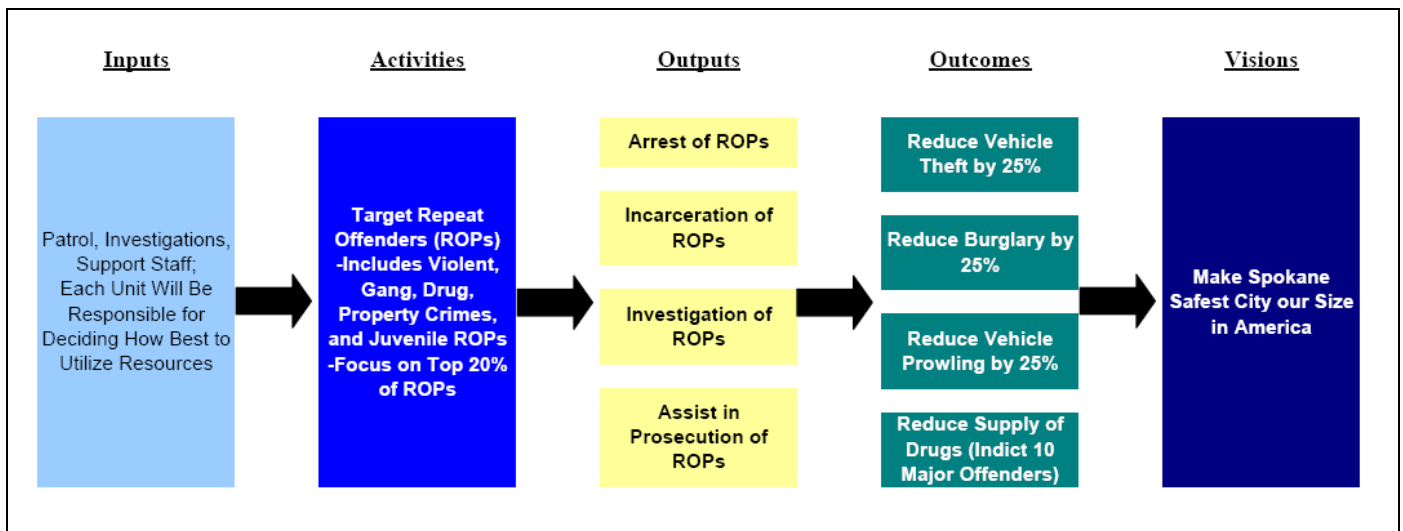


## 2010 Vision:

### “Make Spokane the Safest City Our Size in America”

The Spokane Police Department continues to work towards our vision of making Spokane the safest city our size (population 175,000 to 225,000) in America. To determine our success in this venture, we measure the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Part I<sup>1</sup> data law enforcement agencies report to the FBI.

Since the 2009 data for our comparison cities will not be released by the FBI until mid-2010, a different approach must be used to measure our success at making Spokane safer. The following logic model demonstrates how SPD plans to achieve this vision: by focusing on repeat offenders we plan to reduce Vehicle Theft, Burglary, and Vehicle Prowling (a subset of the Larceny category) by 25%.



As part of AIM, a monthly statistical analysis will be conducted to evaluate the impact of policing efforts on reducing crime to determine if there is a correlation. If there is, it will indicate our success at reducing crime. If there is no correlation, this may be an indication we need to change our approach.

This section of the monthly AIM report will briefly explain what was analyzed and the findings of the analysis. Any assessment from prior reports may also be included here.

<sup>1</sup> Part I crimes include Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny, and Vehicle Theft. Arson is also a Part I crime, but as that is not tracked by SPD, that data is not analyzed.

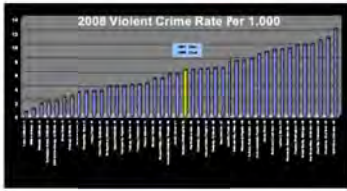


UCR (Unified Crime Reporting) data is the standardized reporting data required by the FBI; this is the most accurate measurement, but the data runs approximately two months behind. RMS (Records Management System) Incident data is up-to-the-date incident data as it was classified at the time of incident; however, since this data has not been classified by the UCR process it is less accurate. A comparison between UCR and RMS is provided in order to have more timely data.

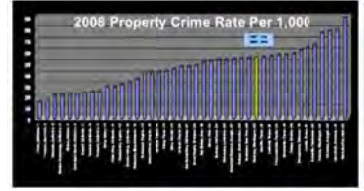

## August 2010 Analysis Northeast Neighborhoods Crime and Top 15 Active Offenders

### Northeast Neighborhoods

There are six City of Spokane Neighborhood Councils that fall in Northeast Spokane (east of Division and north of the Spokane River): Bemiss, Hillyard, Logan, Minnehaha, Nevada-Lidgerwood, and Whitman. 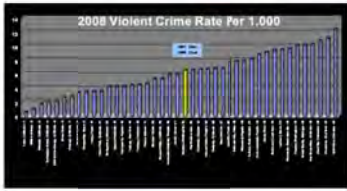
These six Neighborhoods will be targeted for the Spokane Police Department's proactive efforts in 2010 to reduce the following crimes by 25%: Burglary, Vehicle Prowling, and Vehicle Theft. Though the intent of AIM was to measure the impacts of proactive patrols to reduce crime in these neighborhoods, due to continued staffing shortages, at this time it is impractical to measure this data for any accuracy. Proactive patrols have been pieced together as staffing allows, and this inconsistency does not allow for accurate statistical analysis. However, we will still measure crime in this area for trends in reduction rates since when staffing does allow for proactive patrols, they are focused in Northeast (when appropriate).

Below are the tables showing the 2010 goal for the average level of Burglary, Vehicle Prowling, and Vehicle Theft for these six neighborhoods and the data for July 2010. Please see the following page for a review of this data.

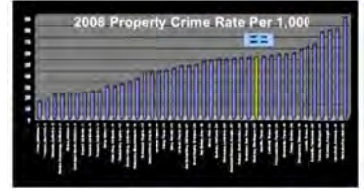

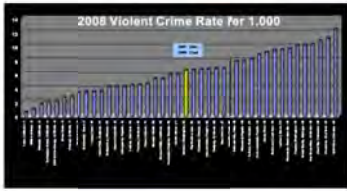

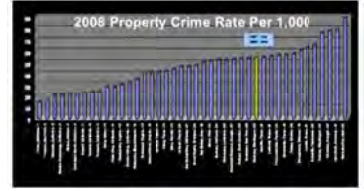
For the July data (see previous page) four out of six neighborhoods are well above their 2010 goals for a 25% reduction in crime. Only the Minnehaha and Whitman neighborhoods are within reach of their goal for the month of July. Since it is important to not single out a particular month, please see the 2010 totals on the next page for a more comprehensive view. However, the most recent months' data has not shown any positive strides in reducing crime. Unfortunately, the lack of proactive patrol teams due to staffing limitations has prevented officers from focusing on reducing crime in the Northeast neighborhoods.

On the following page is a table showing the breakdown of UCR crimes for 2010 (data available to date), as well as the 2010 average and 2010 goal, along with a 2009 average for comparison purposes. This table includes year to date data. It is important to use this cumulative table in order to determine sustained efforts in reducing crime. Below is a brief summary on each neighborhood:

- **Bemiss:** 2010 average is exceeding 2009 average for all crimes; not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **Hillyard:** 2010 average is exceeding 2009 average for all crimes, though Vehicle Theft is comparable to 2009; not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **Logan:** 2010 average is exceeding 2009 average for Burglary and Vehicle Prowling, but for Vehicle Theft the 2010 average is better than the 2009 average. However, Vehicle Prowling continues to well exceed the 2009 average; not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **Minnehaha:** 2010 average is comparable to 2009 average for all crimes, not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **NevaWood:** 2010 average is comparable to 2009 average for Burglary and Vehicle Theft, and is below 2009 average for Vehicle Prowling. Not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction for Burglary or Vehicle Theft, but if current Vehicle Prowling numbers are sustained, may be able to reach goal.
- **Whitman:** Continues to meet 25% reduction in Vehicle Theft; not on track for Burglary and Vehicle Prowling, though those levels are comparable to 2009 levels.

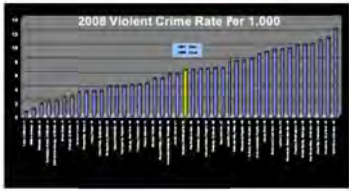

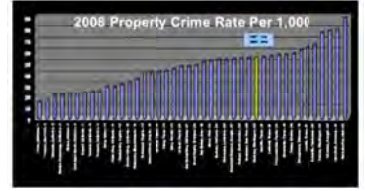

### Top 15 Prolific Offenders

Along with focusing on proactive patrol efforts to reduce crime, SPD is also focusing on certain prolific offenders. The vast majority of crime can be attributed to a few select offenders in a community. These offenders are often a revolving cast; while some are incarcerated for a period of several months to several years, others remain active in criminal behavior, often arrested for crimes only to be released pending prosecution. Based on limited resources in the criminal justice system, including law enforcement officers, jail space, and property crimes prosecutors, by focusing available resources on these offenders, we can make Spokane a safer place as well as achieve efficiency.

As such, the Crime Analysis unit at SPD has identified the top 15 active offenders in Spokane as of February 2010. These offenders will be the focus of both patrol and investigators at SPD and every effort will be made to ensure all referrals for prosecution believed to have been committed by these individuals receive top priority. The list will remain static for 2010 so that we can measure the influence of these offenders on crime trends.

Each month, an update of the offender's status (legal, incarcerated, etc) will be provided as well as a brief summary of the activity for that month by the offender, including any arrests. In order to maintain anonymity, as these offenders are presumed innocent until conviction, a code name has been given to each offender and their given name will be redacted. The code name will be used in the Weekly AIM reports as well, so that these offenders' activity can be linked anecdotally.

In future AIM reports, statistical analysis will be conducted to show the correlation between certain crime trends and these prolific offenders.

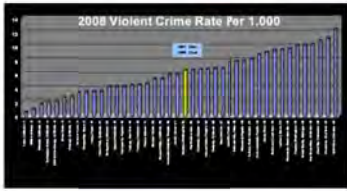

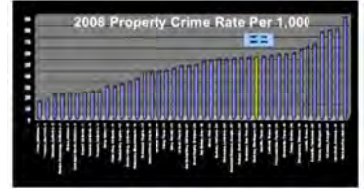
#### **Recent Activity:**

#### ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- o [REDACTED] E. Broad---Bomb Call---Detectives Wuthrich and Mehring assisted patrol with what came in as an explosion. They took statements from witnesses, wrote and executed a search warrant, collected evidence and were able to identify primary suspects. Primary suspects are people of interest for CIU.
- o Attempted to locate a home address for [REDACTED] a suspect in shooting death.
- o Arrested [REDACTED] on PC for robbery and burglary.
- o Arrested [REDACTED] on PC for burglary, malicious mischief and attempted vehicle theft.
- o We've had several Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU) targets sentenced, or about to be sentenced, in the last couple weeks:

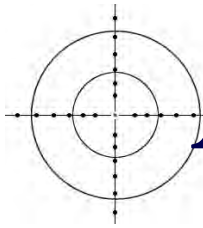

There is constant short stay foot/vehicle traffic to the rear of the duplex. It appears that [redacted] is the primary location for the activity. SIU is involved and working with Officer Strassenberg to shut the problem down. The area needs a consistent patrol presence if time allows. Unknown who the current tenants are, but any information found via a stop would be helpful.



- DOT Homes---A second string of thefts has hit the DOT homes in the area of 2<sup>nd</sup>/Ray. Found one of the suspects who turned out to be a very ill/elderly male. He returned the property, but the area is still seeing a lot of theft of the wood/metal materials from the homes.

### **Officer Downing and Officer Redmon – Downtown**

- Currently working on charging [REDACTED] the “Megazord” tagger with all the malicious mischief damage he has done in and around the downtown area. If anyone is aware any of his work, please forward report numbers and photos so Officer Redmon can charge him. He tags: “Megazord”, “Mega”, “OSM”, “MG”. Officers Redmon and Downing arrested him this last week for damage to the Cathedral Plaza Apartments, Riverfront Park and the Spokesman Review building.
- Having issues with [REDACTED] He is running against Cathy McMorris and has been a menace in the downtown are the past few weeks. The Spokesman Review ran a story on their front page concerning him this weekend. He has been trespassed from Davenport, Red Lion, Riverpark Square and Wheatland Bank (Spokane Falls/Wall) for thefts, lewd comments and for stealing coffee.
- We did a CEPTED evaluation of City Hall which is having problems in their North parking lot after hours. Seems there are car loads of teens who like to loiter there and party. Recently a City Councilman was confronted by them and would like the lots patrolled and problems removed. This same problem also occurs in the parking lots across the street in Riverfront Park and the Old YMCA parking areas. Recommendations were made to the city to post no trespassing after hours and to add camera surveillance unknown if they will be made. Be aware a lot of people who aren't causing problems use the lot after hours for free parking. Until it is posted no trespassing after hours it makes it hard to trespass just a select few and not everyone.

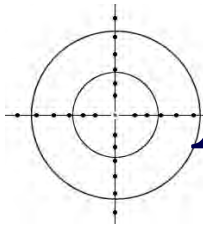
**Team 12 – Power Shift**

He was contacted after he pulled a bandana over his face and threatened a homeowner suggesting that he might have a gun (he didn't) and that he was "west side." The homeowner then displayed a real baseball bat. Adolph fled the scene and was contacted by PD and driven back to Excelsior.
- [REDACTED] N. Cannon---[REDACTED] was at the location in violation of an order protecting his girlfriend. [REDACTED] claimed to be suicidal and was brandishing a butcher knife. [REDACTED] reported that [REDACTED] had repeatedly violated the order. [REDACTED] was arrested and booked for felony Stalking.
- Officer Spolski recovered the 2007 Mercury that was outstanding from the High Bridge DOA call.
- A resident at [REDACTED] N. Elm heard some people in his backyard. When he went out to investigate he was jumped by two subjects and did not get a good look at either one. The victim suffered a possible broken jaw. Officer Green advised that there were no suspects and no known motive for the attack.
- [REDACTED] N. Monroe---Officers Madsen and Kernkamp reported that there was another fight at [REDACTED] N. Monroe. The combatants were females using baseball bats.

- [REDACTED] N. Sutherland---[REDACTED] was in the area talking to young children. Officer Braun investigated and forwarded an FI. Possible vehicles are a white Nissan and a blue crossover type.
- Driscoll One Stop--- Comp called in over the past couple of weeks reporting a male that exposed himself to kids. The suspect vehicle was described as a Green Van with a pineapple air freshener. Officer Braun located a similar one at [REDACTED] W. Lacrosse.

**Team 3 – Day Shift**

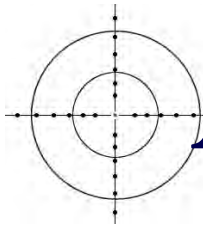
- On 07/30/10 Officers Shearer and Mason responded to a vehicle prowler in the area of 11<sup>th</sup>/Ray. They located [REDACTED] in the area. They did not develop enough PC to arrest [REDACTED] but it appears he is the suspect in vehicle prowls that are occurring in the area. Officers located items stolen from one of the victims near where they contacted [REDACTED] Items were placed on property to be processed for prints.
- On 07/30/10 Officer Kirby arrested [REDACTED] for patronizing a prostitute and possession of marijuana. He arrested him in the area of 1<sup>st</sup> and Cowley contacting [REDACTED] She had a non extraditable warrant for prostitution from the west side of the state. He had seen them make contact on the street corner and observe them walk off to a secluded area. When he came up on them she had her pants down and he quickly walked off. He was able to detain both of them.



- On 08/01/10 Officer Nollmeyer took a commercial burglary report from Mc Quicks at 4501 S. Regal. The window was broken out. Cigarettes and lighters were stolen. On 08/02/10 Officer Nollmeyer again responded to the location to take another burglary report. It appeared the suspects returned making entry thorough the broken window. Lottery tickets, cigars, and chew were stolen. Later on 08/02/10 radio advised of suspects attempting to cash stolen Lotto tickets at the 7-11. The suspects took off before officers responded. The suspects again tried at the Safeway at 29<sup>th</sup> and Southeast to cash winning Lotto tickets. The suspects again left when they were unable to because they showed as stolen. There were three suspects. The two juveniles, [REDACTED] were located by Officer Ennis at the Rite Aid. Officer Nollmeyer interviewed both of them. The shoes they were wearing matched the footprints on the window ledge. Both suspects then admitted to both burglaries. Apparently after the first burglary they took their loot to Murphy Park at 27<sup>th</sup>/Regal. No honor among thieves there loot was stolen from them at the park. On 08/02/10 they returned to the burglary scene and saw the window was just boarded over so they went in again. They stole lotto sctcvh tickets, lighters, and cigars. They scratched the tickets and kept the winners. Since they were not 18 they recruited [REDACTED] to cash them. He tried at two different locations but the tickets had already been reported stolen. [REDACTED] kept their backpack with part of the loot (ripped off the thieves) and they went their separate ways. [REDACTED] was located in a drainage ditch at 27<sup>th</sup>/Southeast. He saw officers in the area and attempted to hide but was located by Corporal Lundgren. [REDACTED] was arrested for a class B felony under 67.70.130 stolen lottery tickets. [REDACTED] were arrested for the burglaries.

### Team 7 – Swing Shift

- [REDACTED] is a prolific DVD shoplifter. He has been trespassed from Fred Meyer locations. He stole DVD(s) from the valley store and the 400 S. Thor store. He was booked for Burglary 2.
- Officers located a drug house at [REDACTED] W. 7<sup>th</sup> [REDACTED]. An FI has been submitted to SIU.
- Officers did a PCS placement of a 5 year old boy left alone for about 12 hours at [REDACTED] W. 7<sup>th</sup> [REDACTED].
- Officers stopped a car for no front plate. The driver was DWLS, had unexplained cash over \$1000 in his pocket and a DOC warrant. His passenger had marijuana and was an 'attendant' at the Oriental Spa on Francis/Nevada. Both have prior drug history. There was a room key to #3 at the Royal Scott. There was no preliminary nexus to the room and drug activity. Both subjects were booked. Follow-up leads the drug trail back to [REDACTED] E 1<sup>st</sup>.
- Subject [REDACTED] was arrested at STA for a DOC hold. Subject was high and needed to be transported to hospital. Officers were unable to book him due to his drug intoxication. Officers spent three hours on the call.
- Officers responded to apartments at 600 S. Howard on a subject running around threatening others with a baseball bat. They located [REDACTED]. He was uncooperative when contacted by the Police. [REDACTED] was booked for Harassment and Obstructing.
- Officers responded to [REDACTED] E Pacific on a child abuse call. They were able to determine a 5 ½ year old female was endangered. The female was taken to the hospital and admitted for her injuries. CPS was involved. The call was very confusing and required several hours of officer hours to resolve.
- Some criminal subjects were FI'd hanging out at Coeur d'Alene Park. All had extensive records for theft and/or drugs.
- A citizen reported there is prostitution activity in Coeur d'Alene Park after 1900 hours. The girls he is aware of are well dressed and blend into the neighborhood. He was not able to provide specific information on exact times, days, or locations in the park. He was relating third party information.

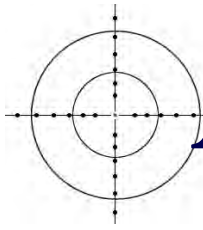


### Team 11 – Power Shift

- Officers responded to an accident at Mission and Lidgerwood. The investigation revealed that the driver and only other passenger had been involved in a physical altercation which caused the accident. The passenger remained on scene and the driver was located a few blocks away. Witnesses reported the driver fled with a bag which was no longer with him. Officers located the bag under the deck of a nearby house. The bag contained a significant amount of marijuana, packaging materials, and scales. Officers learned that the two occupants of the car were arguing about money from the marijuana sales. The driver was arrested for Possession of a Controlled Substance – Delivery and his car was seized.
- Officers responded to many incidents involving downtown regulars. Officers arrested [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] W. 2nd for Malicious Mischief 3rd and a warrant after he threw a rock through a window at the location.
- Officers responded to many bar fights and typical downtown problems. Most notable was on 07-31-10, a bouncer called in a person with a shotgun in the lot across from Club Uno. A tactical shotgun located in a car in the parking lot. No victims or witnesses who could place any person in possession of the gun. The owner of gun was located, but denied having it out. With no victims or witnesses to crimes, gun was taken for safekeeping and booked on property.
- Officers have made several prowl checks of 32nd/Crestline area where there have been many parties in wooded areas.
- Officers were involved in a pursuit of wanted felon Antonio Mitchell. Pursuit ended with suspect vehicle crashing and arrests for warrants, Vehicular Assault, and Attempt to Elude.
- Officers responded to two other DUI vehicular Assault calls. One involved an intoxicated male driver running into two female pedestrians and 10<sup>th</sup> and Maple. The second was an intoxicated female driver running into an intoxicated male jay-walker.

- Trespassers in the boarded up houses near I90, stealing items from inside(fixtures, etc).
- [REDACTED] N. Altamont-Drug house, dealing and using Heroin. Gates are chained up w/1" steel, 3-4 dogs outside at all times around the perimeter.
- Repeated calls to assist the fire department with transporting detox candidates.

### Prior Week Assessment

#### *Investigations Update*

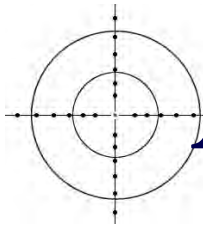
- Lt. McGovern provided follow-up information on the recent oxycontin robberies.
  - Officers pursued a suspect vehicle who had stolen oxycontin from a local pharmacy. One officer utilized a PIT maneuver to disable the fleeing vehicle. Once the vehicle was stopped, the suspect shot himself and later died as a result of the self inflicted gunshot. This suspect was good for two other oxycontin robberies as well.
  - Patrol did a great job setting up the inner and outer perimeters. This was the first time the Gardner Building was used for this type of incident and it worked great.
- The pre-AIM meetings are proving to be beneficial for Investigations. Each unit is able to bring information to the table and assist other units with their ongoing cases.

#### *SIU Update*

- SIU conducted a prostitution sting on East Sprague. This was a collaborative effort between Investigations, Patrol and the NROs. KXLY reporters rode with Sgt. Walter and a story was aired regarding this special enforcement. The officer posing as a prostitute was not on the street for 10 minutes before she was contacted. The sting yielded four arrests.

#### *Patrol Update*

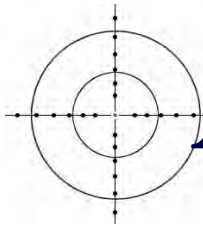
- The Traffic Unit is seeing traffic issues in the construction zones. People are getting impatient with the many construction areas around town. The Tip of the Week was directed towards this issue. Cpl. Lasswell has written 20 tickets for construction zones alone.
- The extra duty detail at Liberty Pool is over and was funded by the Parks Department. This detail yielded one trespass, one bike theft and an unruly nine year old that was removed from the pool.
- Ofc. Hewitt contacted Club Uno about their Tuesday night juvenile nights. Club Uno has disbanded the juvenile night and Patrol has already seen an improvement and huge amounts of man hours are no longer being dedicated to Club Uno. It has been much quieter.
- Ofc. Denton has been working on the transient issue under the freeway. He is doing a great job documenting individuals he contacts.
- One suggestion that would be helpful for the graveyard shifts who deal with more drunks in the early hours of the mornings is for the Detox van to change or extend operation hours, which right now ends at midnight. Follow-up to be conducted by Major Johnson.



- Patrol teams are still having staffing issues and are having to call people in to keep the city at minimum staffing. At times there has been a page of calls holding.
  - Chief Kirkpatrick advised that decisions will need to be made on what services will be cut. A list will need to be generated outlining what types of crime SPD will no longer be able to service. Now is a good time to begin that transition. If this issue is not treated with clarity it will be left to discretion. The ultimate message that needs to be relayed is that there will be service cuts and we can no longer service all of the crime we have been responding to in the past.

### ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- These two individuals were a couple of Spokane's most prolific car thieves in 2009 and 2010 and these are probably the steepest sentences the Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU) has seen for any of our local car thieves. Both of these cases were the result of great work by TCU, patrol and the assigned prosecutors.
  - Det. Staben attended [REDACTED] ("Foxtrot" on the TOP 15 list) sentencing. "Foxtrot" pled guilty to 17 felonies and was given 68 months, which was the maximum sentence he could get!
  - [REDACTED] another prolific car thief, pled guilty and got 68 months as well last week. His charges included stealing cars, eluding and vehicular assault.
- There has been a big spike in vehicle thefts the last couple weeks. TCU believes [REDACTED] is a major reason for the spike along with [REDACTED]. He's associated with virtually every other significant car thief the TCU has dealt with this year. He was just ID'd (along with [REDACTED] as the suspect in another theft and there was another car taken/dumped at the same spot. He's a suspect in other cases as well. Pretty much any vehicle theft in which one stolen Honda got dumped and another got stolen, [REDACTED] is TCU's first suspect.
  - [REDACTED] was in jail pending several vehicle theft cases TCU charged him on. He was apparently allowed to leave jail specifically to attend rehab locally. He was supposed to be taken from jail, to rehab, then after rehab, taken right back to jail. Det. Staben has jail recordings of [REDACTED] specifically talking about how he was just going along with the rehab plan in order to escape once he was dropped off there. That is precisely what he did a couple weeks ago. He fled and a warrant was quickly issued for his arrest. [REDACTED] has a warrant for 2<sup>nd</sup> ID Theft.
  - Staben learned the area where [REDACTED] was living from the same jail recordings and pinned down the address, 2914 E. Rowan. Det. Staben was checking the address when he saw [REDACTED] who subsequently fled into the house. He called out patrol and the address was secured. Det. Staben began to apply for a search warrant but [REDACTED] ended up coming out and surrendering to officers. Both were arrested for their felony warrants and taken to our building for interrogation.
  - Det. Staben is going to charge [REDACTED] for at least three separate vehicle thefts and/or possession. [REDACTED] will be charged with at least one PSV. [REDACTED] is a suspect in several other cases that are still being investigated.
- Regarding commercial burglaries, as noted recently TCU booked [REDACTED] who are all active commercial burglars. This might account for some of the recent decrease in those burglaries. Patrol arrested three suspects for a couple commercial burglaries last week as well. Det. Robertson consolidated these incidents and completed a charging request for all of them for two burglaries and lottery ticket fraud.



### Crime Trend Debrief

Ryan Shaw provided this week's crime statistics:

- o Burglaries are lower than the past few weeks.
  - Commercial burglaries have dropped significantly and could be related to the arrests of [REDACTED]
  - Residential and garage burglaries are within a low range as well
- o Vehicle prowling is the lowest since March.
- o Indian Trail has seen an increase in criminal activity such as vehicle thefts and prowlings, suspect vehicle casing the area, car wash coin box theft and a blown up Honeybucket.
- o Crime Analysis has seen an increase of lewd conduct reports in which a male approaches a residence at night, shines a flashlight on his genitals while masturbating and knocks on the window to get the resident's attention. He sometimes wears white latex gloves. There have been three incidents in July and one in August. Because of the MO of the incidents, the suspect is likely [REDACTED]
- o Judge Watch
  - Bill Flatt with LEIS developed an RMS program to run the judges associated with releases of ROPs and TOP 15 offenders.
  - It may be more effective to pursue this from the court side rather than RMS. It was suggested that using CaseMan to track this information would be better. Sgt. Wilson stated that he uses it daily and it is not always accurate.
  - The first appearance judges release more because of the higher number of defendants coming through their courtrooms.

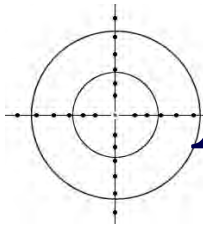

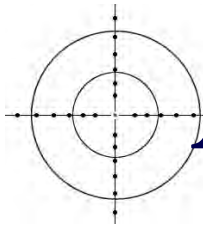

## WEEKLY PATROL TEAM EFFORTS

### NORTH SIDE

#### Team 2 – Day Shift

- o This week the team concentrated more on traffic than in preceding weeks, both through proactive enforcement and collision investigation. Ofc. Stanton worked a solo special at Audubon Park, Ofc. House worked on three separate days stopping violations at Hays Park and Mission Park, writing several hazardous and non-hazardous tickets as well as FIs. On 08/05/10, Ofc. House also investigated a blocking, injury, 3-car rollover collision at Nevada & Lyons and received positive comments on his professionalism.
- o Although three of the five days were at minimum staffing, Team 2 officers self-initiated several felony arrests as well. On Tuesday, 08/03/10, Ofc. Hager took a burglary report, then spent considerable follow-up to locate the stolen property and subsequently arrest the burglar hiding in a friend's locked garage.



- On Wednesday, 08/04/10, Ofc. Crane received word of a wanted felon named [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] E. Central. After an initial check of the residence, he returned later to find the suspect's truck and the suspect in the back yard. He arrested [REDACTED] on his felony warrants, and due to good officer safety was able to prevent a sudden bolt by [REDACTED] to run from Ofc. Crane, after which he became hostile and was documented for Crime Analysis.
- On Thursday, 08/05/10, Ofc. Crane responded to Holy Family where a chain-smoking, alcoholic gambling disabled defrocked Jehovah's Witness pastor with a felony warrant had brought in his friend, dumped him in the ER, then gone outside to chain smoke. The friend had apparently been dead for several hours, contrary to the driver's assertions. Ofc. Crane worked with Major Crimes, and a marijuana grow and handgun were subsequently found in the deceased's house. The driver was also arrested on his warrant. Ofc. Crane spent the shift making sure the investigation was thorough and property was properly handled.
- On Friday, 08/06/10, Ofc. Crane, working with Range Sgt. Cowles conducted required weapons maintenance for several of Team 2, then worked in a required Department firearms shoot for not only our team, but also rotated several other day and swing shift officers to satisfy their training requirements as well. Ofc. Graves also volunteered to work south to cover a staffing shortage.

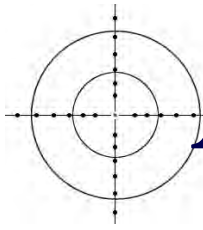
### Team 14 – Graveyard Shift

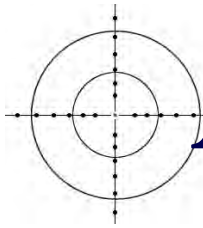

#### ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- [REDACTED] was arrested last week for several DV order violations and an intimidating a witness charge stemming from threats being made regarding a case originally investigated by the Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU). [REDACTED] is a constant source of criminal activity and a person of interest for CIU.
- TCU assisted with a search warrant at [REDACTED] E. Joseph. The residence is occupied by [REDACTED]. Both suspects were present at the time and a small MJ grow was located in the basement. Charges are pending re Manufacturing a Controlled Substance. Both suspects have been active in the recent past. Short has a pending Robbery charge investigated by TCU.
- TCU conducted surveillance on two separate locations in an effort to gather intelligence. S. [REDACTED] Adams, the residence is occupied by [REDACTED] top 10 active offender list. The second residence is E. [REDACTED] Cleveland, the residence is occupied by [REDACTED] and frequented by a variety of subjects involved in vehicle thefts, prowlings etc.
- Five of the offenders on the top 10 active list are in jail. One of our primary focuses this week will be to file cases in an effort to keep these people incarcerated.
- Information has indicated that [REDACTED] has been involved in selling meth and stolen property. [REDACTED] was on the original list of ROP and was released from prison recently. DOC has provided a subject willing to give information regarding [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] is also associated with [REDACTED] and several other prolific offenders more specifically vehicle thefts. TCU has been at [REDACTED] residence and it would appear that the information received is correct. TCU will attempt to develop more reliable information regarding [REDACTED] activities.
- [REDACTED] is a co-defendant of two subjects on the top ten list. [REDACTED] has a pending Robbery charge. We will request the prosecutor file charges and receive a warrant on [REDACTED].
- [REDACTED] is most likely responsible for a rash of burglaries in the Indian Trail area. [REDACTED] is on the top 10 list. [REDACTED] is dating [REDACTED] lives in the area of Indian Trail and Barnes. [REDACTED] burglarized [REDACTED] neighbors home. TCU will attempt to interview [REDACTED] regarding the burglaries.
- The investigation of an unlawful IED explosion at E. [REDACTED] Broad is continuing.

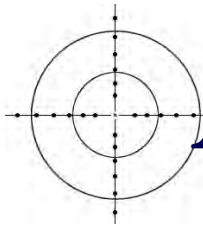
### Officer McIntyre – Nevada/Lidgerwood

- Several stolen cars have been recovered at the Cedar Springs Estates apartment complexes located at **7808 N. Morton, E. 1011 Sharpsburg, 1110 E. Cozza and 8424 N. Nevada**. Possible suspect lives in south/west apts. Of 1110 E. Cozza.
- Anti-Harassment order was amended by Judge Walker between **E. Broad** ( ) and **E. Wabash** ( ). y was given till 1700hrs on 081110 to take down every surveillance camera he has on his house, which are pointing in and around house. He is not happy about this. Ofc. McIntyre has had several meetings with both parties this week hoping they will understand the seriousness of a violation.
- Neighbors are giving good info regarding **N. Nevada** being active house. Lots of traffic. Please forward any intel .
- Ofc. McIntyre met with the owner of **N. Crestline**, lots of foot traffic and parties at night. This is sub-let to several people who are involved with “Mending Fences” rehab for convicts. The neighbors are telling me rehab is not working and they have heard/seen drugs being used out in the open.
- **Glass Park (Standard/Heroy)** is being used as an outside lounge for adults to drink and party. Neighbors are tired of being confronted by the drinkers who look mostly transient or might live in one of the run down houses across the street. This park has a great water area and play area for kids, so please try to drive thru and check on them.

### Officer Thomas – Northeast No New Updates

### Officer Strassenberg – East Central/Garry Park

- Prostitution Special---On 8/6/10, The NROs and member of SIU conducted a directed enforcement in the Sprague area. An undercover female officer was used as a decoy. Four arrests were made during the detail. The decoy officer had many contacts, but the males were asking for her to get in the car. For safety reasons, the undercover officer is not to enter a suspect vehicle at any time. The decoy even had a male contact her and ask where he could purchase crack cocaine. Future specials are being planned.
- & N Crestline---The drug issues are still a problem at the duplex. Ofc. Strassenberg has been working with SIU to get a controlled buy from the location to help secure a search warrant. So far that has failed. New information came to SIU this week and another operation is being planned to eliminate the drug house.
- & S Fiske---Both homes are owned by the same person. The rentals have been a constant problem with the neighborhood. Ofc. Strassenberg was finally able to talk the owner into selling the homes to DOT. is now vacant and boarded up. The final eviction for is now in the works and the home should be boarded up in the next month.
- S Thor---Small apartment complex has created numerous police responses in the last year. Ofc. Strassenberg has evicted several tenants, but the replacements are not much better. Owner is not real concerned with the problems. Local business has stepped forward in an attempt to buy the building and evict everyone. The business wants to level the building and turn it into a parking lot.



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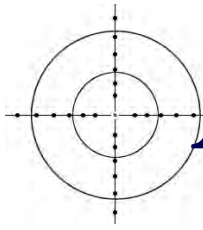
## Weekly Wrap-Up for Wednesday, August 18<sup>th</sup>, 2010

- The EC and Garry Park areas have seen a large number of vacant homes. The owners are simply walking away from the homes, leaving them unsecured. Have already boarded up two home that are still full of personal belongings. The homes needed to be secured due to youth/transient problems.

### Officer Draper – Southeast/Southwest

- FLASHER---40<sup>th</sup>/Grand and 25<sup>th</sup>/ Bernard---Ofc. Draper received two voicemails that were forwarded to me from Spokane COPS about a W/M 20- 25yrs old, thin with brown hair flashing young girls. One in the front yard of [REDACTED] E. 40<sup>th</sup> at 40<sup>th</sup> and Grand and the other at 25<sup>th</sup> and Bernard. Ofc. Draper has called both mothers back and left messages (requesting Crime Check reports at a minimum) but have not spoken with them in person. The three targeted victims in the two known incidents are teenagers. The crimes occurred on 8/9 around 1900 hours at Bernard/25<sup>th</sup>) and the second at Grand/40<sup>th</sup> was on the evening of either 8/9 or 8/8.
- National Night Out Against Crime (NNOAC)---Ofc. Draper was able to attend numerous block parties and meeting related to NNOAC. Nearly all of these events asked Ofc. Draper to speak on crime in those specific neighborhoods as well as City wide, to include the future goals for the Police Department, however, my most common questions were related to crime prevention.
- Ofc. Draper was asked to help Abandoned Auto enforcement due to an injury. He tagged numerous cars in the SW and SE area.
- [REDACTED] W. 39<sup>th</sup> ---Update on [REDACTED] ---Neighbors are reporting [REDACTED] may be living at the house again, against the judge's order. Ofc. Draper has not been able to establish PC yet that [REDACTED] is living there again. He will continue to monitor this again.
- [REDACTED] W. 19<sup>th</sup> – Neighborhood Dispute – Neighbors of [REDACTED] W. 19<sup>th</sup> are retaliating against them for cutting down trees on their own property. Victims are find signs in their front yard about the trees and are fearful this will escalate. Ofc. Draper went out and contacted several neighbors to try and head off future and further problems.
- Peaceful Valley – Ofc. Draper has had a couple of recent complaints about Peaceful Valley.
- Transient activity / camps / fires / garbage / human waste / ect. Organizers want a meeting with the SPD to discuss the issues. Preliminary meeting set for Sept 2<sup>nd</sup>. Ofc. Draper has recommended the Parks Dept also be present as so much of the property in question is Parks property.
- [REDACTED] W. Main – Drugs – A Neighbor has reported this home has lots of short stay gang and drug activity. Patrol also responded their on 08/10 where one of the chief complaints was short stay traffic.
- [REDACTED] W. 17<sup>th</sup> – Theft / Burglary – Comp is reporting she is constantly having items taken from her property and believes the home has been entered unlawfully several times. Comp believes the suspects are juveniles know to her children and has identified them as [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] No PC at this time.
- In the past two weeks Ofc. Draper has also spent a significant amount of time assisting patrol with priority calls for service.
- Ofc. Draper will be in training next week (Aug 23-26).

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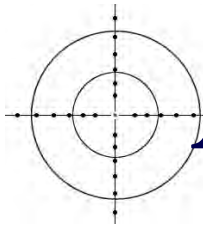

- Sgt. Sprague met with owner [REDACTED] of Jewelry Design Center after handling yet another call of disorderly transients at [REDACTED] N. Division (a result of the ordinance prohibited fortified beer sales in downtown). As a result, it was identified as an official AIM project, and discussed at the team table the following day. The rest of the week was spent with officers regularly driving through the area, with a Lewdness arrest, several Open/Consume tickets and several more trespass notices given. NRO Douglas was brought on board, and the owners will be posting signs to further discourage vagrant behavior.
- Because of sufficient staffing, Team 2 officers worked more traffic emphasis between calls. Ofc. Stanton worked the Audubon Park area two days, and wrote multiple tickets each day. Ofc. Stewart had similar success working the Hays Park area, and Ofc. Crane wrote several violators in the Nevada construction area.
- On Friday, SIU served several search warrants all over town, and pulled officers from patrol (which was minimum staffed due to many people being off). Regardless, Team 2 officers utilized made arrests on three people for a total of seven felonies.
- This week was also notable for the large number of very young found children who had been located by responsible citizens after having left their homes and wandered significant distances away. Several multiple officer searches and CPS referrals were made. As well, there was a large number of 105 calls and assists from MHP's for involuntary placement, or just plain strung out offenders involved in disorderly and criminal conduct. Ofcs. Crane and Stewart fought a female during an involuntary transport on Wednesday, Cpl. McNab and Ofc. Graves fought a tweaking disorderly to the ground in West Central on Friday, Cpl. McNab and Ofc. Stewart arrested a violent disorderly at the Northtown McDonald's on Division after he lost control, and Ofc. Crane and I charged an under-the-influence felon in West Central who was vehicle prowling with a homemade club/spear and menaced a homeowner. Additionally, Ofc. Stanton and Cpl. McNab responded to a head shot suicide at [REDACTED] N. Madison, and Ofc. Stanton assisted Major Crimes with reconstructing a puzzling chain of events involving a ricocheting slug.
- Regarding problem addresses, Ofc Crane identified an apartment building at [REDACTED] N. Lacey where he arrested a subject on multiple warrants, where it appeared most units were inhabited by the criminal element. He also conducted surveillance at [REDACTED] N. Cincinnati, reported to be active for drug & gang activity. Ofc. Graves addressed a house at [REDACTED] W. Dean where the disorderly, unsupervised teams were causing neighborhood damage, and enlisted a parent and neighbors to have the miscreants work off their vandalism in the neighborhood in lieu of charging. NRO Douglas was notified as well.
- Ofc. Aspaas continued to check ROP addresses, but was unable to find current information. He remains in contact with Ryan Shaw providing newer information to Crime Analysis.



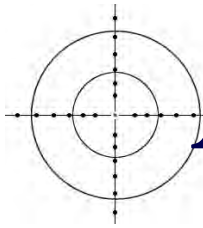
# AIM Weekly Wrap-Up for Wednesday, August 18<sup>th</sup>, 2010

## Team 10 – Power Shift

- Sgt. Anderson wrote 32 playground zone tickets this week. Hays Park – 7/Shadle Park – 0/Audubon Park – 25. Audubon Park was only worked for 5 ½ hours. Sgt. Anderson did not even look at anyone under 35mph. About 50% of speeders in that zone are from Nine Mile Falls. I had at least nine people in those 5 ½ hours walk by and thank me for working the area. They were very happy to see police. He had over three times the number of speeders at Audubon Park per hour worked than at Hays Park. The highest speed that Sgt. Anderson saw at Shadle Park was 31 mph so he didn't even make a stop.
- Ofc. Prim arrested [REDACTED] for Obstruction. [REDACTED] was climbing on the side of cousin's RV, trying to get inside. Comp was screaming for help from inside the RV. [REDACTED] was highly intoxicated.
- Ofc. Prim completed an FI on [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was lurking behind the COPS NE substation at 2150, near some patrol cars.
- Ofc. Rogan identified a possible drug dealer, [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] N. Morton who said he had 100 pills of Oxycodone taken from his car by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said [REDACTED] told him he was [REDACTED] and said [REDACTED] had a gun. The house the theft took place was [REDACTED] W. Houston, [REDACTED] [REDACTED]
- Ofc. Rogan has been looking for [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] E. Olympic. There has been lots of traffic in and out of house. They use the back door and alley to leave. A second person at the residence was [REDACTED]
- Ofc. Rogan arrested [REDACTED] at Olympic and Haven after foot pursuit. He had an escape warrant suspect in rape.
- A subject ran from Ofc. Edwards to [REDACTED] E. Bridgeport. He apprehended [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] both of which had a felony warrant.
- [REDACTED] ran from a stolen vehicle and was apprehended hiding at [REDACTED] W. Augusta. Officers assisting encountered [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] each with extensive criminal histories. [REDACTED] had a felony warrant and was charged with possession of a stolen vehicle and pcs-meth. [REDACTED] had seven warrants for his arrest. [REDACTED] is a [REDACTED] affiliate.
- Ofc. Edwards saw [REDACTED] driving a vehicle. [REDACTED] had a felony and misdemeanor warrant. [REDACTED] had a quantity of cash on his person. The vehicle was seized for a search warrant (US v. Gant). [REDACTED] was booked on warrants. On 08/12/10, Ofc. Edwards executed the search warrant on [REDACTED] vehicle. He recovered an amount of heroin and methamphetamine. [REDACTED] will be charged with that at a later date.

## Team 14 – Graveyard Shift

- 43 E Weile---the Vintage Apartments have been complaining about loiterers in business parking lots on Division. (Sherwin-Williams paint store particularly). Officers have encountered people hanging out in the parking lots, but have observed no law violations. If the businesses put no trespassing signs in their parking lots for after hours, maybe the police would be able to alleviate their concerns. Without that, there is not much else police can do.
- [REDACTED] E Augusta (party house)--[REDACTED] and [REDACTED] live there and are new occupants. Multiple calls since they have moved in. [REDACTED] reportedly has warrants.
- Other than that, it was a busy week with routine police calls for service.



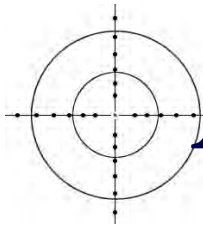
### SOUTH SIDE

#### Team 7 – Swing Shift

- On 08/10/10, Ofcs. Kakuda and Brasch took one Tahoe looking for [REDACTED] E First. They were unable to find him. Ofc. Brasch continued looking for [REDACTED] on 08/11/10. He was located and arrested for a DOC escape warrant. [REDACTED] was also arrested for an unrelated order violation.
- Ofc. McCasland had the other Tahoe on 08/10/10. He was trying to give attention to [REDACTED] W 2<sup>nd</sup> # [REDACTED] [REDACTED] Subject is infamous for exposing himself and masturbating while illuminating himself with a flashlight. Subject was not contacted.
- Jewelry Design Center, 811 N Division is complaining about transient activity. The usual problems from Downtown have surfaced there since the High Octane Alcohol Ban went into effect Downtown. They are experiencing panhandling, open urination, defecation, malicious mischief, assault. They were given some advice to contact the Zip Trip next door that is now selling high octane beer. They were also advised to post their property, call the Police and work with their NRO.
- On 08/11/10, Ofcs. Howe and Kennedy paired in a Tahoe. They located a rolling stolen vehicle at SCC. [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was arrested as the driver, passenger [REDACTED] ) was also arrested. Car was started with a key jammed into the ignition. It could not be removed.
- On 08/12/10, a drug call came out which was originally thought to be a meth lab. Sgt. Roys referred it to SFD. Later police were involved again, this time for EDU opinion. The plastic container had some liquid that was bubbling, possibly a bomb of some type. A perimeter was secured. EDU responded and it was determined to be a hazmat issue for SFD to resolve. SPD supplied three officers and a supervisor for three hours.
- Officers were involved in assisting Pullman PD apprehending a home invasion subject on 08/12/10. He was at [REDACTED] E 7<sup>th</sup>. Subject was arrested. This call also took approx three hours of time and occupied several day and swing officers. As a side note, the 'kidnapped' runaway that drew so much police time and attention the past few days was located there as well.
- Cpl. Johnson, Ofc. McCasland, and Ofc. Kakuda assisted power shift officers with a late investigation the 5<sup>th</sup> and Jefferson stabbing. It turned into a MCU incident and search warrant.

- Male subject living at [REDACTED] E. 35<sup>th</sup> attempted to solicit two juvenile females near [REDACTED] E. 33<sup>rd</sup>. Male subject drove passed the residence several times until police located him. Two female victims would not cooperate and return to the scene.
- Auto/Bicycle fatality at 2<sup>nd</sup>/Scott---Traffic Unit called out.
- Suspicious Circumstances call at 3424 S. Perry (library)---suitcase left in parking lot. EDU tech responded and used an x-ray (misc items found inside).
- Robbery at Peace of Mind (2824 E. 29<sup>th</sup>)---suspect may have been inside business prior to robbery.
- Gang Fight/Assault at [REDACTED] E. 5<sup>th</sup>



### Team 11 – Power Shift

- Officers responded to an Oxycontin Robbery at the Rite Aid at 2929 E. 29th. Officers located the suspect, later identified as [REDACTED] in a stolen Jeep Wrangler at 4th and Cowley. After a short pursuit and a PIT maneuver, he shot himself in the head with the handgun he used in the Robbery. Officers performed first aid measures until Medics arrived.
- Officers worked on a drug house at [REDACTED] N Crestline and identified several persons including the tenants, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. Officers made a felony crack cocaine arrest and a mushroom arrest from the residence and forwarded info to SIU for potential search warrant.
- Officers identified three main suspects in vehicle prowlings and vehicle thefts: [REDACTED], [REDACTED], and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] is new to Spokane and doesn't have an Ident number. His tattoos were documented for future reference.
- Officers arrested confirmed gang member [REDACTED] for DUI. [REDACTED] had been drinking at the Knitting Factory.
- Officers did several prowl checks throughout the week at 32<sup>nd</sup> and Crestline reference the on-going party problem.
- Officers spent many man-hours on two missing people during the week. One was an 80 year old female who was successfully located after several hours. The second was a 15 year old female in which there were some indications that she might have been abducted. Officers on Power, Graveyard and Day shifts spent over 24 hours on this. Officers finally determined that she was not abducted and was part of the scheme. The female was located the next day inside of an East Central house in which SPD officers assisted Pullman PD in arresting a Robbery suspect.
- Officers responded to the report of an occupied Burglary on the 10<sup>th</sup> floor of the secure Cathedral Plaza at 1120 W. Sprague. The elderly female tenant stated a male with a white blanket jumped out of her closet and attacked her, breaking her arm. Officers located a surveillance video to confirm the account. Major Crimes is investigating.
- Officers responded to check on the welfare of a bleeding unconscious juvenile female at an apartment at [REDACTED] W. 5<sup>th</sup>. Officers discovered she had numerous stab wounds and was under the influence of some unknown substance. She was transported to Sacred Heart and admitted into Intensive Care. Investigating officers received conflicting accounts of what had happened from the juvenile males present. Major Crimes was called out and are investigating.
- Officers responded to a child abuse call at [REDACTED] E Pacific. The child had bruises and swelling on her head. Child was transported to the hospital for medical treatment. The child was placed with CPS. Her 13 year old step brother was watching her and is the primary suspect at this time. There were no adults at the house during the time of this incident.
- Officers followed up all week on a Burglary report and developed PC for six counts of Forgery on two suspects at three different locations. Officers completed a lengthy report for the County Detective working a related Spokane Valley case and also developed a good lead on a possible third suspect who may be involved in the actual burglary.

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### Monthly AIM Update

#### *Monthly Report*

- Most units are in line. Downtown bike patrol upped their hours which resulted in more work product. EDU responses were up, but the incidents were unrelated. Patrol will be conducting follow-up on Photo Red citations at Sprague/Browne as the numbers for that camera have fluctuated since its installment. Dispatch will be conducting follow-up on their phone call numbers which appear to be a flaw in the program.

#### *AIM Report Card*

- We are still nowhere near seeing a 25% decrease in burglary, vehicle prowling and vehicle theft throughout Spokane. While we are starting to see a decrease in burglaries, vehicle prowling and vehicle theft numbers continue to increase.

### Prior Week Assessment

#### *Investigations Update*

- Investigations will coordinate with Patrol and Crime Analysis to work on refreshing the Top 10 ROP list and finding five new ROPs to add.
- The Major Crimes Unit is investigating their third homicide of 2010. Officers found 26 year old Securitas Security Officer, [REDACTED] in the alley behind the Pepsi Cola building. The shooter was rendering first aid and CPR to the victim when patrol officers arrived. Sgt. JD Anderson and Ofc. Ron Van Tassel took over CPR until medics arrived. Medics pronounced the victim dead at the scene. Major Crimes detectives responded and are continuing the investigation. At this time, all involved parties have been interviewed and no arrests have been made. Police have learned that security officer [REDACTED] was conducting his rounds in the alley behind the building just before 11pm. A group of people socializing in the common area of 4023 E. Pacific engaged in an argument with [REDACTED]. Words exchanged led to threats, which escalated the argument. [REDACTED] pointed what appeared to be a handgun at the group. One of the members of the group fired several rounds at [REDACTED] striking and killing him. Investigators have recovered the handgun used by the shooter as well as a bb gun, which is a replica of a semi-automatic handgun.

#### *SIU Update*

- SIU purchased stolen guns and subsequently conducted a meet and greet with another subject who agreed to sell them additional guns. SIU contacted the subject on 08/25/10 at a hotel and he jumped out of the second story window. The subject has 12 or 13 felonies from the county already. He is currently in custody and was questioned by SIU.
- SIU has tapped into a heroin dealer. SIU will continue to work on this once they have completed the stolen gun case.



### Patrol Update

- Patrol ran a special on the partying in Indian Trail, but did not observe anything of note.
- Patrol attempted to locate [REDACTED] who appears to be making a reappearance with several incidents reported at the last AIM meeting. Officers were unable to locate [REDACTED] who is difficult to anticipate. There have been no new incidents reported.
- Ofc. Thomas is going to local colleges and has prepared a very informational flyer that is being issued with the students' parking permits regarding vehicle prowling and safety.

### ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- [REDACTED] – Established PC to arrest [REDACTED] for vehicle theft and malicious mischief. Also, talked with Tom Michaud and requested that he be put on as a ROP. [REDACTED] has several entries as of late indicating he is involved in a number of thefts.
- [REDACTED] Tire shop on Trent – Contacted a subject who is willing to provide information regarding [REDACTED] He has seen [REDACTED] with a firearm and selling meth. Spoke with Sgt. Hendren who offered up assistance from SIU.
- [REDACTED] E. Cleveland – Spoke with Ofc. McIntyre regarding this residence. She has information regarding the residence and has gained permission from a neighbor who is willing to allow the use of her residence for surveillance purposes.
- [REDACTED] E. Columbia – Made contact at the residence in an effort to investigate a possible Marijuana grow and a possible stolen Honda. The grow turned out to be two plants, one mature with buds and the other one not. [REDACTED] produced a Medical MJ card. We were unable to locate any stolen vehicles.
- [REDACTED] was sentenced to 90 days in jail and 18 months community custody. Det. Wuthrich will make a request that the community custody be supervised by either Lurch or Bezanson.
- [REDACTED] – Established PC to arrest [REDACTED] for theft of a motor vehicle. [REDACTED] family is prolific criminals. [REDACTED] was recently released from custody and is reportedly using drugs and committing thefts.
- Conducted investigation regarding a vehicle theft/recovery and insurance fraud. Developed suspect information and established PC to arrest [REDACTED].
- [REDACTED] – Interviewed [REDACTED] at jail. [REDACTED] has agreed to give information regarding an unsolved Burglary and possibly identify other Burglaries in the Indian Trail area. Will continue with investigation after crime analysis has provided more detailed information about the Burglaries.

### Crime Trend Debrief

Ryan Shaw provided this week's crime statistics:

- Burglary numbers are the highest that Crime Analysis has said since we began tracking AIM stats. Residential burglaries had the highest increase. Active areas are in West Central and Emerson/Garfield neighborhoods. [REDACTED] W Maxwell has been hit with a couple of commercial burglaries.
- The 91 burglaries this week are spread out throughout the city. Some hotspots are West Central, Hillyard, Shiloh Hills and Lincoln Heights neighborhoods. Some typical MOs are smashed and open windows as well as kicked in doors. Suspects are typically stealing TVs and jewelry, but a lot does depend on the neighborhood. Top 10 ROP [REDACTED] was arrested today. The county is seeing an increase in stolen guns. This is not as evident in the city.



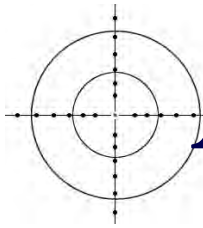
## Meeting Minutes for Wednesday, August 25<sup>th</sup>, 2010

- Vehicle prowling clusters are being seen in the Emerson/Garfield and Logan neighborhoods which could be related to Gonzaga University students beginning their school year. [REDACTED] was arrested for shoplifting and he had stolen property in his possession from some of the prowlings.
- Crime Analysis has seen a rash of malicious mischief incidents. The incidents South were mostly car windows shot by a BB gun. However, there were also some residences that had windows shot out. Conversely, on the north side nearly all were residential or business windows shot out. It is notable that cars/homes also had windows broken by thrown rocks. Many were in the same vicinity of these BB gun incidents, so it is possible they may be related. East Central had highest concentration of activity. However, incidents occurred throughout the South Hill and a few North of the river as well. There were 116 incidents last week compared to the average of 46. There are no solid leads on suspects at this time, but some possible suspect descriptions have been developed.
  - Season Ticket @ [REDACTED] N Howard had window shot out with BB gun on 8/17 @ 2100. Witness described suspect vehicle as Older (approx 1980) Tan Buick w/ brown & white top.
  - Liberty Park Pool @ [REDACTED] S Pittsburg; BM 12-13, 5'00", heavy, came to the pool and started shooting things around 1930-2000. He was kicked out by a lifeguard.
  - [REDACTED] E 5<sup>th</sup> on 8/20 at 2300 complainant observed three teens wearing all black running around parking lot hiding behind cars and could hear popping sounds from BB or airsoft gun.
  - 4<sup>th</sup>/Ray on 8/20 @ 2100; Two BM suspects 16-19; one wore black tank-top & dark shorts w/ white insignia on front; other had thin build. Asked man & woman for a cigarette and then shot man in the shoulder with an air gun 5-8 times.
  - 57<sup>th</sup>/Perry on 8/21 @ 1545; Jogger was running w/ girlfriend, felt sharp pain in his ankle and observed a red mark. Believed he was shot with a BB gun by someone in a passing White SUV.
- [REDACTED] have been arrested for breaking into a pop machine. This is the third time they have been arrested since April. Crime Analysis has seen several coin thefts from car washes and pop machines and in some instances the entire pop machine has been stolen. Crime Analysis is looking into linking up some of these suspects who could possibly be responsible for some of the commercial burglaries as well.
- Top 10 ROP List---approximately four to five of the ROPs are currently in jail and the bar has been lowered on what constitutes being on the Top 10 list since so many are in jail. Crime Analysis will work on refreshing the list and will coordinate with Patrol and Investigations to find five new ROPs for the list.
- There have been some good FIs completed lately with updated addresses on ROPs. Ofc. Aspaas is continuing to verify addresses and notify Crime Analysis so their database can be updated.
- Larry Stevens noted that Cheryl Tofsrud from Pre-Trial is interested in getting ROP information. Larry has been providing her that. Prosecutor Sargent has also asked for updated ROP information to pass along to the judges. Chief Kirkpatrick took the ROP information to the Mayor who will be addressing the judges on this issue.

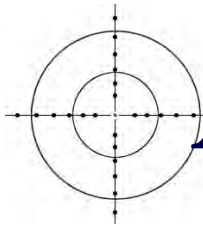

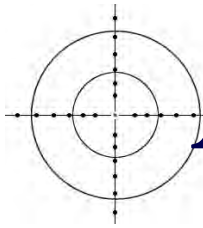

- [REDACTED] N. Regal---[REDACTED] live at the location. Officer Kester developed information that there has been a lot of traffic to the location and a possible grow in the basement. Information forwarded to SIU.
- Monroe Street Bridge---Officers Kernkamp, Spolski, and Kester responded and help investigate a suicide where a man jumped off of the bridge.
- [REDACTED] N. Chestnut---Home invasion burglary/robbery at the location. Four suspects broke into the location and assaulted the homeowner who sustained a "significant" head injury per AMR. Unknown motive for the crime, but the house was ransacked and the victim ([REDACTED]) thought he was going to be killed in the attack.
- [REDACTED] N. Fleming---38-yr-old female [REDACTED] was found deceased in a camper at the location. Suspected overdose. Investigated by Ofc. Madsen.



- Shiloh Hills-- [redacted] residence at [redacted] E Vicksburg was burglarized. [redacted] suspected [redacted] Officer Green spoke to some family and believes that [redacted] are burglary suspects in the area. One witness believes that he saw them pawing stolen items.

### Team 14 – Graveyard Shift

- [redacted] W NW Blvd [redacted] lives at location and is having problems with neighbors. She screamed racial slurs (Whitey) at neighbors stemming from a parking dispute. During the dispute, she grabbed a bar and threatened a neighbor, who then sprayed her with pepper spray in self defense.
- [redacted] E Augusta – continual party/disorderly house. This week call there for a fight where a female was knocked unconscious and dragged into the house. No cooperation with occupants....again.
- [redacted] N Wall – Received this address from NRO. This week called to possible vehicle theft from location. Contacted were [redacted] and [redacted] Both were extremely nervous upon contact, but no PC for charges were developed. NRO flagged house as drug house.
- [redacted] W Boone and [redacted] W Boone – Ongoing neighbor dispute. Officers were called out there three times in one night. [redacted] who both reside at [redacted] There is a history of fighting between neighbors. Last night PC was developed on [redacted] for City Assault and Burglary 1<sup>st</sup> Degree respectively. Expect further calls for service and problems between these neighbors.

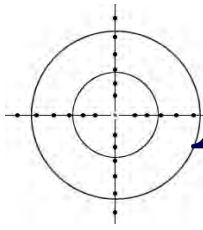
### SOUTH SIDE

#### Team 3 – Day Shift

- On 08/18/10, Officer Kirby responded to a call of a subject attempting to pass a forged check at the Washington Trust Bank at 2<sup>nd</sup> and Post. The suspect, [redacted] left his ID at the bank. The suspect was located in the alley approx. a block away. He tried to hide but was located in the basement of the church that caters to the homeless behind Crosswalk. Officer Kirby was able to contact the business the check was from. It was discovered they had 50 checks stolen. Officer Kirby was able to recover three more checks from the suspect. Officer Kirby attempted to locate where the suspect lived. He checked several motels and addresses but couldn't find where he last stayed. Officer Kirby was going to write a search warrant for [redacted] residence. [redacted] didn't give a correct address. While we were at the scene Officer Watson was contacted by another person. He stated [redacted] was the suspect in a fraud against him. [redacted] had been making this victim give him money weekly. The victim was elderly and it appears he was being fleeced by the suspect. The victim had made a report with the police approx a week ago. Elderly services were contacted and they were going to contact him on Monday or Tuesday. An additional was done tying [redacted] name with the original report for follow up by detectives.
- On 08/22/10, Officer Kirby arrested [redacted] in the downtown area. [redacted] had the stolen money taken out of a couple of different pay boxes. He had also been trespassed from Diamond parking lots for prior arrests for theft.
- On 08/23/10, the team had six people. Officer Kirby took out the Tahoe. The suspect in a triple homicide out of Lewis County was possible in the Spokane area. His cell phone had "pinged" from the location of 3<sup>rd</sup> and Monroe. We used the Tahoe to check motel and hotel parking lots for the suspect vehicle. We were unable to locate where the suspect was staying.

#### Team 7 – Swing Shift

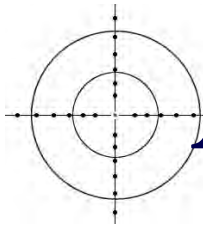
- Officers investigated a drug case from a Morning Star Ranch halfway house. Ofc. Howe & Kennedy unraveled a twisted and confusing case. Juveniles at the facility are probably responsible for a great deal of night time crime (theft, vehicle prowling, drugs, etc.) in the Lincoln Heights area.



- Ofc. Denton developed PC for [REDACTED] for 1<sup>st</sup> degree burglary. The suspect was at Excelsior, so Denton went there for follow-up. Staff at Excelsior refused to allow officers to go to the suspect's room to arrest him in spite of being warned that he would flee. Staff went to bring [REDACTED] out to be arrested and he fled. [REDACTED] climbed an 8 foot fence and is still at large.
- Officers responded to 2nd/Freya on a citizen complaint of a panhandler. The subject was located and had five warrants for his arrest (panhandling, etc charges).
- The City of Spokane Valley is enacting a Panhandling Ordinance that is very tough. Transients are already inquiring in town about it. It will most likely push transients and panhandlers into Spokane. The Spokane Panhandling Ordinance is very limited in its scope and allows a great deal of nuisance behavior to occur without criminal penalty. It is time to evaluate the ordinance with input from line level police and businesses. The local businesses are very influenced by the behavior and presence of transients and panhandlers.
- Officers are noticing several new prostitutes working the East Sprague corridor.
- Officers assisted Lewis County in attempting to locate a homicide suspect. Cell phone pings put him in Spokane. Officers were not able to locate him. They did check location(s) for video.
- Officers responded to a call of a found bone. They took it to SHMC and were unable to id it. The item was placed on property.

### Team 11 – Power Shift

- This week, Team 11 was down to four officers most of the week.
- Officers responded to several calls at downtown bars of fights and assaults.
- Officers arrested [REDACTED], for a DOC escape warrant at 1st and Hatch.
- Officers identified a new car driven by [REDACTED]
- Officers worked an emphasis on E. Sprague and did two FIs with five different people. Officers identified a first time prostitute making her debut. Officers also wrote a ticket for the male transporting the prostitutes to and from work.
- Officers have contacted groups of teens who seem to use the City Hall parking lot as a place to meet, hang out, and generally loiter at night. All those who have been contacted have been more than cooperative. Officers will continue to follow up on the matter.
- Officers have taken three different calls involving a BB gun. They all appear to be related. On Thursday 08/19, officers took a call of an STA Bus that was shot at in the area of 5th/Haven. The bus was shot eight times along the driver's side as the bus traveled westbound. On Friday 08/20, officers contacted a vehicle in the same general area that appeared to have the window broken out. On Saturday 08/21, officers took a call of a person shot with a BB gun in the area of 57th/Perry. The male was running on 57th and was shot in the left ankle. He could not provide any suspect information and stated that after he was shot, a white SUV (unknown make/plate) drove by him. Officers have not been able to develop any suspect information for any of the incidents.
- Officers searched and cleared with a K-9 continual nuisance property [REDACTED] W. 5<sup>th</sup>. This address, along with [REDACTED] W. 5<sup>th</sup> are abandoned houses and attract quite a bit of criminal activity. A few weeks ago, a female was lured into one of these addresses and raped. Referred on to the NRO.

## 2010 Collision Costs

This section was added to track the costs of fixing and/or replacing SPD Fleet due to collisions involving SPD vehicles. Data will be updated each month as new collisions occur and previous incidents' data becomes available (some collisions involve Risk Management and this may take several months to receive this data).

### **The following includes details from January to August 2010<sup>1</sup>:**

There were 27 reports of collisions or property damage involving SPD vehicles. Of these, 14 were Preventable, 7 were Non-Preventable, and 6 involved Legal Intervention.<sup>1</sup>

Total cost to date is \$122,395.00. Of this total, \$29,001.81 was Preventable, \$52,637.57 was Non-Preventable, and \$40,755.62 was for Legal Intervention.

This total includes the replacement cost for two vehicles, both estimated at \$40,000 to replace. One was deemed Non-Preventable (citizen ran red light and hit SPD vehicle) and the other was for Legal Intervention (used to PIT a vehicle in a pursuit). Adjusted to exclude these estimated totals, cost for Non-Preventable is \$12,637.57 and cost for Legal Intervention is \$755.62.

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<sup>1</sup> Data is the same as July report; though there were two known officer involved collisions in August, the investigations are not complete and therefore are not reported.

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<sup>1</sup> IA Terminology: Preventable – Officer at fault; Non-Preventable – Officer not at fault; Legal Intervention – Intentional use of a patrol car to end a pursuit.

Typically, K9 deployments, Taser applications, and neck restraints will not occur in the same incident; however this does occur on occasion.

## **AUGUST DEBRIEF OF INCIDENTS**

### **K-9 DEPLOYMENTS**

Incident #1 – The call started as a hit and run and later the suspect and the female occupant of the vehicle were physically fighting. The suspect also assaulted two subjects who attempted to separate the two. The suspect fled on foot after he observed the officer driving a marked unit with emergency lights approach him. The officer deployed his K9 and the suspect grabbed the dog and lifted his front legs off the ground. The suspect continued to resist as the officer moved the suspect into a prone position using a modified arm bar. The K9 made contact with the suspect on his right thigh and he stopped resisting. The dog released his contact immediately.

Incident #2 – An officer observed a bicycle violation and the suspect matched the description of a wanted suspect who had a felony warrant for Escape. As the officer attempted to make contact with the suspect for the bicycle violations and to verify the suspect's identity, the suspect attempted to flee on his bicycle. The officer gave multiple verbal commands for the suspect to stop through his open window. These commands were accompanied by his patrol car lights, siren and air horn. This went on for several blocks and the suspect refused to comply. The K-9 was deployed and pursued the suspect. The K-9 contacted the suspect on the left leg, pulling him from the bicycle. The K-9 was knocked of the initial contact, but re-contacted the suspect's sweatshirt, not his person. The officer was then able to take the suspect to the ground.

Incident #3 – The suspect was wanted for two outstanding misdemeanor warrants and had been involved in an altercation with another subject. The suspect had fled on foot into a dark alley and into the bushes when officers attempted to make contact. It was clear that the suspect would return to the residence if he was not arrested and possible assault the victim again. Officers made multiple announcements to the suspect, giving him ample time to surrender. The K-9 was deployed and contacted the suspect on the upper right arm. Officers were able to take the suspect into custody.

### **TASER APPLICATIONS**

Incident #1 – The male was a suspect in a rape and fled from police who pursued him on foot. The suspect advanced on an officer with his fists clenched and raised. The suspect was told to lay down on the ground and not to resist. The suspect continued advancing on the officer who then fired his Taser probes in self defense. The officer was alone at this point. A second officer arrived on scene and handcuffed the suspect.

Incident #2 – Suspect was advised he was under arrest after assaulting family members. He refused to comply with officers and tensed his arms and clenched his fists. One officer applied a Level 1 LVNR and the suspect was able to turn out of it and was taken to the floor. That officer then applied a drive stun with his Taser to the suspect's back, but the suspect continued fighting with officers. A second officer who was underneath the suspect on the floor also applied a Level 1 LVNR and attempted to transition to a Level 2, but was unable to fully apply the Level 2 restraint due to his positioning. The first officer applied a second drive stun to the suspect's chest area allowing officers to control and arrest the suspect.

Incident #3 – At the time of police contact, the suspect was actively participating in a physical fight at a bar and had already assaulted two people. The responding officer attempted to arrest him for the assault and the suspect physically resisted. The suspect struck the officer several times with his elbows during the contact, striking him on the chest just below his neck. The officer pushed the suspect into a corner and accessed his Taser. The suspect clenched his fists and took a bladed boxer's stance while yelling profanities at the officer. The officer deployed his Taser striking him on his lower front torso. Other officers arrived on scene and assisted in taking the suspect into custody. At the time of the initial contact, only one officer was on scene. There was a large group of irate males surrounding the officer and yelling at him. This officer was confronted with a very dangerous situation and he used appropriate techniques to diffuse the situation.

Incident #4 – Officers responded to the train tracks regarding an individual who was trespassing and attempting to climb on a train. Officers contacted the subject on the train tracks. The subject, who was walking towards the officer, briefly turned around and began running toward the train engine, then resumed walking towards the officer. The officer advised him he was under arrest and told him to stop. The subject raised his arms in a threatening manner and continued advancing on the officer. He was given several orders to stop and did not comply. The

officer drew his Taser and fired the probes which struck the subject in the chest and abdomen. The subject continually resisted and pushed himself onto his side and then his back. The officer applied one drive stun with the Taser which allowed officers to apply handcuffs without further incident.

Incident #5 – Officers responded to assist DOC officers in arresting a disorderly suspect, who was immediately uncooperative. The suspect took a fighting stance toward officers. One officer attempted physical control of the suspect, but the suspect broke free of him and drew back to swing at the officer. A second officer, who anticipated the suspect's assaultive behavior, already had his Taser drawn and deployed the Taser probes. This instantly incapacitated the suspect and officers were able to handcuff him without incident.

### **LATERAL VASCULAR NECK RESTRAINTS**

Incident #1 – The male was a suspect in a DV assault and ran from police. One officer caught the suspect who continued to resist. The suspect was taken to the ground and continued to resist. The officer applied a Level 1 LVNR which allowed officers to take the suspect into custody.

Incident #2 – See summary of Taser Application Incident #2 above.

### ***Use of Force Definitions***

#### **K-9 Deployments**

*In many instances, it is much safer for officers to search for suspects utilizing a K-9. Fleeing suspects demonstrate that they are willing to actively avoid capture and often have a plethora of hiding places in which to secrete themselves. The suspects have not been searched and it is unknown whether they possess weapons which could be used to ambush officers. The K-9s are able to locate suspects with much less risk to responding officers. The dog's sense of smell is also much more reliable than the officers' visual ability to conduct searches. The dogs prevent potential deadly force situations thereby making it safer for both officer and suspect.*

#### **Taser Applications and Lateral Vascular Neck Restraints**

*Taser applications and lateral vascular neck restraints are valuable tactics for officers to use when confronted with a resistive subject. Both tactics can prevent long, drawn out physical altercations which help to avoid excited delirium possibilities. When properly applied, the neck restraint and the Taser can end a fight quickly and make the apprehension much swifter: the longer the fight, the more potential for injuries to both officer and suspect as well as the possibility of excited delirium. Both tactics are likely to cause little to no injury and the recovery is quick when done.*

*The Taser can be applied in two ways; the drive stun, which is applied directly to the skin, or firing the probes, which will connect with a subject at a distance. There are two levels of neck restraints; Level 1 allows the officer to control the suspect and Level 2 allows the officer to render the subject momentarily unconscious giving officers several seconds to take the suspect into custody without further incident. Officers must take many things into consideration when determining whether to use a drive stun vs. firing the Taser or a Level 1 vs. Level 2 neck restraint. Severity of the crime, the threat the suspect poses and whether or not the suspect is actively resisting (assaultive or active resistance) – these questions are based on if a reasonable officer would feel the force used was appropriate.*
