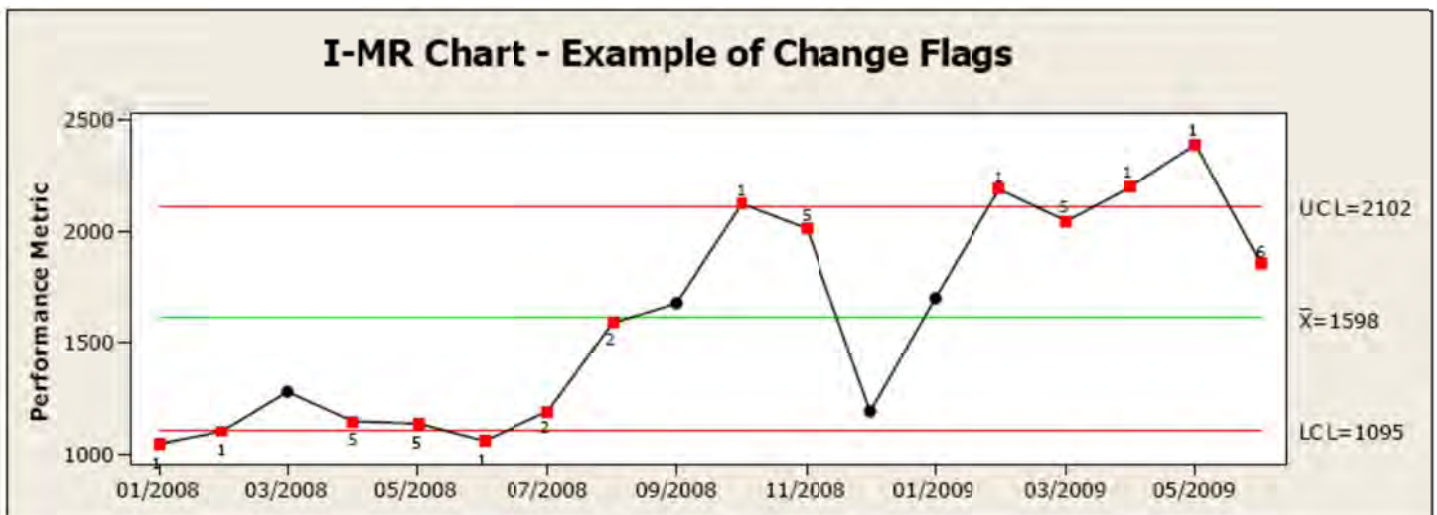

AIM Statistical Analysis for September 2010

Every month, the performance metrics for the various units of SPD will be analyzed to determine if there has been any statistical change in performance. This analysis will be conducted using software¹; if a unit's metrics show no change, it will simply be noted there was no change. However, if a change was noted, the graph will be attached along with a brief description of the metric in question. If a reason for the change is known, it will be noted. If the reason for change is unknown, further follow-up will be needed; results of that follow-up will be published the following month.

Analysis Interpretation

The statistical software uses graphs to indicate when a statistical change has occurred. It flags that change with a red box and a corresponding number. Please use the following graph as reference for a translation of the various numbers and what they mean.



The green line indicates the average over the time frame displayed for the data set being measured. The two red lines represent three standard deviations both below and above the average. It is normal to have fluctuation over time; in general, a single data point within three standard deviations would be considered normal change (unless otherwise indicated).

Please reference the following for an explanation of what the different numbered flags represent:

1. One data point over three standard deviations from the average;
2. Seven data points in a row on one side of average (over or under);
3. Six data points in a row, either increasing or decreasing;
4. Fourteen data points, alternating up and down;
5. Two out of three data points in a row are above/below two standard deviations from average;
6. Four out of five data points in a row are above/below one standard deviation from average;
7. Fifteen data points in a row within one standard deviation from average;
8. Eight data points in a row above/below one standard deviation from average.

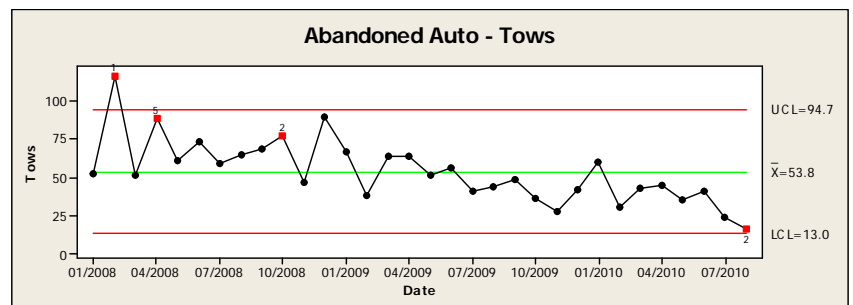

No change in performance metrics

Follow-up from the August 2010 report on *Tows* (see graph to right) revealed several possible reasons for the declining trend since 2008. First reason was due to the late 2007 ordinance that allowed vehicles to be towed if tags were expired more than 45 days. The unit towed more vehicles in early 2008 in response to this ordinance until citizens appropriately altered their behavior. Additionally, scrap metal prices were at historical highs recently, causing more people to turn their vehicles in for scrap rather than abandoning them. Finally, with extended absence in this unit in July and August 2010, the most recent months' below average numbers also created a continuing decline that should rebound in September. No further explanation is necessary.

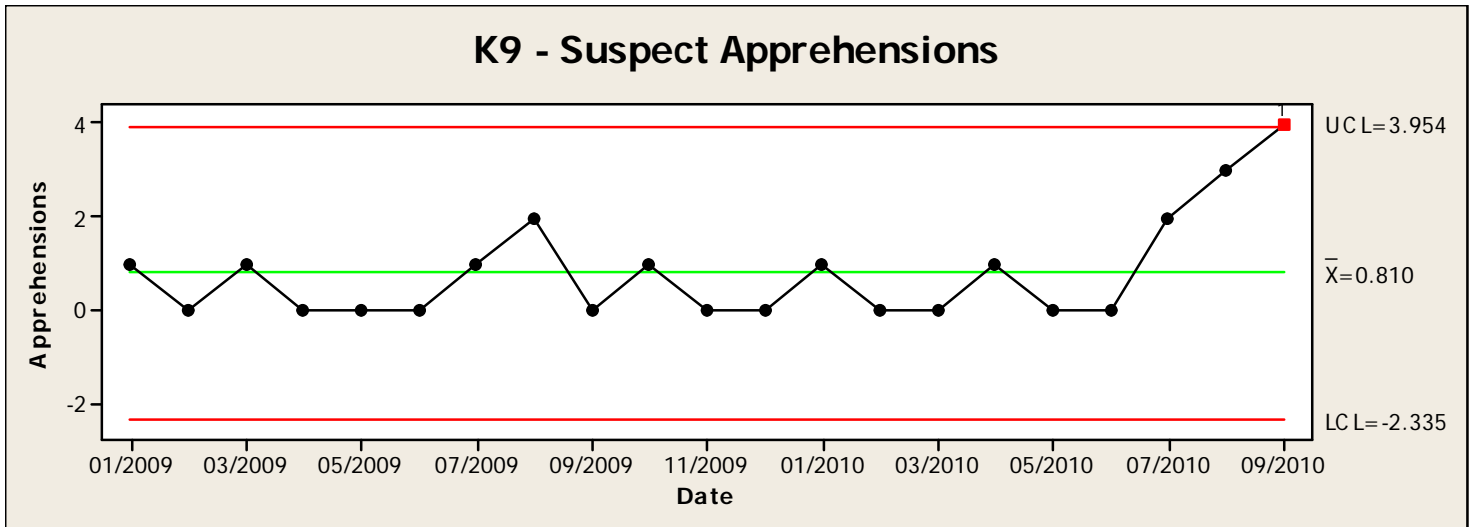

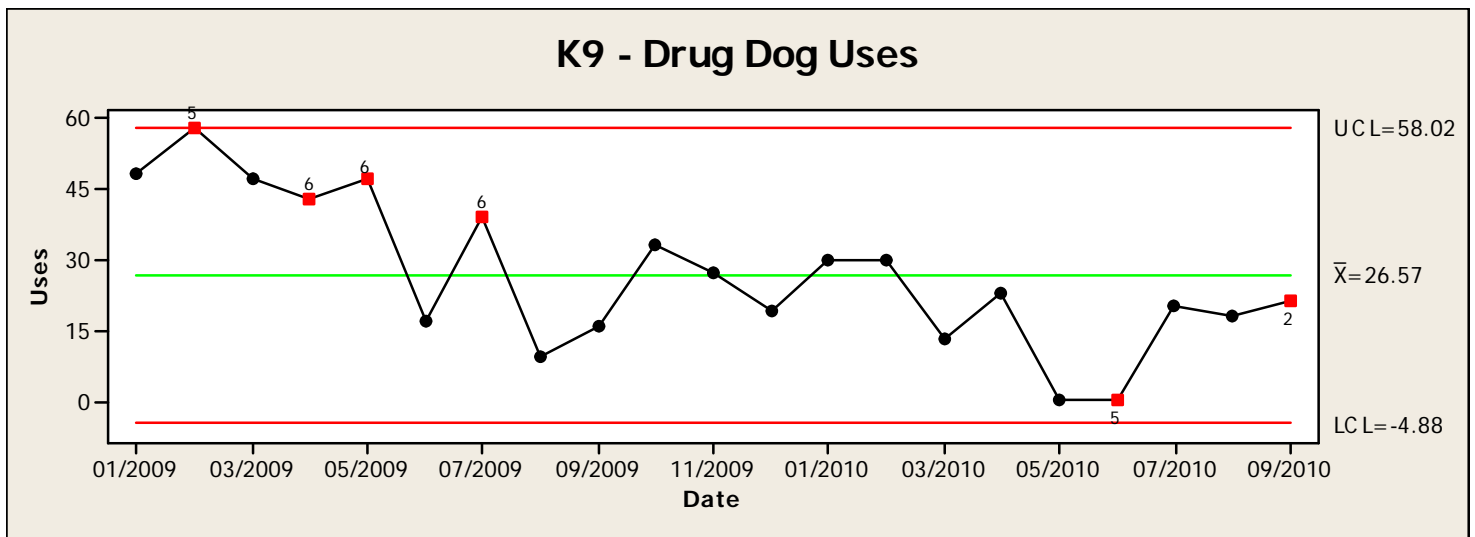
There were several changes in performance metrics for this unit since data has not been analyzed since March 2010. Please see the charts on the following pages for an explanation of the

findings for the metrics with anomalies. The first metric with an anomaly is *Suspect Apprehensions*, which was three standard deviations above average for September. The prior two months were also above average; further explanation is necessary.



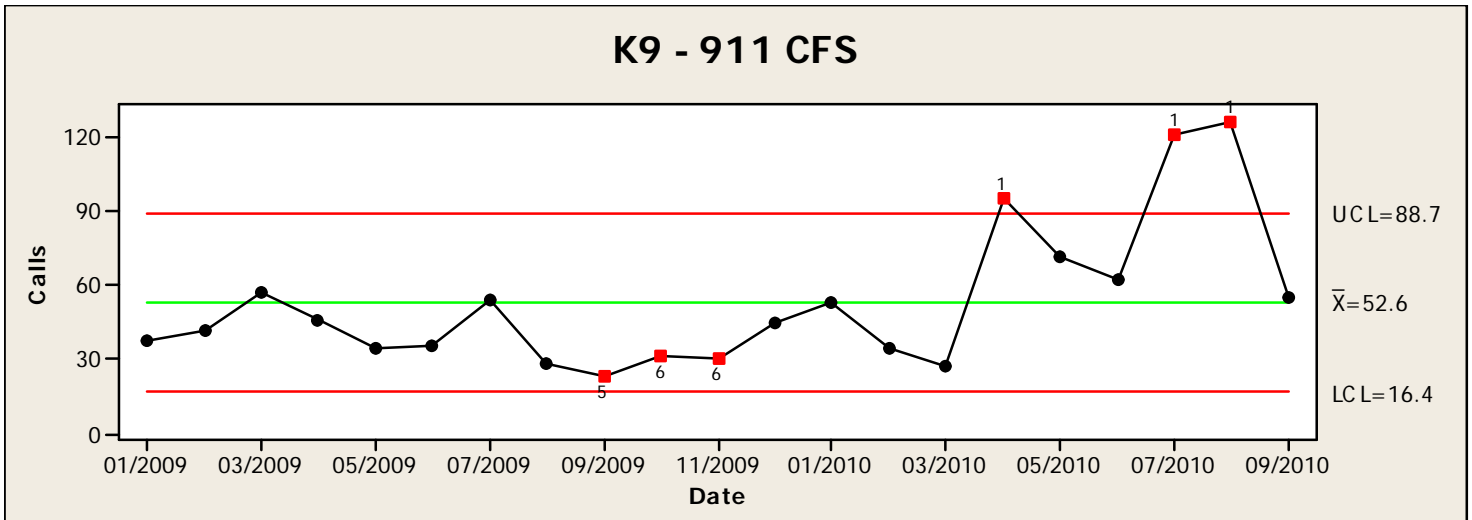
Also showing statistical anomalies was *Drug Dog Uses*, with two flags. The June 2010 flag indicates the May and June data were both two standard deviations below average. The September 2010 flag indicates the prior eight months were all below average. The May and June data can be explained by absence in the drug dog unit; both handlers were in the field less than a quarter of working days. As for the overall decrease, law changes in April 2009 have impacted the use of the drug dogs. Average use has declined from over 40 uses a month to less than 30. No further explanation is necessary.



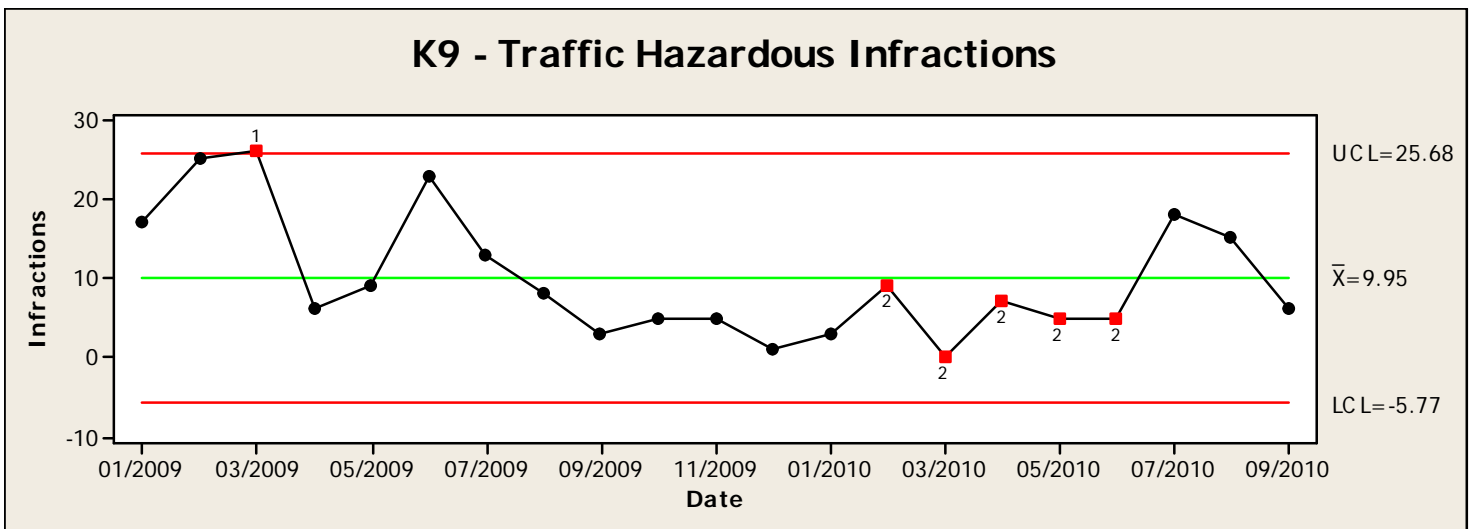
For *911 CFS* (please see graph on following page), there were statistical flags for the July and August 2010 data indicating both months were more than three standard deviations above average. Due to extended leave from injury/illness in Patrol, K9 officers have been pressed into service, handling more 911 calls as primary responders rather than maintaining their primary

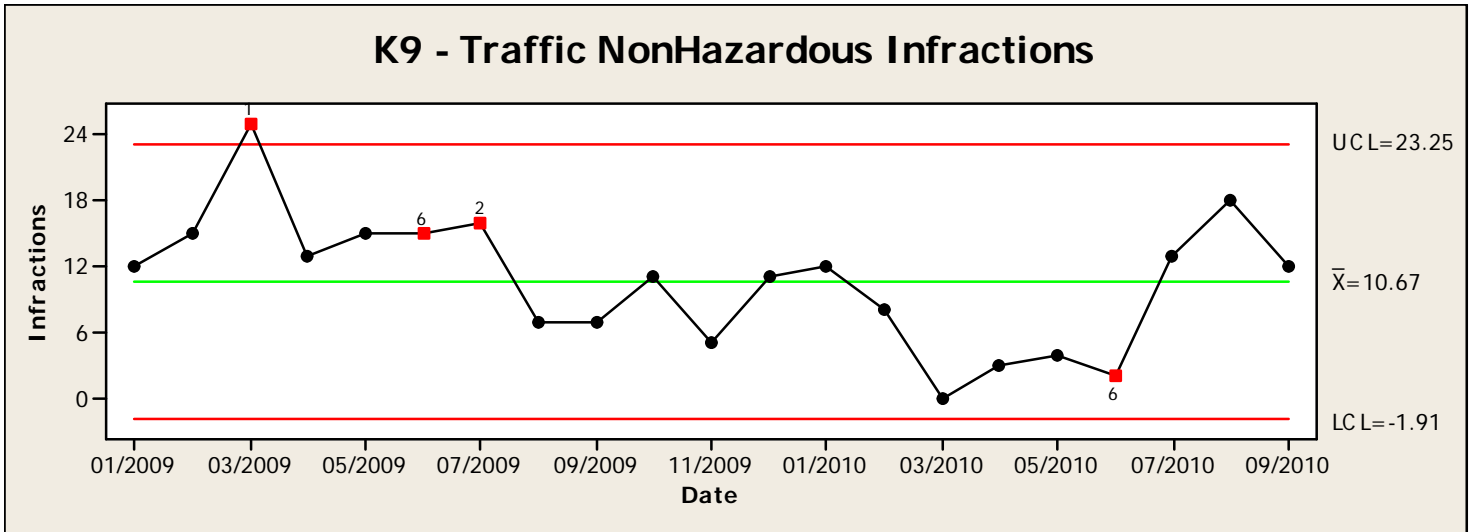
duties as K9 officers. The data has returned to average as of September and no further explanation is necessary.



The final two metrics with anomalies will be addresses together: *Traffic Hazardous* and *Non Hazardous Infractions*. *Traffic Hazardous Infractions* shows the August 2009 through June 2010 data was all below average. For *Non Hazardous Infractions* (please see graph on following page), the flag indicates the March through June 2010 is at least one standard deviation below average. Traffic enforcement is not the primary responsibility of K9 officers; in fact, the average for a month is less than twenty infractions (both hazardous and non-hazardous) for the entire team. As the K9 unit has been pulled into service to support Patrol shortages this year due to restrictions on overtime funding, they would have even less time for self-initiated activity such as traffic enforcement. As such, no further explanation is necessary.



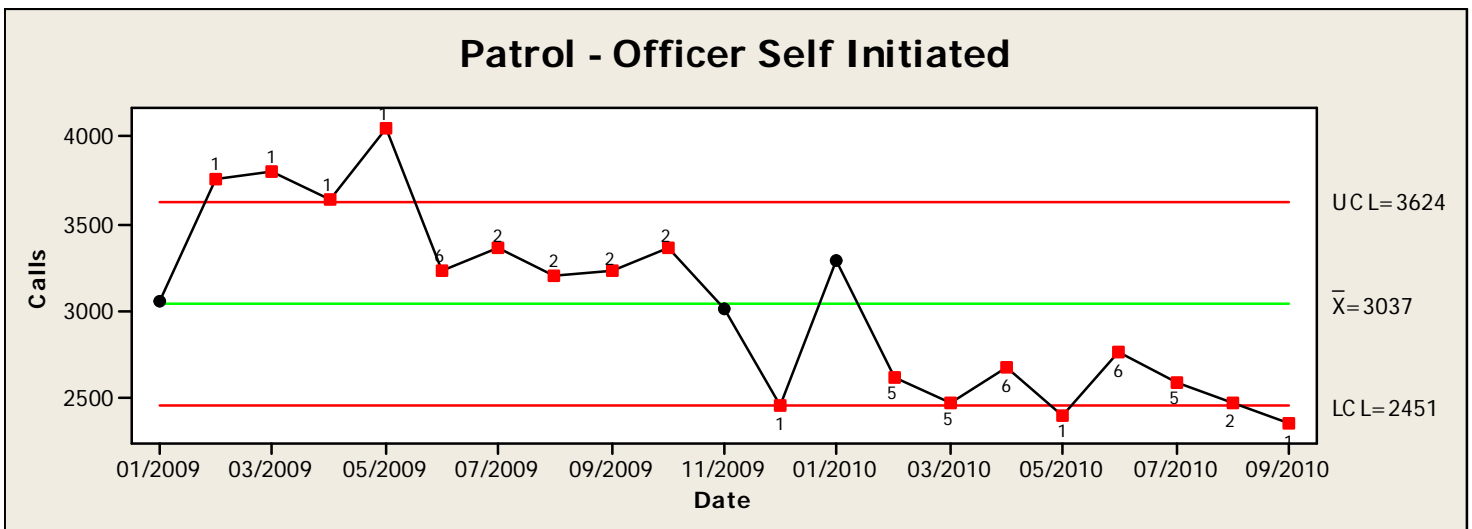

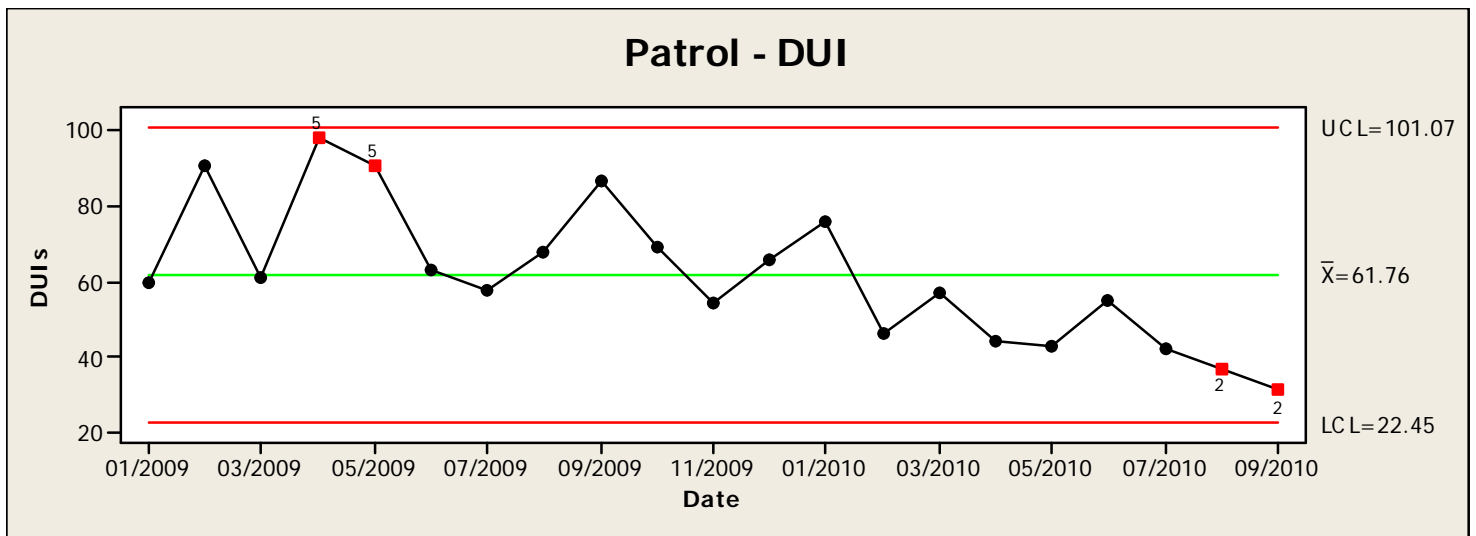
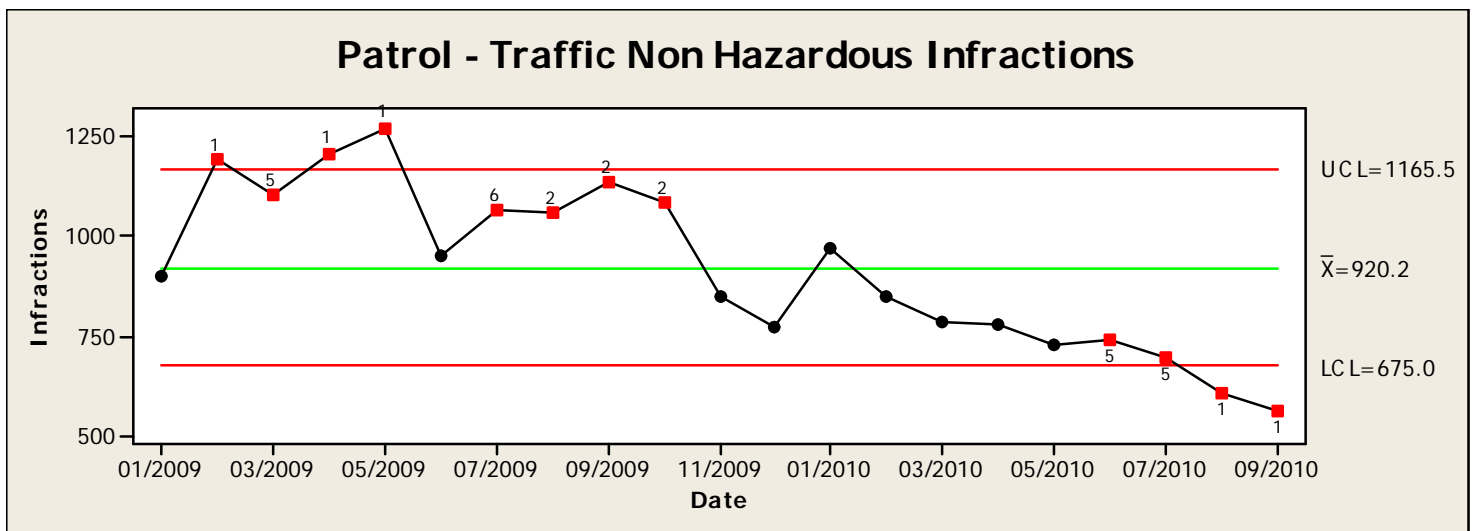
Patrol

There are several metrics for this unit with anomalies, many of which have been addressed in recent prior reports. However, as the trend continues, it deserves to be addressed. The first is *Officer Self-Initiated Calls*, which has been well below average for all of 2010. The September 2010 flag indicates that month was at least three standard deviations below average. The shortages in Patrol have lessened over the summer due to officers returning from extended absence, so it was expected this trend would have reversed as more officers were available to respond to 911 calls from citizens. However, this did not occur. This *could* be influenced by recent policy changes at the Communications Center that now require officers to handle more legwork on their own for 911 calls, limiting their availability for self-initiated activity. As this policy was put into place in mid-September, for now we will continue to monitor and analyze this trend to see if there is a correlation. For now, no further explanation is necessary.



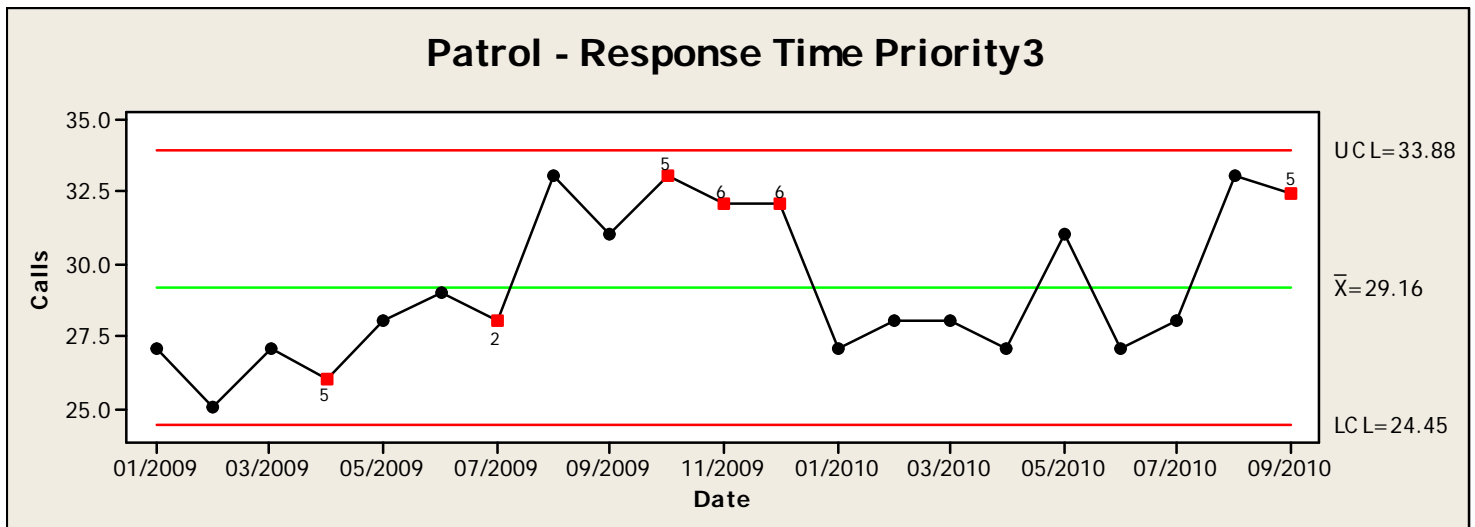

The next two performance metrics are related to Self-Initiated Activity and will be addressed together: *Traffic Non Hazardous Infractions* and *DUI*. Most self-initiated activity is in regards to investigating suspicious behavior or other observed criminal activity. Keeping citizens safe from being crime victims is a primary concern of officers. As such, with the continued decrease in availability, officers have had to prioritize their discretionary time. *Non-Hazardous Infractions* have been below average all year and have been three standard deviations below average for the last two months. These types of infractions are low priority, and though they generate revenue, it is reasonable to sacrifice this type of infraction for the hazardous ones, which are infractions more likely to endanger citizens. As for *DUI*, the flags indicate the February through September 2010 data is all below average. This continued declining trend can also be attributed to lack of availability; it will be monitored in coming months to determine the effect of the policy changes at the Communications Center on these types of self-initiated activity. At this time, however, no further explanation is necessary on either of these metrics.

For *Response Time Priority 3* calls, analysis reveals the August and September 2010 is at least two standard deviations above average. Priority 3 calls are those calls that are non-emergency; a cold burglary call, for example, where the complainant is sure the suspect is gone and a very low threat to citizen safety exists. Reasons for this increase in response time to priority 3 calls appear to be due to an increase in the number of priority 1 and 2 calls, which are emergency calls that need immediate response. In 2010, the growth of priority 3 calls for the third quarter over the yearly average is only four percent, while there is seventeen percent growth for the priority 1 and 2 calls. This suggests that the reason for the increase in response time to priority 3s is due to more urgent calls being responded to first. We will analyze this increase in priority 1 and 2 for next month.



No follow-up from prior month; follow-up on *Response Time Priority 3* and related data is needed and will be completed by the Planning Unit.

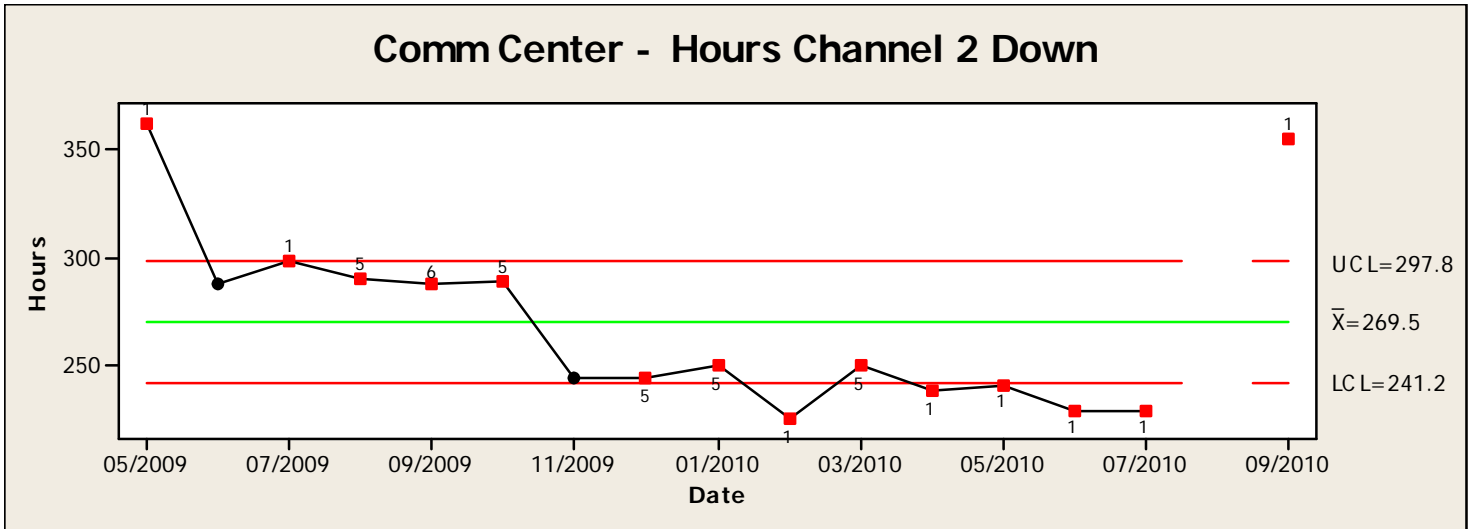

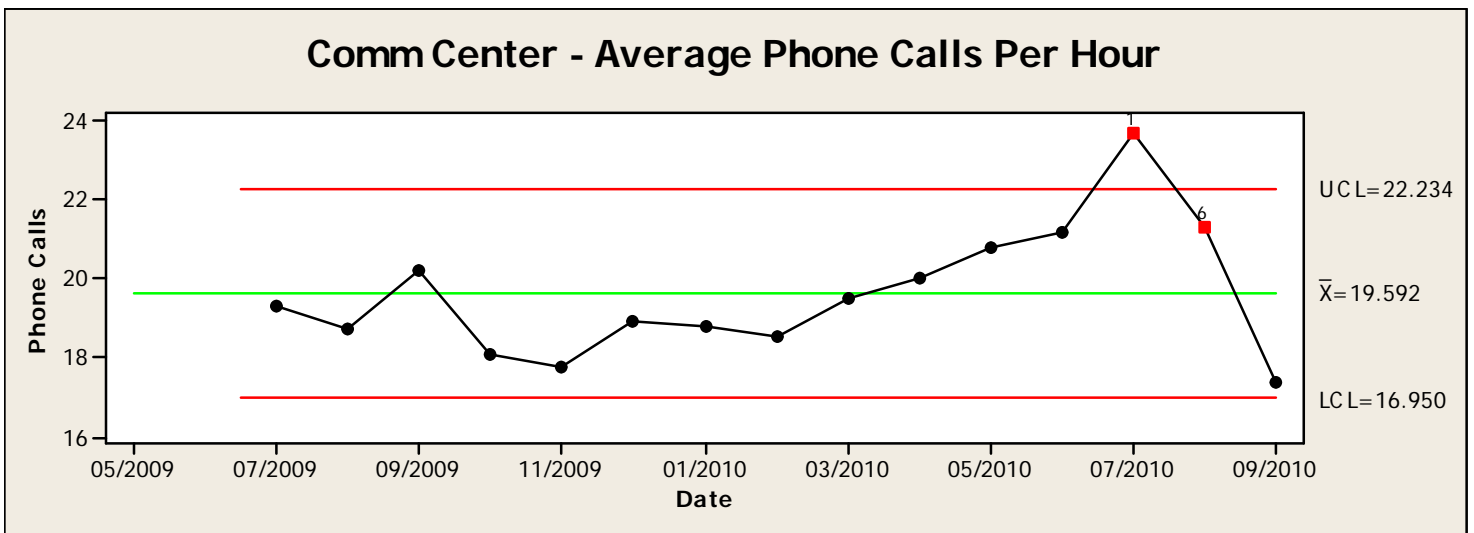

Communications Center

There were two metrics for this unit with statistical anomalies. The first is *Hours Channel 2 Down*. Channel 2 is known as the data channel and is a secondary channel to the two primary channels for radio traffic. The September 2010 data is well over three standard deviations above average, causing other flags for previous months (please note the gap for August 2010 is because no data was submitted for that month). Due to overtime restrictions at the Communications Center, this channel is only active as staffing allows. There was less overtime used in September to keep the channel up; no further explanation is necessary.



A new metric for this unit is the *Average Phone Calls Per Hour*, which is a subset of the Total Phone Calls metric (see Appendix A for a full breakdown of performance metrics). Analysis of this metric shows the May through August 2010 was at least one standard deviation above average with July three standard deviations above average. Policy changes that went into effect mid-September at the Communications Center now restrict phone calls, and as such, the September 2010 data has dropped to almost three standard deviations below average. It is expected this average will continue to drop in coming months. No further explanation is necessary.

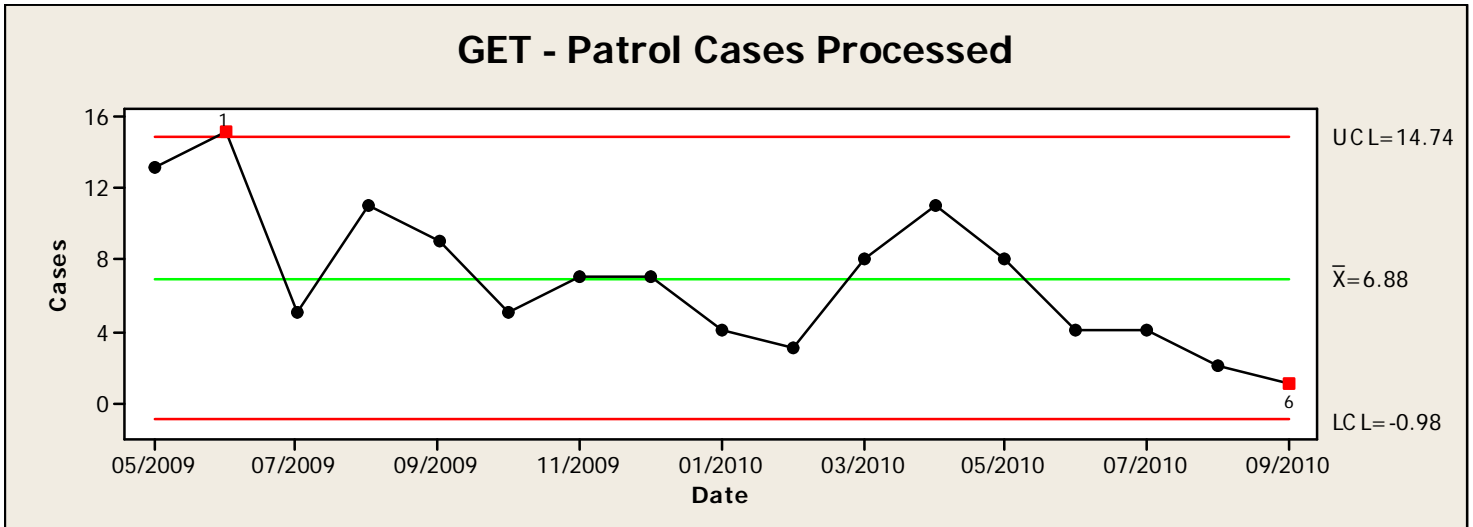

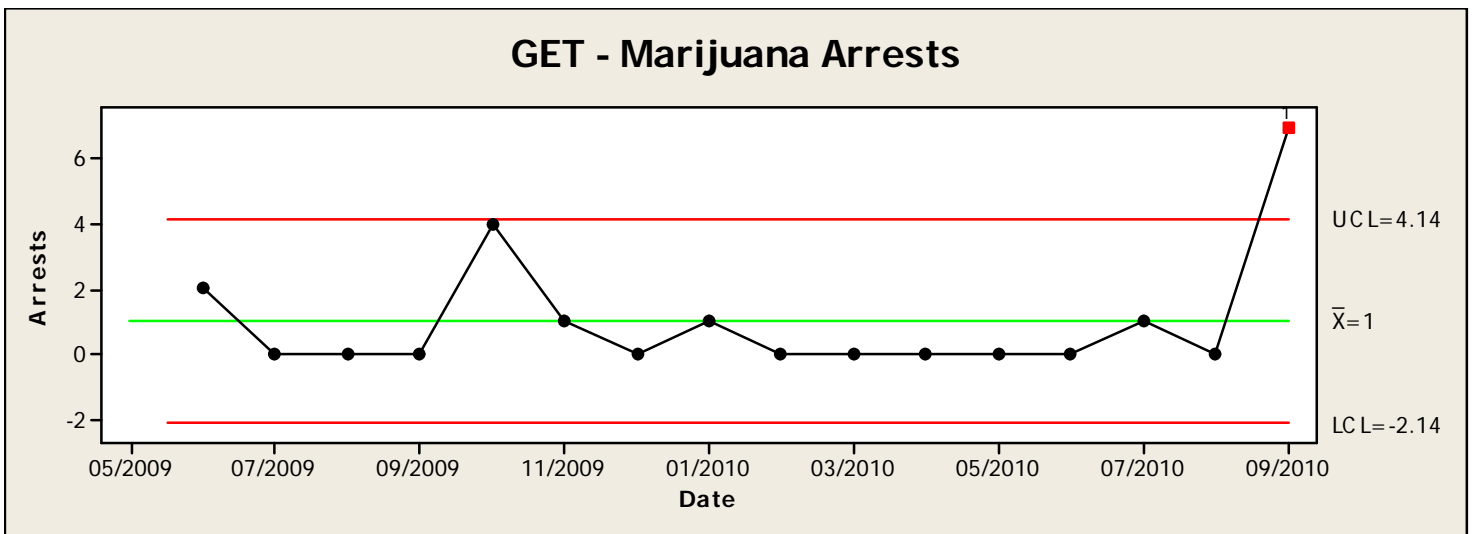

Gang Enforcement Team

Several performance metrics for this unit have statistical anomalies. The first, *Patrol Cases Processed*, shows the June through September 2010 data is at least one standard deviation below average. Due to grant funding, four officers were assigned to the unit for the last several years. However, the grant expired in June 2010 and two of the four officers were reassigned to Patrol. This drop in resources means fewer cases can be processed; no further explanation is necessary.

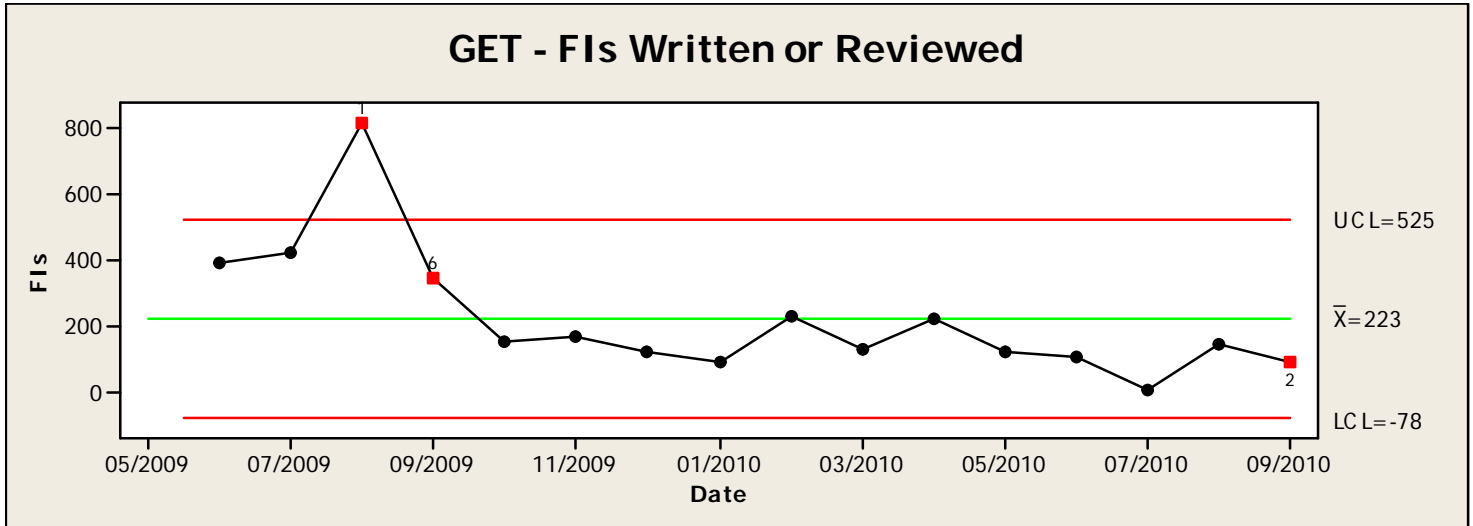


The next metric with an anomaly is *Marijuana Arrests*, which was more than three standard deviations above average for September 2010. As has been discussed in prior AIM reports, the nature of investigations in proactive units like GET and SIU means investigators follow leads as they develop. When a large case is resolved, it will result in one-time above average arrests. No further explanation is necessary.

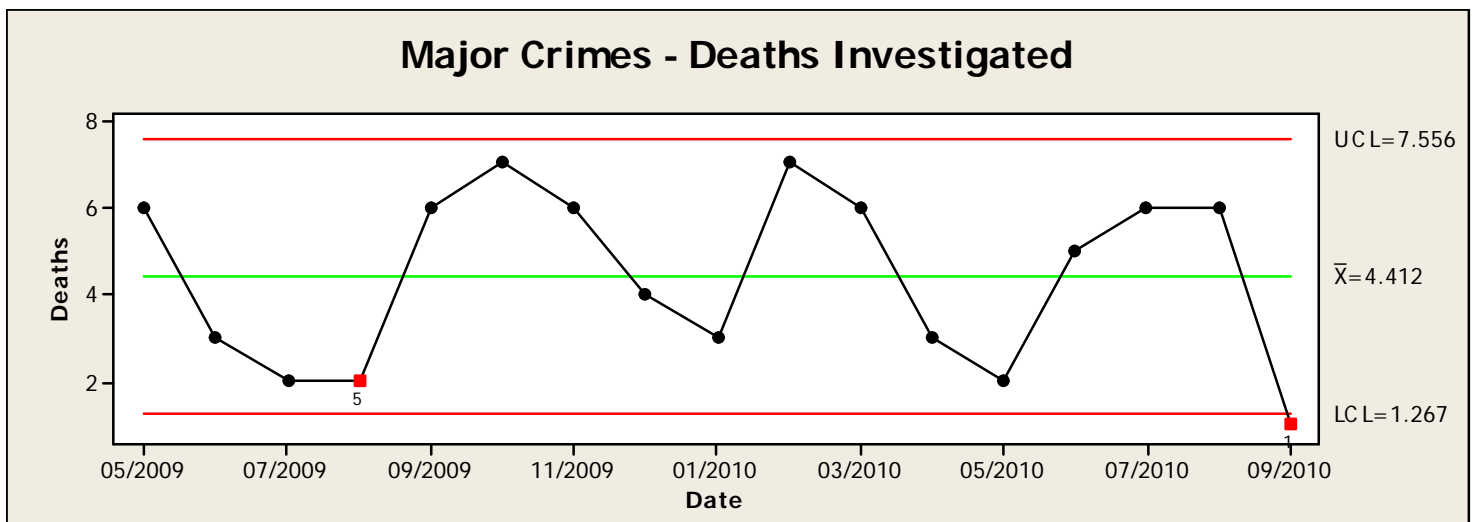
The final metric with anomalies is *FIs Written or Reviewed*, which has been below average since February 2010. As was explained in the December 2009 AIM report, there was a backlog of both reports and FIs in the summer of 2009. Therefore, that dataset was actually above average and the current data should actually be considered normal. No further explanation is necessary.

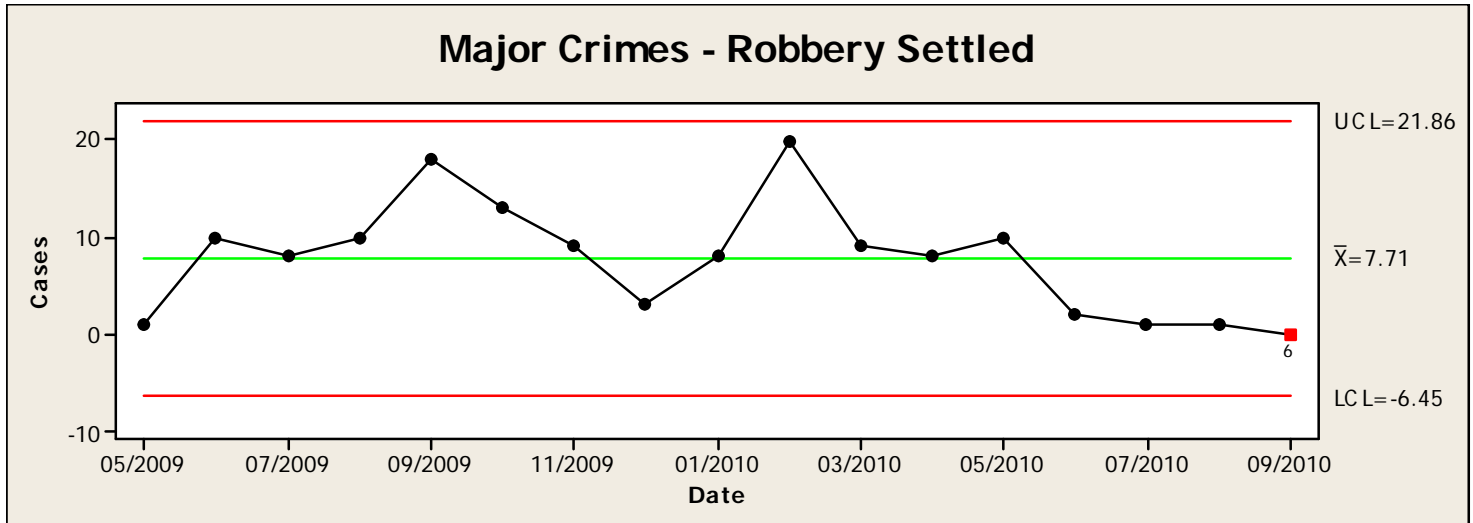
Major Crimes

The *Deaths Investigated* performance metric has two anomalies; the first is that the September 2010 data was three standard deviations below average. This does not need further explanation; as has been discussed in prior reports, these types of deaths (unattended, suicide, etc.) cannot be predicted, as such, when less are reported, less will be investigated. The other anomaly, however, is the apparent four-month cyclical pattern to these investigations. As can be seen on the graph below, about every four months investigations peak and then trend down for three months. The *Deaths Reported* metric looks similar, and at this time, further explanation is not necessary.

Another metric with anomalies for Major Crimes is *Robbery Settled*. Analysis shows the June through September 2010 data was all at least one standard deviation below average. For this same time frame, there was an increase in the metric for *Robbery Suspended*, though that fell within normal ranges. However, this does indicate more robbery investigations have been suspended rather than solved during this time. This is most likely due to the increase in strong-arm robberies with low solvability in the spring and early summer. Unless this trend continues, no further explanation is necessary.

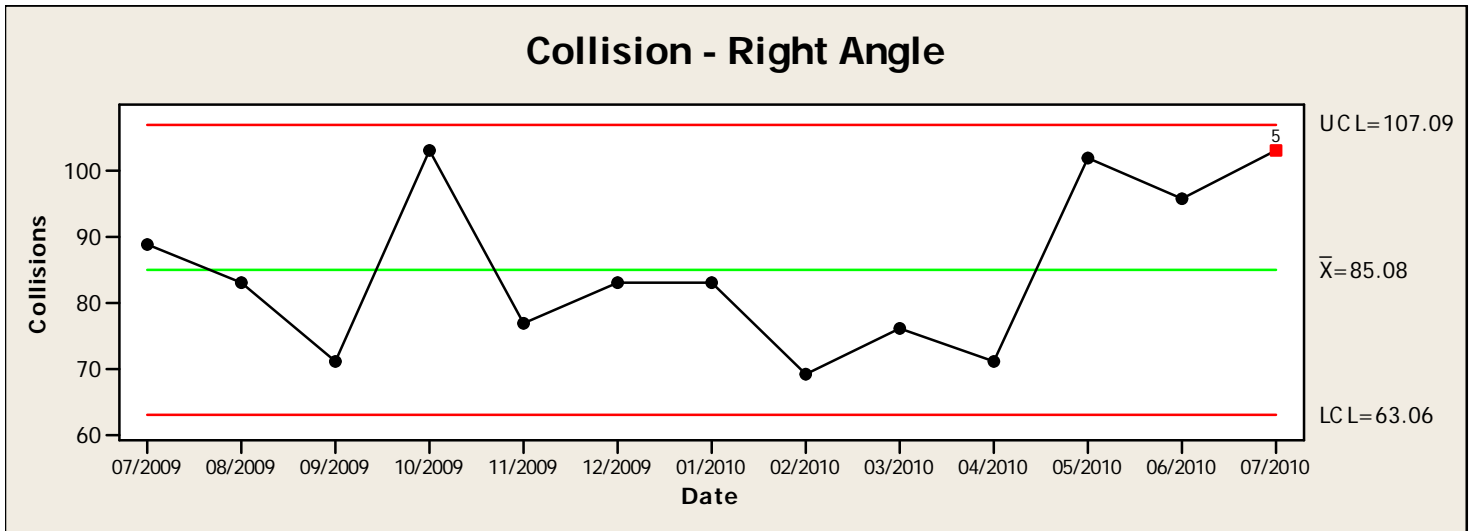

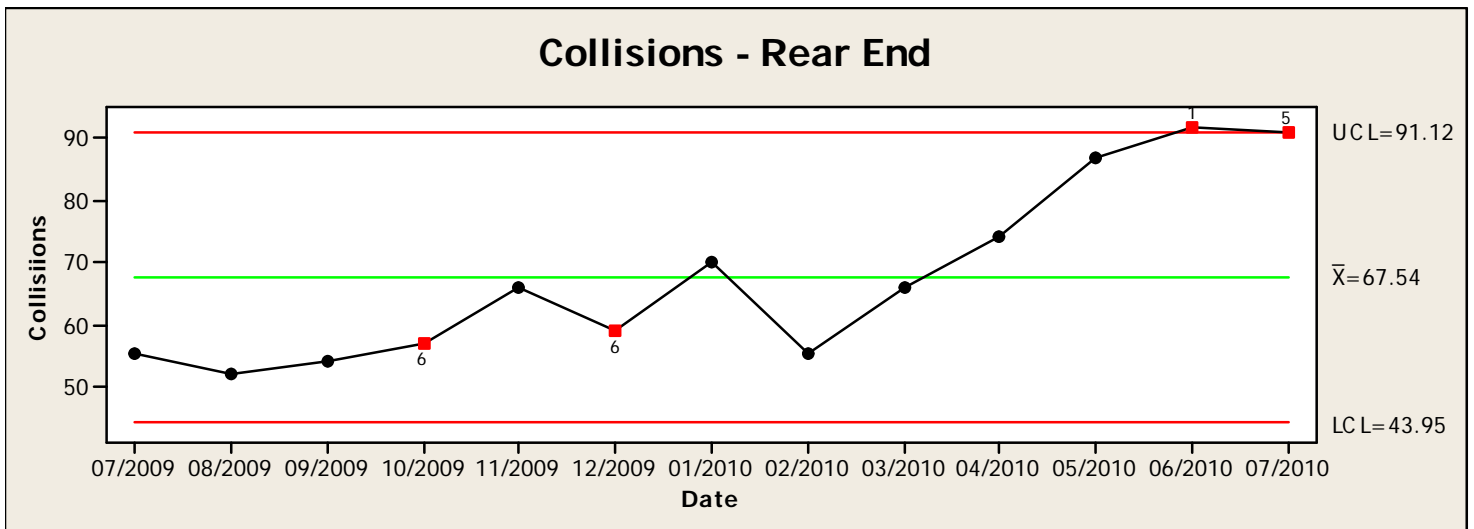

Collisions

Two performance metrics for Collisions show anomalies. The first is for *Right Angle*, which indicates that both May and July 2010 were at least two standard deviations above average (please note collision data is currently running two months behind). Further investigation is necessary, as the June 2010 data was also well above average.



Rear End collisions were detailed in last month's report and current data shows the most recent month was also nearly three standard deviations above average. Further investigation is still needed regarding the steady increase in this type of collision.



Follow-up is needed on *Right Angle* and *Rear End* collisions in addition to the follow-up needed on *Rear End* collisions from the August 2010 report.

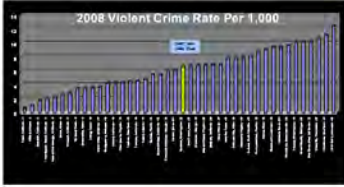

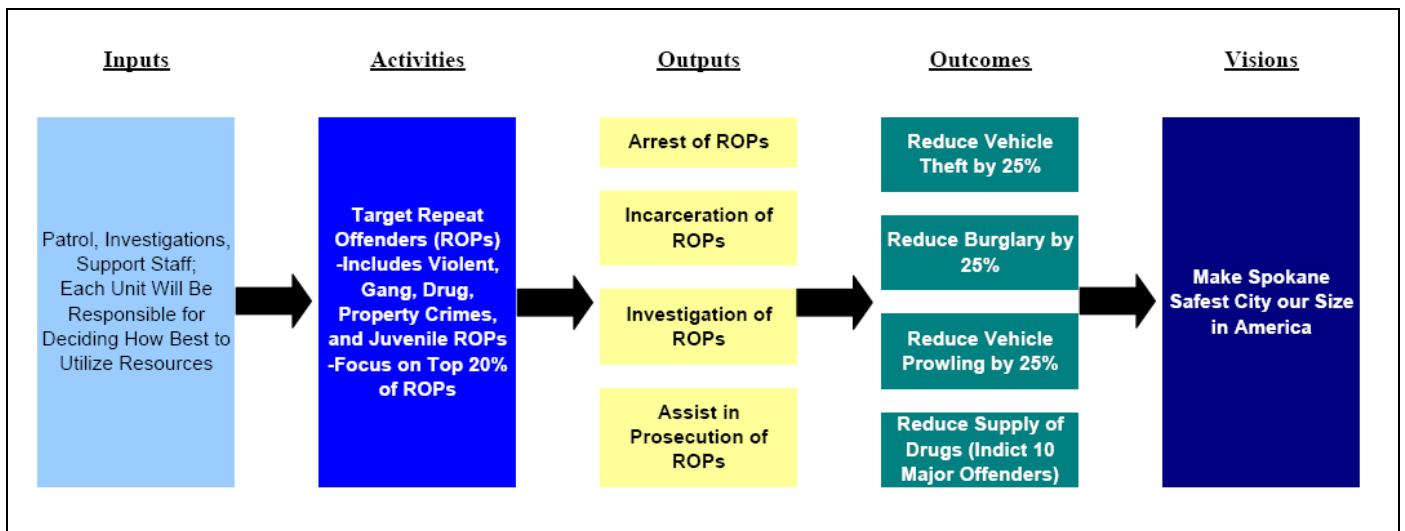


2010 Vision:

“Make Spokane the Safest City Our Size in America”

The Spokane Police Department continues to work towards our vision of making Spokane the safest city our size (population 175,000 to 225,000) in America. To determine our success in this venture, we measure the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Part I¹ data law enforcement agencies report to the FBI.

Since the 2009 data for our comparison cities will not be released by the FBI until mid-2010, a different approach must be used to measure our success at making Spokane safer. The following logic model demonstrates how SPD plans to achieve this vision: by focusing on repeat offenders we plan to reduce Vehicle Theft, Burglary, and Vehicle Prowling (a subset of the Larceny category) by 25%.



As part of AIM, a monthly statistical analysis will be conducted to evaluate the impact of policing efforts on reducing crime to determine if there is a correlation. If there is, it will indicate our success at reducing crime. If there is no correlation, this may be an indication we need to change our approach.

This section of the monthly AIM report will briefly explain what was analyzed and the findings of the analysis. Any assessment from prior reports may also be included here.

¹ Part I crimes include Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny, and Vehicle Theft. Arson is also a Part I crime, but as that is not tracked by SPD, that data is not analyzed.

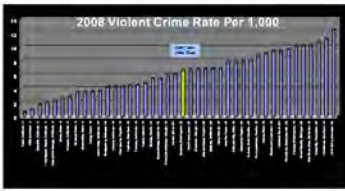


UCR (Unified Crime Reporting) data is the standardized reporting data required by the FBI; this is the most accurate measurement, but the data runs approximately two months behind. RMS (Records Management System) Incident data is up-to-the-date incident data as it was classified at the time of incident; however, since this data has not been classified by the UCR process it is less accurate. A comparison between UCR and RMS is provided in order to have more timely data.

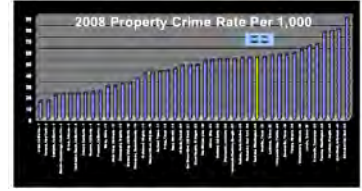

September 2010 Analysis Northeast Neighborhoods Crime and Top 15 Active Offenders

Northeast Neighborhoods

There are six City of Spokane Neighborhood Councils that fall in Northeast Spokane (east of Division and north of the Spokane River): Bemiss, Hillyard, Logan, Minnehaha, Nevada-Lidgerwood, and Whitman. 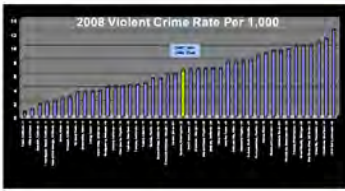
These six Neighborhoods will be targeted for the Spokane Police Department's proactive efforts in 2010 to reduce the following crimes by 25%: Burglary, Vehicle Prowling, and Vehicle Theft. Though the intent of AIM was to measure the impacts of proactive patrols to reduce crime in these neighborhoods, due to continued staffing shortages, at this time it is impractical to measure this data for any accuracy. Proactive patrols have been pieced together as staffing allows, and this inconsistency does not allow for accurate statistical analysis. However, we will still measure crime in this area for trends in reduction rates since when staffing does allow for proactive patrols, they are focused in Northeast (when appropriate).

Below are the tables showing the 2010 goal for the average level of Burglary, Vehicle Prowling, and Vehicle Theft for these six neighborhoods and the data for August 2010. Please see the following page for a review of this data.

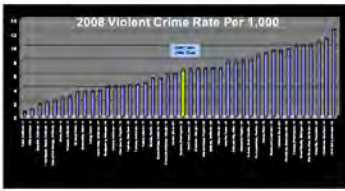

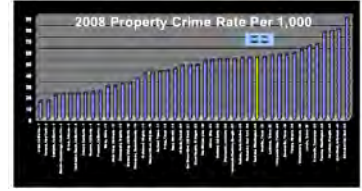
For the August data (see previous page) all six neighborhoods are well above their 2010 goals for a 25% reduction in crime. In fact, this was the worst month in 2010 for Northeast neighborhoods, with crimes well above even 2009 levels. Bemiss, Logan, and NevaWood were especially hard hit, particularly in the areas of Vehicle Theft and Vehicle Prowling. Since it is important to not single out a particular month, please see the 2010 totals on the next page for a more comprehensive view. The lack of proactive patrol teams due to staffing limitations has prevented officers from focusing on reducing crime in the Northeast neighborhoods; in early 2010 when staffing did allow for this, we were making an impact. New staffing models in 2011 will be instituted to address this issue.

On the following page is a table showing the breakdown of UCR crimes for 2010 (data available to date), as well as the 2010 average and 2010 goal, along with a 2009 average for comparison purposes. This table includes year to date data. It is important to use this cumulative table in order to determine sustained efforts in reducing crime. Below is a brief summary on each neighborhood:

- **Bemiss:** 2010 average is exceeding 2009 average for all crimes; not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **Hillyard:** 2010 average is exceeding 2009 average for all crimes, though Vehicle Theft is comparable to 2009; not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **Logan:** 2010 average is exceeding 2009 average for Burglary and Vehicle Prowling, but for Vehicle Theft the 2010 average is better than the 2009 average. However, Vehicle Prowling continues to well exceed the 2009 average; not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **Minnehaha:** 2010 average is comparable to 2009 average for all crimes, not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **NevaWood:** 2010 average is comparable to 2009 average for Burglary and Vehicle Theft, and is below 2009 average for Vehicle Prowling. Not on track to achieve 25% crime reduction.
- **Whitman:** There is an 11% reduction in Vehicle Theft; not on track for Burglary and Vehicle Prowling, though those levels are comparable to 2009 levels.

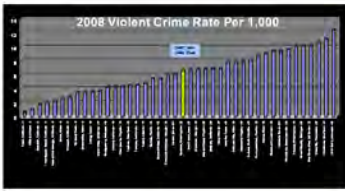

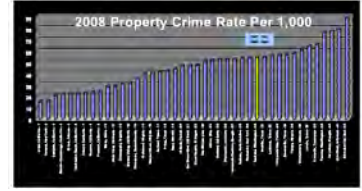

Top 15 Prolific Offenders

Along with focusing on proactive patrol efforts to reduce crime, SPD is also focusing on certain prolific offenders. The vast majority of crime can be attributed to a few select offenders in a community. These offenders are often a revolving cast; while some are incarcerated for a period of several months to several years, others remain active in criminal behavior, often arrested for crimes only to be released pending prosecution. Based on limited resources in the criminal justice system, including law enforcement officers, jail space, and property crimes prosecutors, by focusing available resources on these offenders, we can make Spokane a safer place as well as achieve efficiency.

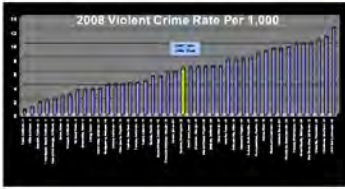
As such, the Crime Analysis unit at SPD has identified the top 15 active offenders in Spokane as of February 2010. These offenders will be the focus of both patrol and investigators at SPD and every effort will be made to ensure all referrals for prosecution believed to have been committed by these individuals receive top priority. The list will remain static for 2010 so that we can measure the influence of these offenders on crime trends.

Each month, an update of the offender's status (legal, incarcerated, etc) will be provided as well as a brief summary of the activity for that month by the offender, including any arrests. In order to maintain anonymity, as these offenders are presumed innocent until conviction, a code name has been given to each offender and their given name will be redacted. The code name will be used in the Weekly AIM reports as well, so that these offenders' activity can be linked anecdotally.

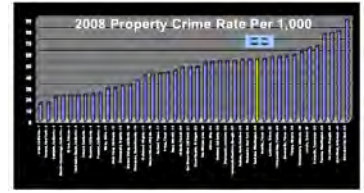
In future AIM reports, statistical analysis will be conducted to show the correlation between certain crime trends and these prolific offenders.

ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- o [REDACTED] E. Glass---Det. Carr and the Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU) are going to do a search warrant on this address tomorrow. SWAT will make the entry. [REDACTED] and this address have been linked to numerous forgery/ID theft cases and TCU has been getting info that [REDACTED] regularly trades meth for stolen property here. Many well known car thieves have been linked to [REDACTED] and this address.
- o [REDACTED] (Top 10)---TCU arrested [REDACTED] last week on his DOC warrant.
- o [REDACTED] (Top 10)---Ofc. Moon arrested [REDACTED] in a stolen car last night. The car was taken in an Indian Trail burglary. [REDACTED] has a history of burgs and car theft and TCU thinks he’s responsible for some of the spike in residential burglaries. Patrol was guarding him at the hospital after his arrest because he swallowed some meth. However, they removed the guard duty last night and [REDACTED] quickly fled (as he told Ofc. WEEKLY PATROL TEAM EFFORTS

NORTH SIDE

Team 2 – Day Shift

- A continuing problem area at 800 N. Division behind Jewelry Design Center got extra attention throughout the week, and the owners of the property have assisted by posting “No Trespassing” signs around the lots and in places where the transients have been gathering. Several Open/Consume violations were written, and the transients have clearly been put on notice that their conduct and unlawful presence is no longer tolerated.
- On Friday the 20th day shift had no corporals due to a scheduled day off for two and Corporal McNab calling in with a hurt back. A dayshift corporal was held over, and a swing shift corporal came in early to resolve the problem. Ofc. Crane partnered with Ofc. Ennis from the south side to hunt ROP’s citywide, as well as problem locations identified as needing attention such as the apartment complexes at 5003 N. Lacy and 6616 N. Addison. With some time remaining Ofc. Crane also worked the ongoing Nevada construction zone and made several stops and a DWLS arrest.
- On 08/21/10, Ofc. Aspaas hunted ROPs, arresting [REDACTED] on an outstanding warrant and checking for [REDACTED] at outdated addresses.
- On 08/22/10, Ofc. Hager took a 1st Degree Burglary report where the suspect(s) had significantly bled from a cut sustained from a broken window, and who had threatened the occupants with a baseball bat. The next day he arrested two sisters for the crime, one of which had several new stitches on her hand, and the other of which had a heroin trafficking warrant from Florida. Also on Sunday, Ofc. Crane worked the Nevada Street construction area hard, making 20 contacts, writing several tickets, confronting a 105 swinging a stick and handing out 12 stickers to the neighborhood kids.
- On 08/23/10, Ofc. Stanton attempted to work the Audubon Park speed zone, but kept getting called off for calls for service. Ofc. Kannberg came back early from light duty, and rode the shift with Ofc. Larry House. Ofc. Aspaas worked south to fill in for a shortage of staffing on the other side of town. The call load the entire day was oppressive, with very little available proactive time. Ofc. Crane again worked the Nevada Street construction zone, and after writing several citations identified a significant traffic flow/potential hazard area, forwarding a notice of concern to Traffic requesting 4-way stop signs at an uncontrolled intersection paralleling the road work.
- On 08/24/10, Ofc. Stanton was able to work Audubon Park again for about an hour, and this time wrote citations for the speed violations. Ofc. House trespassed ROP [REDACTED] from Value Village. Also, Lewis County detectives looking for a triple homicide suspect arrived with insufficient notice, declined all resources and assistance and told us to stay out of the area. The suspect then went mobile from a northwest residence and was lost after recklessly losing their surveillance tail. The incident was documented after SCSO and Lewis County got on the air and began broadcasting all of their confidential information, resulting in a considerable upsetting of patrol.

Team 12 – Power Shift

- [REDACTED] N. Oak--- Officer Kester investigated a “vehicle prowling” at the location where the resident [REDACTED] fired three rounds at the suspect vehicle after the prowlers accomplice reportedly displayed a firearm. No suspects. The area was canvassed by Officer Edwards and none were found to have sustained damage. Three shell casings were located.
- [REDACTED] E. Diamond and [REDACTED] E. Diamond---Residents at both locations were harassing a tenant at [REDACTED] E. Diamond [REDACTED] and were moving her things out of the apartment and boarding up doors. Someone poured bleach on some of her clothing. She is moving out.

- Cpl. Johnson obtained information for an FI on a burglary at [REDACTED] W 6th. Neighbors saw a black Jaguar with two B/M subjects in the area. One got out and went to the building while the other stayed with the car. The plate did return accurately and a suspect is possibly at [REDACTED] W. Augusta.
- A prostitute advised there is a white Ford P/U with a red stripe being driven by a w/m. He has raped/robbed prostitutes. More detailed information is pending.

Prior Week Assessment

Investigations Update

- Investigations has requested Crime Analysis review all residential burglary cases for commonality.
- Based on work by Patrol on identifying possible suspects in the Emerson Garfield/West Central burglaries (see below for more info), Targeted Crimes (TCU) will conduct follow-up to tie them to other burglaries.
- TCU is doing a warrant hunt Thursday from 1000 to 2000 with DOC. They are also doing follow-up on several patrol arrests of car thieves in the last few days to try and develop additional charges. They are [REDACTED] out on bond from his last vehicle theft arrest), ROP [REDACTED] a ROP just out of prison for his last Possession of Stolen Vehicle/Eluding case and was just booked for the same thing by patrol.
- SIU is targeting a meth supplier and is working with an NRO on a heroin house.
- Major Crimes has been focused on the Creach investigation, as well as some other death investigations.

Patrol Update

- Patrol believes juveniles sneaking away from Morning Star Ranch may be responsible for vehicle prowling in the Lincoln Heights area; [REDACTED] is staying at the ranch and is one of the juveniles who was previously camping in Thorton Murphy Park and causing problems in the area.
- Good follow-up by Officer Iverson on a partial plate regarding a malicious mischief incident involving a BB gun led her to a juvenile, who confessed to 20 BB gun assaults, many of which were not reported. The case has been passed to Investigations for more follow-up, but it appears this group of juveniles is responsible for the recent eastside malicious mischief and assaults involving BB guns.
- Patrol made an arrest of two individuals, [REDACTED] at Desmet and Superior for Possession of Burglary Tools; they may be responsible for the recent string of burglaries in the Emerson Garfield and Logan neighborhoods.
- NROs are conducting a prostitute special today with an emphasis on the prostitutes (rather than the johns).
- Neighborhood Resources is printing crime prevention forms for distribution at the local colleges; these forms include crime prevention tips as well as a location for students to write down information such as serial numbers.

- Traffic conducted two recent specials through grants: one netted six DUIs and 22 other infractions, the other was a pedestrian sting with 64 infractions.
- A day shift north side team also did an emphasis traffic patrol in construction zones.
- Mixx at 916 W. Sprague is becoming the new downtown problem location, now that activity at Club Uno has decreased.
- Staffing is slowly rebounding, allowing for one proactive special last Friday night. The emphasis was on the north side burglaries.

ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- Det. Carr and TCU executed a warrant at [REDACTED] E. Glass on 09/02/10. [REDACTED] was present with several other subjects. They didn't locate much on the warrant, although they did get a few items and some marijuana. The investigation regarding Thorn is continuing.

While there [REDACTED] arrived in a car with [REDACTED] (Top 10). [REDACTED] was arrested for two PSV warrants. TCU called [REDACTED] CCO, Jason Lerch, who responded to the scene and arrested [REDACTED] for probation violations and searched the car. TCU found vehicle prowl tools and paraphernalia. There were .380 bullets in the car and house we think belonged to [REDACTED] but we weren't able to locate the handgun.

Crime Trend Debrief

Ryan Shaw provided this week's crime statistics:

- Burglary numbers, particularly for residential, were down this week; however, garage burglary was up. Patrol and Investigations both contributed to identifying some possible suspects regarding commercial burglaries in the Emerson Garfield and West Central area from the last few weeks; these same suspects may be responsible for some residential burglaries of high end homes above Pettit Dr. more recently. [REDACTED] was arrested for a commercial burglary of a Dairy Mart in West Central that had been hit twice. An [REDACTED] were initially thought to be responsible for the commercial burgs in this area; through the arrest of [REDACTED] has been identified as [REDACTED]. The two have also been hanging out with [REDACTED].
- Vehicle Prowling was high this last week and was also well above average for areas that typically are not this high (Browne's Addition, Five Mile). [REDACTED] might be a good suspect for these incidents, especially for the north side.
- Top 10 Offender and ROP [REDACTED] was arrested this past week. At least part of the decrease in Vehicle Theft and Residential Burglaries, particularly in the Indian Trail area, is likely attributed to his arrest. It is also worth noting [REDACTED] has white supremacy ties.
- ROP [REDACTED] was arrested by patrol on 09/07/10 in a pursuit of a stolen vehicle he was driving. [REDACTED] has been in prison for the last year; previously he was well known as a prolific vehicle prowler who would prowl while in a stolen vehicle. This arrest should contribute to another drop in Vehicle Theft next week.
- No lewd incidents have been reported in recent weeks, but there was a suspicious circumstance report on W Nora where a 19 year old female reported seeing a flashlight shine through her window. This is similar to [REDACTED] M.O.; the information was distributed to Patrol via the Hotboard.

[REDACTED] believes [REDACTED] story and all the neighbors want the house bulldozed. If Patrol has a double up night to do surveillance/pro-active things, this house would be a good one.

Officer Thomas – Northeast

- There were 89 calls for service relating to domestic violence in the Logan and Hillyard Areas in August. There were 53 calls for threats and harassment. There were 74 noise and party calls and 95 for fights and arguments. Assaults and disorderly calls came in at 51. Drug calls were up from last month at 38. Calls were researched for possible contact with landlords and tenants. Ofc. Thomas had 33 neighborhood issues come into the two shops.
- Ofc. Thomas did some surveillance of Courtland Park after complaints of large groups using the park (drinking, noise and litter). He met with neighbors of the park. Neighborhood Services and City Parks personnel attended the meeting. Lots of ideas on how to deal with the issue were presented and progress was made on a solution. The neighbors seemed to be happy with the proposed solutions.
- Ofc. Thomas worked with security and administrations of Gonzaga University, Moody Bible Institute, SCC and SERTI. He also attended safety talks and student orientation giving out information.

- Ofc. Thomas will be addressing Noise and Party calls with landlords. There seems to be an increase of assaults and fights attached to these complaints. Continued work with the campuses on safety. Continued work on drug houses in the Hillyard and Logan neighborhoods.

Officer Strassenberg – East Central/Garry Park No New Updates

Officer Draper – Southeast/Southwest

- Peaceful Valley – On 09/02/10, Ofc. Draper met with several residents and community organizers from the Peaceful Valley community to discuss crime trends. City representatives present were Chief Kirkpatrick, City Councilman John Snyder and Ofc. Draper. This meeting was attended by approximately 15 residents. The following are some of the key points discussed:
 - Transient activity – Among the concerns here were transient campsites along the Spokane River from the Monroe Street Bridge to People’s Park. Problems associated were garbage and all the debris generated. Discussed what has been done to this point and what ongoing things the police department is doing. Also discussed the relationship with the Parks Department for cleanup. City Councilman Snyder requested Ofc. Draper be a part of a future meeting with the Parks Dept. to discuss further solutions and pro-active approaches.
 - Residents mentioned two houses with possible drug activity: [REDACTED] W. Main (which had previously been brought to Ofc. Draper’s attention, along with [REDACTED] W. Clarke (which Ofc. Draper did not have previous reports of.)
 - Speeding – Residents discussed how Main and Clarke are used as arterials to and from Downtown. The use of the traffic hotline message machine to request extra traffic enforcement was discussed.
 - General questions concerning Calls-For-Service (CFS) to the Peaceful Valley neighborhood and crime trends. The numbers provided by the Crime Analysis Unit showed a slight increase in CFS and reported crime, but nothing significant. Also addressed was when was the appropriate time to call 911 vs Crime Check.
- [REDACTED] E. 40th – Drugs – Neighbors are still reporting short stay traffic, fights, and general nuisance from the home located at the S/E corner of 40th and Arthur. Ofc. Draper will again check CFS and see if Chronic Nuisance can apply to this property.
- [REDACTED] W. 5th [REDACTED] – Chronic Nuisance served and eviction is in process to fights and assaults on the property.
- Cliff Drive lookout at Stevens – Party location – Neighbors are reporting a significant increase in the number of vehicles and people congregating in the late evening hours at the look out. Issues being reported include: open and consume which leads to urination in the yards of the residential houses and the litter of the alcohol containers, fights, reckless driving, yelling, loud cars and stereos, possible drug transactions. Extra patrols requested. Some CFS are coming in and Ofc. Draper has asked neighbors to continue to call. Info passed on to Patrol.

- For the upcoming week, Ofc. Draper will be working on [REDACTED] E. 40th, a neighborhood dispute on E 17th, and in the [REDACTED] block of West South Loop to name a few; as well as work on researching several addresses he monitors for Chronic Nuisance.

Officer Downing and Officer Redmon – Downtown

- Currently working with Peaceful Valley residents and Parks Department to rid the area of the numerous transient camps. Ofcs. Downing and Redmon have made several prowl checks along the river bank and stairs to downtown finding several camps and making several arrests. They would like a heads up if Patrol spots any new camps. The camp off the stairs at Cedar has been contacted and a lot of property and trash was left behind by the transients. This is private property and the city won't clean it up. It is posted no trespassing anywhere off the stairwell and anyone found there can be cited for trespass.
- Working Riverfront Park for Pig Out in the Park with extra patrols in the park.
- Have been doing safety/crime prevention talks with WSU Nursing School students and plan more this month with PAML.
- Performed a CEPTED evaluation of City Hall Parking lot. Problems with after hour parkers and party's at this location. Advised them to post no parking after business hours to stop the vehicles from parking there but no signs have been put up. They can't just exclude certain groups from the lot and allow others to use it. We have asked Riverfront Park to help patrol this area as well as patrol.
- Lots of open consume, lewd conduct under the Division St Bridge on the trail by transients. This is all hours of the day and has become a problem with the frequent use of the trail by walkers and joggers. This is considered part of Riverfront Park and park rules apply.
- A complaint of party's after hours of darkness on the East side of Glover Field in Peaceful Valley. Trail from Main St accesses this area. Community Center made complaints of vandalism at the park and community center during these hours and would like prowl checks at night.
- DOT has put up "No Trespassing" signs on the North side of the freeway (in the landscaped area) from Division to Howard to stop the transient camps. Any campers can be cited for trespass. The area appears somewhat cleaned up by the city. Any new camps should be reported so they can be cleared.

WEEKLY PATROL TEAM EFFORTS

NORTH SIDE

Team 2 – Day Shift

- Monday, August 30 – EDU callout for a briefcase left between the railing of the Post Street bridge. Due to a recent valid device under similar circumstances in Coeur d'Alene a few days prior, the briefcase was taken by the robot across a blocked-off Monroe street and opened dynamically by remote control. There was no explosive device (only a camcorder) but all the media outlets were present, and their footage and interaction was positive for the Department. Also on Monday, Ofc. Kannberg responded on a DV and during a search for the suspect found a hidden basement room with an active marijuana grow operation. SIU assisted with a search warrant, recovery of the plants and felony charges for the owner.
- Tuesday, August 31 – recovered a rolling stolen in Hillyard and arrested ROP [REDACTED] for a DOC escape warrant, TMVWOP and PSP from area burglaries. En route to jail he was able to remove a baggie of meth from his rectum and swallow it in the back of the patrol car. He was brought to the hospital for observation under 4-point restraints, but later patrol shifts were unable to staff his supervision, and he subsequently escaped from Deaconess security officers. Also, Ofc. Kannberg went on a DV with [REDACTED] who snitched [REDACTED] as a convicted felon and ROP as having a firearm in his house. Ofc. Kannberg went with DOC and recovered ammunition and a shotgun, arresting him for the assault

and firearms violations. Ofc. Hager responded on a DPOPV violation, and the victim provided him with information confessed to her by a suspect in a Spokane Valley home invasion robbery. He passed the information on to SCSO, who subsequently ended up in a foot pursuit and standoff in a residence with him before being captured with some of the jewelry from the home invasion after he fell through the ceiling from his attic hiding place.

- Wednesday, September 1 – Ofc. Hager responded to [REDACTED] N. Atlantic and recovering a motorcycle, go-kart, 4-wheeler and wire-feed welder from a burglary a block away. The suspect [REDACTED] was identified but not present, and Ofc. Hager earned a “GOTCHA” t-shirt when the exuberant K-9 contacted his leg during the announcement into the house. As well, media responded and gave both video and an impressively positive still photo on the internet news site of a young victim giving him a hug of gratitude. Ofc. Hager also arrested a suspect in the Dairy Mart burglary from a few weeks ago, and brought him to the detective investigating the case and obtained a confession from him. The juvenile suspect was released due to a communication issue, and failed to turn himself in as he had promised.
- Thursday, September 2 – Ofc. Graves was able to arrest Top 10 ROP [REDACTED] at the DOC building for four outstanding warrants. Also, [REDACTED] (the escapee from Deaconess) was picked up and booked for his charges by Graveyard. As with all days, drive-throughs of the team’s problem area at 800 N. Division were done, and two additional Open/Consume tickets were written and added to the extensive total.
- Friday, September 3 – Team 2 was overlapped with Team 4 and Ofc. Hager & worked a special “headhunting” car looking specifically for [REDACTED] (the Dairy Mart burglar who hadn’t yet been booked), [REDACTED] (the ATV burglar) and the [REDACTED] family, who the detectives had been shadowing earlier in the week with help from our team. They were able to locate and arrest [REDACTED] after following several leads. Three of the team’s members were needed to staff the south side, and Ofc. Crane finished the firearms qualifying of not only our team but several other officers in a rotation through the Academy. Sgt. Sprague had a deaf pedestrian contact him at Cook & Liberty and inform him that his deaf roommates had an active marijuana grow in their backyard at [REDACTED] N. Smith. With the help of SIU, they retrieved seven growing plants and a box of drying leaves and buds. Ofc. Stewart arrested [REDACTED] on six outstanding warrants during a day-long search.
- Team 2 continued working traffic enforcement in first the park and construction zones, and now the school zones. Both problem persons and locations continue to be addressed as time and staffing permit.

Team 4 – Day Shift

- Team 4 has just received an additional officer for the remainder of this year. Sgt. Peterson plans on a daily emphasis on burglaries for the entire month utilizing this added officer. If the team can maintain their available officers without having to supplement other teams, they should have an immediate impact on burglaries occurring during our shift. The team will work with Crime Analysis to keep updated on current daytime burglaries and adjust accordingly.
- A well known criminal, [REDACTED] has just gotten out of prison and is now living at [REDACTED] E. Broad. Neighbors say that this location is very active at night but quiet during the daytime. Ofc. Woods will coordinate with night shifts and pay great attention to this criminal.

Team 6 – Swing Shift

- During the month of August, Team 6 was at minimum staffing 10 days out of 17 days worked. The remaining seven days the team had six officers working. Calls for service on the north side have prohibited consistent assignment of officers to work neighborhood projects, hunt wanted ROPs etc.
- Individual officers have tried to focus their efforts on problem locations within their precincts identified by the NROs, when not on calls for service.

Team 10 – Power Shift

- Playground signs have been removed from at least some of the parks this week. There have been three pursuits this week. Sgt. Anderson noticed several Saturns and Subarus were stolen this week. Sgt. Anderson has selected his new traffic enforcement project for September and will be working on bicycle enforcement based on the same roads same rights same rules. He has seen several bicycles lately flying through stop signs, not yielding right of ways, no helmets, and no lights or reflectors at night.
- Ofc. Bishop has been working on the following:
 - [REDACTED] E Magnesium [REDACTED] --Suspect: [REDACTED] --Oxycotin dealer, drug deal gone bad, shots fired. Other suspects: [REDACTED]
 - [REDACTED] N Stone---Victim: [REDACTED] Suspects: [REDACTED] who reside at [REDACTED] E Gordon. They befriended [REDACTED] who invited them inside. [REDACTED] stole two rings worth about \$800-\$1000 dollars. Nothing in pawn database with them or the rings as of yet.
- Ofc. Rogan took several stolen vehicle reports from the area of Wellesley and Division within a three block radius. He also conducted extra patrols in the Shilo Hills area and contacted ROP [REDACTED] on 7000 N Dakota yelling causing problems.

- Ofc. Edwards and Ofc. McCollough located and arrested ROP/TOP wanted subject [REDACTED] hiding in garage at [REDACTED] E. Bridgeport. [REDACTED] had escaped from Deaconess Hospital after being arrested for possession of stolen motor vehicle. [REDACTED] was also wanted on a felony DOC escape warrant.

Team 12 – Power Shift

- With light staffing the team was required to call in additional help two of the five days. We fielded a PACT team unit on our double up Friday.
- [REDACTED] E Glass---Officer Green contacted some residents in the neighborhood that report the alley is continually being tagged with “GTC”. The neighbors have been diligent about painting over the graffiti. Two unknown males in blue threatened one of the area residents saying he would get shot if he keeps painting over their tagging.
- [REDACTED] E Montgomery [REDACTED] ---Officer Kester investigated a neighborhood disputed involving a possibly 105 resident at the location, [REDACTED]. She was involved in a physical altercation with her neighbors. It is an ongoing dispute and [REDACTED] was upset that her neighbors were not arrested though she inflicted more injury than she received.
- [REDACTED] N Colton [REDACTED] ---Recurring DV situation at the location. The Pacific Islander family that lived there feigned that they spoke no English and resisted officers in their investigation.
- [REDACTED] E Liberty--- Officer Spolski arrested [REDACTED] after he broke into the address and asked one of the residents if she “wanted to play.” The suspect snuck in a window and confronted the resident in her room and tried to grab her. When Ofc. Spolski caught him he was at his address [REDACTED] E Liberty changing clothes.
- Glass Park--- Officer Green investigated an incident where two young children (8 and 10 approx) were shot at by one of the teenagers with a BB gun. One of the children was injured. He was able to establish a possible suspect, [REDACTED] who lives in the area. Investigation continuing.
- [REDACTED] N Jefferson--- Officers Kester, Kernkamp, and Lesser investigated a possible occupied burglary at the location. The victim, [REDACTED] produced several recent phone messages from suspect, [REDACTED]. On the final message [REDACTED] said that he was two minutes from [REDACTED] home and he was going to bash his head in. The suspect is the nephew of the operator of a medical marijuana dispensary that [REDACTED] patronizes. Officers located the suspect in the area of Illinois and Crestline and Officer Kester arrested him for Felony Harassment.
- [REDACTED] E Liberty--- [REDACTED] moved into the house occupied by a disabled man. Officers Madsen and Green responded after the actual resident locked [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] out. [REDACTED] were using drugs and causing problems in the area.
- [REDACTED] W. Heroy--- Officer Spolski investigated a home invasion rape that occurred at the residence. The victim’s nose was possibly broken during the attack. The suspect gained entry through a back door off of the alley and the screen was cut to the door. SAU is investigating. Update---There are details surfacing that challenge the original statements made by the victim.
- [REDACTED] N. Lidgerwood---Officer Madsen and Cpl Carr investigated an interrupted burglary at the location. Suspect attempted to enter the residence of a female at the location. The screen was pried out and the back door was jimmied. Suspect was described as a 6’ Medium Build WM 30-40 years of age wearing a tan BB hat, white tee shirt, and jean shorts. Victim was a student athlete at Gonzaga.
- [REDACTED] E. Kiernan---Officer Kernkamp investigated a “burglary” at the location. The complainant owns the property, but lives at another address. He claimed that he found the front door kicked in. Officer Kernkamp spoke with a neighbor witness that described a suspect that very closely resembled the complainant and when the witness saw the complainant and said, “he looked a lot like him.”

Team 14 – Graveyard Shift

- [redacted] and [redacted] E Courtland – Officers responded to assault between neighbors. [redacted] from [redacted] E Courtland assaulted [redacted] of [redacted] E Courtland by wrapping a wire around her neck. After a K-9 track, [redacted] was arrested for Assault 2nd Degree.
- [redacted] N Monroe – One officer reports responding to the address, which is a chronic DV house, four times with no cooperation at the door. Occupants either refuse to answer door or refuse to talk or cooperate with officers.
- [redacted] E Olympic – Party house. Occupants [redacted] have been warned for noise.

Team 16 – Graveyard Shift

- This week we had three significant incidents that resulted in six separate felony arrests:
 - Three suspects were arrested for 1st Degree Malicious Mischief. All three were responsible for tagging several businesses at North Point Plaza. The damage was well over \$1500 and the businesses included Pet Smart, Best Buy, State Bank, Horizon Credit Union, NW Physical Therapy, and a multitude of City signs and poles and large power boxes. The suspects' specific tagging characters and words will tie them into several mass tagging incidents on the north side. Suspects are [redacted]
 - The most important case was developed by Ofc. Bode on a traffic stop. Ofc. Bode responded to vehicle prowlers in the area of Woodside and Lyons, which has been a target area for numerous vehicle prowlings. Ofc. Bode worked the male and female against each other over the course of several minutes. Ofc. Bode got the male to confess to several vehicle prowling incidents that night as well as he and his girlfriend admitting to vehicle prowling that area for a long time because police never patrol the area. A large cache of stolen items were recovered from the borrowed vehicle which the R/O gave permission to Ofc. Bode to search. Suspects were [redacted]
 - Sgt. Overhoff found a stolen Honda Accord that had just be reported stolen a few minutes earlier. Suspect [redacted] was arrested. He had several shaved Honda, Toyota, and Nissan keys on his person along with Meth. [redacted] has a long criminal history including vehicle thefts.

- [redacted] S. Helena---Residents [redacted] have been the source of repeated calls for service; fights, assaults, threats to kill. Volatile household.

TRAFFIC UNIT

- Motor Officers from the Traffic Unit went to the Target store and put on a demonstration for the National Night Out Against Crime.
- The Traffic Unit procured funds to have officers work four DUI emphasis patrols during August. This resulted in an additional 6 DUI arrests and about 22 citations.
- The Traffic Unit also procured and worked two new grants. One, a pedestrian safety grant was only given to our agency for law enforcement. This grant yielded 64 NOI's – 30 of which were driver's failing to yield to pedestrians. We also made 463 public contacts attempting to educate citizens of Spokane about Ped Safety.
- The other grant is a corridor grant for US 195. This has yielded nearly 70 NOI's and Sgt. Olsen attended an Open House in the area to educate the motorists generally using that roadway.
- Sgt. Olsen, Ofc. Applewhaite, Ofc. Tilley and Ofc. Downing went to Moses Lake, WA and assisted Grant Co. SO with their County Fair.
- The Spokane Police Traffic Unit continued the Traffic Tip of the Week in conjunction with KXLY – it is called "On Patrol". We've covered Construction Zones, the US 195 Corridor, the 'Move-Over" law.
- SPD Motor Units worked the Troika and Hillyard Days events as well as the second Summer Parkways Cycling event.

ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- The Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU) did another warrant hunt. It was only a partial shift and DOC did not accompany TCU. The following contacts were made:
 - [REDACTED] was contacted in a convenience store parking lot at Thor/Euclid acting very suspiciously. He was in a vehicle VEW believeu is stolen, but hasn't been reported yet. He had a realistic BB gun under the seat and the magazine in his pocket. He had a loaded heroin syringe in the car and probably meth as well. The store owner said he'd been in the parking lot for two hours and TCU suspected he might have been trying to rob the place. TCU seized the car pending a search warrant. [REDACTED] was released and the investigation continuing by Det. Tofsrud.
 - [REDACTED] (car thief)---Arrested at [REDACTED] E. Buckeye [REDACTED] on PC for a couple car thefts.
 - [REDACTED] (ROP-prolific car thief)---Arrested at [REDACTED] N. University for multiple car theft warrants. [REDACTED] was in possession of numerous shaved keys.
 - [REDACTED] ROP/T4/RSO-car thief)---TCU attempted to arrest [REDACTED] for a warrant at [REDACTED] E. Garland. [REDACTED] wasn't located, but TCU will likely have PC to charge him with failing to register. Det. Wuthrich is continuing the investigation.

TCU is currently working the following targets:

- [REDACTED]---TCU has been gathering intel on [REDACTED] over the last month that leads Sgt. Singley to believe [REDACTED] has been one of the most active vehicle prowlers in the area and an active car thief. Det. Mehring got a call from a CI who provided good intel on [REDACTED] location which Det. Mehring passed on to Sgt. Singley. Yesterday TCU did surveillance on that location, the Spokane House, and was able to arrest [REDACTED] there. He was booked for several felony thefts. [REDACTED] was there too but wasn't arrested for any new charges yet.
- Det. Staben recovered some stolen property from their hotel room and is continuing his investigations. He will have numerous felony charges against [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] by the time he's done. Of note, [REDACTED] prowled a digital camera from a vehicle at the City garage which he subsequently pawned. The camera had a large "City of Spokane" sticker on it. If he bonds out of jail, Sgt. Singley has recommended that [REDACTED] be added to the Top 10.
- [REDACTED]---With [REDACTED] arrest, [REDACTED] is currently the #1 priority. [REDACTED] is a prolific car thief and has been for many years. He also has a violent history and has a multitude of prior eluding incidents. He currently has several felony warrants. Sgt. Singley has recommended for him to be classified as a ROP (eight felony convictions) and suspects he will be Top 10 material as well if he isn't arrested.
- [REDACTED]---Patrol booked [REDACTED] on this PSV/Eluding, but there are other suspects and charges still being worked. Whitman is a known car thief.
- [REDACTED] (ROP car thief)



- o [REDACTED] ---Det. Carr completed a charging request for roughly 15 felony counts. He has no felony convictions, so hopefully these cases will point him up. Thorn and his former address [REDACTED] E. Glass) were connected to all kinds of property crime and drug dealing.

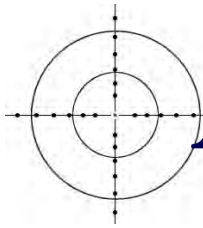

Officer Draper – Southeast/Southwest

- [REDACTED] E. 40th---Ofc. Draper has only two confirmed Nuisance calls, with several others being self generated from within the property. He has contacted each neighbor that has filed a complaint with him about the property and advised them of options. He has also requested contact from the property owner, but have not had a returned call. This house is connected with [REDACTED] E. 40th.
- [REDACTED] E. 40th---In Ofc. Draper's research on [REDACTED] E. 40th he has learned there is a connection between these two addresses and that the problems from one often spill to the other property. In July Ofc. Draper served the landlord of [REDACTED] E. 40th with Chronic Nuisance and was assured an eviction would be forthcoming. Ofc. Draper now has two more chronic nuisance calls since then to [REDACTED] E. 40th. He has requested a sit down with the property owner so he can explain the possible outcomes to him for his lack of attention to this property. Ofc. Draper will request he sign a resolution agreement.
- Peaceful Valley---Working with Ofc. Downing and Redmon. The Parks Dept has been notified of the tents and camps along the River and has been asked to remove them. As a result of the meeting Ofc. Draper attended in PV with the Chief, he has had several more complaints regarding the transient camps. Ofc. Draper will stay in contact with Parks and Ofc. Downing and Redmon on this issue.
- Prostitution Detail---On 09/08/10 Ofc. Draper, along with most of the NRO unit, assisted Ofc. Strassenberg with a Prostitution detail along the E. Sprague corridor between Division and Havana. Several arrests were made.
- 10th / Adams---BB Gun Malicious Mischief---Two citizens called reporting several BB gun malicious mischief incidents in the area. Targets have been parked vehicle and house windows. One neighbor believes the suspect may live at [REDACTED] S. Adams [REDACTED] by the name of [REDACTED]. Last year [REDACTED] was the suspect in an arson from across the street, and was the suspect in another BB gun malicious mischief.

WEEKLY PATROL TEAM EFFORTS

NORTH SIDE

Team 2 – Day Shift

- This week Team 2 officially declared one problem location as resolved, and has adopted another. For much of the summer, 821 N. Division behind the Jewelry Design Center has been beset by alcohol and other problems as a result of the sales of high-alcohol content lagers from the Chevron next door. Using a combination of signage posted by the property owners and aggressive enforcement and frequent drive-throughs, the problem has abated to the degree that neither transients nor violations are observed.
- Ofc. Graves and Sgt. Sprague, however, responded to 1012 W. Euclid, where a homeowner complained of a person with felony warrants intimidating her and her family. Upon contact, she stated that several wanted and criminal subjects had overrun her residence due to her son with a developmental disability not being able to discriminate between good and bad friends. Other families were likewise adamant that aggressive enforcement of their property was requested and welcomed. As a result, Team 2 will be spending additional time in the area attempting identifying and addressing criminals, their vehicles and behavior.
- Friday the 10th was the overlap for the south side, allowing us to work on traffic enforcement, led by Ofc. Stewart, who wrote a total of 16 tickets for the week.
- Saturday the 11th Ofc. Crane called in with an injured shoulder which kept him out for the rest of the week. Right out of roll call Ofc. Hager led the rest of the team in a call involving a suspect who beat a man severely in the head with a claw hammer after the victim took his girlfriend's dog and wouldn't return it. The suspect then called police, gave Ofc. Hager the hammer and confessed to the assault. The rest of the team took statements from the hospital, the scene of the assault and the girlfriend at her house. Ofc. Stanton transported a suicidal (high on meth with a knife) to Sacred Heart, and met with significant lack of assistance on the part of hospital staff. The incident was documented and forwarded to hopefully prevent a recurrence.
- Also for Saturday, [REDACTED] W. Dean needed two separate responses by Ofc. Hager to calls of multiple people fighting with sticks and arrests in both instances to finally resolve the conflict. [REDACTED] was one of those arrested. Additionally, Ofc. Graves handled an ongoing DV over several responses involving a sex triangle and posted internet photos of the tryst. As well, Ofc. Stanton responded three times to [REDACTED] N. Cedar on an intoxicated immigrant from Tanzania involved in a DV, resolved when an interpreter friend transported him from the scene.
- Sunday the 12th Team 2 was called out of roll call for a vehicle pursuit and PIT with an ongoing foot pursuit of the suspect initiated by graveyard. By the time we arrived the suspect had been flushed from hiding and taken into custody. Ofc. Stewart handled the complex collision following the PIT. Ofc. Stanton later went on a DOA where the victim had called 911 to report his own medical condition, and Fire found him shortly thereafter as deceased. 911 was helpful in replaying the 911 call for us by the victim to help ascertain that it was in fact a natural DOA, given the amount of fresh blood the deceased had coughed up prior to succumbing.
- Ofc. Graves identified a crime problem involving several car prowlings and identified a suspect vehicle registered to one of the [REDACTED] (ROPs) along with witness statements of a female driver and two male passengers committing the thefts. [REDACTED] showed evicted from the R.O.'s address.
- Ofc. Stewart made an arrest for False Reporting after a complainant filed a false report and manipulated his own injuries to establish PC for patrol to arrest his girlfriend. He then confessed to the crime after calling police, afraid of the consequences should his girlfriend be falsely arrested.
- And finally, Ofc. Kannberg responded with Ofc. Dollard to Corbin Park where a 12 year-old and his friend turned a can of aerosol cooking spray and a cigarette lighter into a blowtorch and were trying to ignite the wood shake roof of the restrooms while they were standing on it. A neighbor chased one of them down and held him for police in the yard of one of our own detective's division secretaries, and a confession identified the other suspect.



Team 10 – Power Shift

- Cpl. Oien assisted with Ofc. Edwards' major arrest of [REDACTED] several nights. He also stopped and ticketed [REDACTED] who is driving an [REDACTED] and is reportedly transporting drugs.
- Cpl. Oien and Ofc. Prim responded to more fight calls at the Top Hat this week and it appears that over service is once again a problem. There were highly intoxicated patrons in the parking lot. Ofc. Prim cited and released a male for lewd conduct after he showed himself to Air1, directly above the bar. This is a nuisance address.
- Ofc. Bulkley assisted for four hours with [REDACTED] on the [REDACTED] caper. He worked on the [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] N. Monroe neighborhood problem as well as the traffic issues on Broad and from Ash to Division while Wellesley and the burglary situation in the Neva-Wood area in the early evening.
- Ofc. Matthew addressed a possible future nuisance address at [REDACTED] W Sinto, [REDACTED] reported he was being chased by people with guns or crossbows throughout the city.
- Ofc. Matthew noticed an increase in vehicle thefts in the Garland District. He took three reports this week and none the past month. No suspect description was provided in the thefts. Stolen vehicles: Honda, Saturn, Subaru.
- Ofc. Matthew also checked for wanted subjects: [REDACTED] as provided by Crime Analysis. He did not locate any subjects. All addresses provided by Crime Analysis were outdated by at least two or three months.
- On 09/08/10, Ofc. Edwards was involved in a pursuit with [REDACTED]. The vehicle was abandoned and seized for a search warrant. The search warrant was executed the next day and officers recovered a loaded Glock 27 handgun and cell phone belonging to Storro. On 09/10/10, continued investigating and pursuing leads on [REDACTED] whereabouts (120 miles worth). On 09/11/10 more subjects were contacted reference [REDACTED] and ultimately no more leads (55 miles worth). On 09/12/10, Ofc. Edwards and Ofc. Wheeler found [REDACTED] at the Royal Scot with [REDACTED] was resistive upon arrest. Ofc. Edwards seized the vehicle they were sitting in for a search warrant. On 09/12/10 around 1850 hours, the search warrant was executed and an ounce of crystal meth was found along with the prize of the day, a lone Glock magazine with 8 bullets similar to the magazine recovered on 09/09/10.

- Ofc. Prim arrested [REDACTED] on a misdemeanor warrant. [REDACTED] was highly intoxicated, wandering around [REDACTED] E. Queen area and prowling cars. He also completed an FI on [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] E. Everett. [REDACTED] admitted to having [REDACTED] and had a [REDACTED] on his hand.
- Ofc. Rogan caught burglary suspect, [REDACTED] after he broke into [REDACTED] E. Liberty. [REDACTED] went into the bedroom of the resident and woke her up asking her if she wanted to have fun. He was caught at [REDACTED] E. Liberty.
- Ofc. Rogan received information that [REDACTED] E. Marietta, DOC escape warrant for child molestation is living in a Ford Ranger in the back yard.

NORTH SIDE

Team 2 – Day Shift

- This week Team 2's most significant identifiable daily problem was the Maple Street Bridge. Repeated calls of road rage, reckless driving and collisions peppered the call screen, due to road construction on 2nd Avenue on the south end of the bridge. A poorly designed traffic plan had one lane packed and inching, with the other used by speeding cars to either force their way in at the front of the line, or be partially blocked by frustrated drivers not wanting to get passed by line-cutters.



Weekly Wrap-Up for Wednesday, Sept 22th, 2010

Citations were written to those driving over the concrete median and across the grass islands at the north end. Contact was made with the construction crew, who assured that both lanes would be open again by Wednesday.

- On Friday, 09/17/10 it was an overlap day for the north side. Due to staff shortages on both south and the opposing north side, Team 2 staffed the desk for an unusually uneventful day. Several passes were made by [REDACTED] W. Euclid, a problem house identified last week by the homeowner as a place at which she wanted frequenting criminal types cleared out.
- On Saturday, 09/18/10, Ofcs. House and Aspaas teamed up on a foot pursuit to catch a subject wanted by graveyard patrol on pc for DV assault and who also had a felony out-of-state warrant. Ofc. Stewart worked south side due to a staffing shortage there. Ofc. Aspaas checked on several wanted ROPs, without success. Ofc. Stanton became involved with a complex and far-reaching theft/trafficking operation from area Wal-Marts and Hastings, where hundreds of dollars worth of DVDs would be stolen from a Wal-Mart, and sold to a Hastings. One arrest was made with a written confession, with significant evidence of other such crimes being documented. Also, Cpl. McNab interrupted a vehicle stripping in progress, and obtained information leading to Ofc. Crane's arrest of [REDACTED] (ROP) on a felony warrant on the south side. A citywide problem of day-long major traffic congestion at several major intersections was caused by the annual "Fill the Boot" fundraising campaign by the Spokane Fire Department. Several related issues were at the fore, and were forwarded through channels for resolution and prevention in coming years.
- On Monday, 09/20/10, the day started with graveyard finishing up a perimeter around [REDACTED] E. Mallon, where [REDACTED] was hiding in the house. Ofc. Crane assisted, due to a SWAT callout a couple months earlier involving the same person at the same address. Ofcs. Stanton & Kannberg handled a significant blocking two-car rollover collision at Francis & Driscoll (amazingly non-injury) which caused significant traffic disruption. Also, Ofc. Kannberg arrested [REDACTED] for 2nd Theft (access device) following a detailed investigation and follow-up at banks after the complainant's stolen debit card was used by a suspect caught on camera. Ofc. Kannberg also worked a traffic special at Post & Queen.
- On Tuesday, 09/21/10, Cpl. McNab and Ofc. Stewart assisted with a collision involving two vehicles and a house after Ofc. Moon terminated a pursuit and the suspended female driver with a felony warrant continued, totaling a pickup and driving through a cyclone fence to disable her stolen Tahoe against the foundation of a house at Bridgeport & Standard. She was cited for Cell Phone Use while Driving as well. Several of Team 2 responded to the aftermath of a hit & run collision by a stolen pickup with stolen license plates pulling a stolen trailer full of ORV's after a homeowner saw the truck pulling his neighbor's trailer away. The suspects ran from the alley of [REDACTED] E. Glass after crashing into a fence, and each officer took a piece of the investigation to resolve it quickly and efficiently. Ofc. Aspaas worked a traffic special at Diamond & Market and wrote several citations, and Ofc. Graves made an appearance at the "Caring for Kids" event for St. Anne's shelter and Morning Star Boys Ranch, which was to be covered by KHQ.

Team 10 – Power Shift

- It was a very busy week with all the new radio changes. There are several issues that are being forwarded up the chain. Self-initiated took another big hit this week due to the increased call load and increased time that some priority 3s are now taking.
- Budget Solution Idea—Pay for SIU Detective's out of seizure money and make more seizures. Use what was general fund money for those detectives to save jobs.
- Sgt. Anderson worked the construction zone at Wellesley and Division. Several of the barrels and cones have been run over and knocked down multiple times. The construction workers have complained about speeding vehicles and vehicles driving through blocked off areas while they are trying to work. He wrote four construction zone speeding tickets on Tuesday night.
- Ofc. Rogan contacted ROP [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] N. Pittsburg. He was outside yelling and causing problems and he was arrested for PCS Meth. [REDACTED] stated he is mad at [REDACTED] and will get pay back for stealing his items.



Weekly Wrap-Up for Wednesday, Sept 22th, 2010

- Cpl. Oien recovered a fresh stolen Jeep at Milton/Olympic and tried tracking with K9 which was unsuccessful. Items were collected and submitted for prints. This prompted additional surveillance in the area between Wellesley and Rowan west of Alberta. Several stolen vehicles have been taken and recovered in the location during the past two weeks.
- Ofc. Bulkley worked on neighborhood issues out in Indian Trail, parking issues off of Pacific Park and Indian Trail and Speeders on Indian Trail Rd. He also worked on West Central neighborhood issues; Noise at Dutch Jake park, fights between neighbors at [REDACTED] W. Broadway and [REDACTED] W. Mallon; as well as worked Shadle Park shopping center on vehicle prowlers.
- Ofc. Matthew responded to [REDACTED] N Monroe, a party/nuisance house. The property owner is [REDACTED]. There have been two large parties within two weeks with at least 50 to 60 guests each time and responses have been for noise and fights. The parties are usually on Friday night. Ofc. Matthew also worked on vehicle recovery and vehicle prowling increases in the SFCC area.
- Ofc. Wheeler and Ofc. Edwards made sure that [REDACTED] spent more time in jail. [REDACTED] had been out of jail for only four hours when they arrested him again with [REDACTED] was arrested for 1st UPS/PCS w/ Intent and Poss of a Stolen Firearm. [REDACTED] was arrested for PCS. The vehicle [REDACTED] was driving was taken and Ofc. Edwards wrote a search warrant for the vehicle. During the search of the vehicle, Ofc. Edwards seized [REDACTED] just over three ounces of methamphetamine and a stolen .40 caliber Beretta.
- Ofc. Wheeler did more patrol around [REDACTED] E. Bridgeport. Short stay traffic is starting to pick up again. He stopped several cars seen at the location and they were loaded with Stat-5s. Ofc. Wheeler also stopped a vehicle seen leaving the area of [REDACTED] N. Crestline. The vehicle was being driven by [REDACTED] She had [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in the vehicle. [REDACTED] had three prescription bottles on him that were prescribed to him. [REDACTED] advised us when she came to get the vehicle that [REDACTED] is selling the pills and getting [REDACTED] high on them.
- Ofcs. Bishop and Rosenthal rode together for three days catching Ofc. Rosenthal up to speed after being gone for a year. Ofc. Rosenthal will be with Ofc. Rogan next week.

SOUTH SIDE

Team 7 – Swing Shift

- Ofcs. Howe and Kennedy doubled and are continuing to search for armed subject [REDACTED] Also, looking for criminal subject [REDACTED] They assisted SIU on a search warrant where [REDACTED] was arrested.
- Ofcs. Kakuda and Brash doubled and were looking for [REDACTED] (local wants) and other east side wanted subjects. They located [REDACTED] wanted on a DOC warrant.
- [REDACTED] (ROP) was released from Spokane Co Jail at 0300 hrs. on 091810 after he was arrested during the search warrant at Autoworks, 2515 E. Sprague. After being released from jail, he searched for [REDACTED] finding her at [REDACTED] E. Boone at approx. 1130 hrs. He assaulted her and another person. He then drove a vehicle in a reckless manner and backed up into a parked vehicle causing considerable damage to that vehicle, then left the scene. Officers attempted to locate [REDACTED] at several locations but were unable to find him. [REDACTED] is wanted for city assault DV, city assault, reckless driving, hit and run, and DWLS. Ofc. Denton spent over 3 ½ hours completing the investigation and paperwork.

Team 11 – Power Shift

- Officers recovered two stolen cars in two incidents. In one was [REDACTED] who was arrested for Possession of a Stolen Vehicle.

- Officers identified two subjects likely involved in vehicle prowlings around the Arena during an event on 09/09/10. The subjects are very extensive theft/drug subjects: [REDACTED] was arrested on outstanding warrant.
- Officers spent time prowl checking Brown's Addition due to the increase in vehicle prowlings.
- Officers spent time prowl checking the southwest core area of downtown due to the increase in graffiti there.
- Officers identified a suspect vehicle in the Logan/GU occupied Burglaries. Officers also developed information the suspect may now be armed after stealing a gun in one of the Burglaries. Officers spent a significant amount of time checking for the vehicle/suspect and did a special on 09/10/10.
- Officers responded to a stabbing in downtown Spokane. Officers located and arrested the suspect for 1st Degree Assault after a short chase and the use of a K-9.
- Officers spent a significant amount of time working on information developed by Detective Robertson on the smash and dash Burglaries on the upper South Hill.
- Officers responded to multiple fight and other nuisance calls in the [REDACTED] block of W. Dean and along Nettleton from Broadway to Dean. This area has been very active the last few weeks.
- Officers continued to work on the City Hall parking lot parties.
- Officers were able to locate and arrest [REDACTED] on a Third Degree Assault warrant (assault on an officer) at the location listed on the daily flyer. [REDACTED] has severe mental health issues.
- Officers arrested ROP [REDACTED] at the Tradewinds. An anonymous tip led us to that location. Upon contact, [REDACTED] fled out the back third floor balcony and hid a couple of rooms away, where he was captured.
- Officers followed up on two different hit and run collisions. There were no license plates for either suspect vehicle, but officers were able to identify the drivers in both cases and established P.C. for charges of hit and run on both.
- Officers have been doing numerous prowl checks at 8th/Lincoln for stolen vehicles, Stevens and Cliff Drive for parties, Brown's Addition for car prowlers, Helena and 7th Avenue for Malicious Mischief issues, and 1600 W Clarke for drug activity.
- Officers worked the East Sprague corridor looking for a vehicle SIU asked to identify. Officers also contacted several prostitutes on East Sprague. There has been a significant increase of prostitution over the past months from Sprague and Division to Sprague and Fancher.
- Officers arrested one bicycle thief and identified another from GU and collected their tools of the trade as evidence. This has been an ongoing problem in this area.
- Officers arrested a drug suspect and gained Intel on two separate drug houses. One busy location is [REDACTED] E Mallon. Information was given to SIU to work.
- Officers arrested [REDACTED] after vehicle pursuit. [REDACTED] is very extensive with 20 prior felony convictions. He was arrested for Attempting to Elude, PCS-Heroin, DWLS 3rd and two outstanding felony warrants and one misdemeanor warrant. [REDACTED] was involved with suspicious activity/drug exchanges at the Zip Trip at Illinois and Perry prior to the pursuit. Officers responded back to the Zip Trip later and identified four other people there that may be involved as well.

Monthly Update

Monthly Update for August

- Abandoned Auto tow numbers were down. This decrease was partially attributed to a false increase at the beginning of 2009 when a lot of cars were initially towed. This fluctuation has been sufficiently explained.
- Rear end collision numbers have been increasing since February and as of June were at 90 for the month. This was initially thought to be affected by the new Photo Red cameras, but the timeframe does not fit. Due to construction on Nevada, the cameras at Division/Francis were looked at to see if traffic diverting from Nevada could have played a part. We will now need to look into where these collisions occurred to determine the cause of the increase.

AIM Report Card

- The goal to reduce crime in Spokane by 25% is still not close to being accomplished. Burglary numbers have increased by 25%, vehicle prowling numbers have increased 9% and vehicle theft numbers have increased 28%. The department's goal of indicting 10 major drug suppliers was achieved in August.
- A goal was also set to reduce the same crimes listed above by 25% in the northeast part of Spokane. When there were proactive teams focused on that area, crime was down. Now that we no longer have a specific proactive team, the crime rates have increased. In 2011 the department will have two teams assigned to proactive work. These teams will have the same officers, sergeants and lieutenants and will be much more consistent. Once those teams are formed, we will be able to see if there is a direct link between proactive work in the northeast and crime rate.
- We can also gauge effectiveness through ROPs. Although it is difficult to track over large periods of time, short term effects can be seen. For example; if one specific ROP is in jail, Crime Analysis can see the rates drop while they are in jail. Once they are released, those numbers increase again. Carly Cortright advised that we may be able to see more long term effects if we start grouping the ROPs by their MO and tracking their patterns. Carly Cortright and Ryan Shaw will brainstorm ideas on how to best monitor the ROPs' activity.

Crime Trend Debrief

Ryan Shaw provided this week's crime statistics:

- Commercial burglaries were more than double last week and there was no name able to be tied to the burglaries. [REDACTED] was arrested for a garage burglary a week ago and may be contributing to these. The 3100 block of N Monroe has seen an increase.

- Cash registers were targeted in past weeks and those have dropped off. Det. Robertson is working a couple different groups of juveniles that are linked to several commercial burglaries.
- Ofc. Eckersley did good follow-up on a getaway vehicle in a garage burglary. Most of these burglaries are spread out. Three detectives are working two different people, which should be processed today.
- Vehicle prowling has increased, but is not in the red. Vehicle theft is within normal range this week.
- Prowlers have been targeting the Emerson/Garfield, West Central and Cannon Hill neighborhoods as well as downtown. NROs Downing and Redmon have been seeing an increase of bicycle thefts downtown and around Gonzaga University. [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] are possible suspects.

ROP and Prolific Offender Update

- [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED]-Det. Staben has continued to file new cases on these two. He has charged [REDACTED] with numerous felonies in connection to at least five different vehicle prowls and burglaries. [REDACTED] has been charged with several as well. Significantly, when interrogated they admitted to committing “hundreds” of vehicle prowlings.
- [REDACTED] [REDACTED] The Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU) is actively investigating [REDACTED] who appears to be a prolific car thief and vehicle prowler. He is currently out on bond from another car theft this summer.
- [REDACTED] [REDACTED]---Det. Tofsrud is investigating [REDACTED] after his name came up in a recent car theft. He has been an extremely active car thief in the past and was formerly closely associated with car thief [REDACTED] [REDACTED]
- [REDACTED] [REDACTED] Det. Koerner has been investigating [REDACTED] and currently has PC to arrest him for a couple felonies. [REDACTED] also has several active felony arrest warrants.
- [REDACTED] [REDACTED] Det. Tofsrud executed a search warrant on [REDACTED] car and located heroin and meth and has PC to arrest him for those charges. While these charges don't typically get much jail time, it will in [REDACTED] case due to his significant criminal history.
- TCU will be doing a warrant hunt again on October 7th and will be attempting to arrest [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] on our PC in addition to a number of other targets we have PC or warrants for.

Weekly Debrief

- Mayor Verner facilitated a meeting with the Prosecutors and Judges and all are on board with the ROP program. Prosecutor Mary Muramatsu attended today's meeting.

INVESTIGATIONS UPDATE

For next week, Investigations is going to look at ROPs who are engaged in residential burglaries, garage burglaries and vehicle prowlings. Captain Braun will coordinate with patrol. We may see a downturn due to the arrest of [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] [REDACTED]. See ROP and Prolific Offender Update above.

Major Crimes Unit

- Major Crimes detectives are currently assisting on two officer involved shootings as well as working four open homicide cases. Most recently they are investigating a death of a one year old child and got a confession from the suspect.



Meeting Minutes for Wednesday, September 29, 2010

- On September 28, 2010, Spokane Police officers responded to a request made by the Spokane Fire Department, regarding an unconscious 13 month old child. The mother of the small boy found him in his crib, unresponsive, and called for Medics. The child was transported to a local hospital and pronounced dead.

Spokane Major Crimes detectives responded to investigate the suspicious death. Their investigation led to the arrest of [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] for 1st degree Murder. [REDACTED] was booked into the SCJ about 10pm last night. It appears the child's mother has been dating [REDACTED] for the past six months. She lives in the apartment with [REDACTED] and her two small children (13 month old and a 4 year old). She left the home yesterday morning, leaving her kids in the care of [REDACTED]. When she returned home around 4pm, she noticed bruising and redness on her 4 year old. The mom checked on the baby and found him unresponsive.

[REDACTED] had been listed as the primary suspect in a separate active child abuse investigation. On May 5, 2010, Spokane Police responded to 2700 West 4th St regarding the assault of a 6 month old baby girl. The infant survived the assault but now suffers blindness and mental retardation. Investigators determined the assault on the infant had occurred up to 18 hours before the police report was made and detectives were unable to develop probable cause to arrest [REDACTED]. Detectives also learned [REDACTED] had assaulted the 6 month old baby a week prior to the May incident.

In addition to the 1st degree Murder charge [REDACTED] was arrested for yesterday, detectives plan on charging him with two counts of 1st Degree Assault from the May incidents, as well as a felony assault charge from yesterday's assault of the 4 year old boy.

Sexual Assault Unit

- Detectives have a solid arrest from the rape incident that occurred in Corbin Park as well as solved a kidnapping case.
- There is no pattern to the reports that are coming into the unit.

SIU

- SIU served a search warrant on [REDACTED] [REDACTED] residence and found he was in possession of stolen cars and parts. This may have some effect on vehicle theft numbers.
- SIU is also working multiple grow houses which could tie into medical marijuana.

Officer Draper – Southeast/Southwest

- Peaceful Valley/Transient Camping Update---This project has gone very smoothly with help of the Parks Dept. Signs will be installed at several locations that access the River along Peaceful Valley that read: No Camping – Violators Subject to Arrest - Transient Shelter Ordinance 10.08B.060. Ofc. Draper requested input from the community, Parks, and SPD for what the signs should read along with where they should be posted. He received a lot of constructive community and Police Department feedback related to this. Ofc. Draper has also patrolled the River Bank and had debris removed from camps. Ofc. Thomas and Ofc. Draper patrolled the River bank along with Beacon Hill on 09/22/10 and made several contacts.
- ■■■ E. 40th (Chronic Nuisance)---On 07/20/10, Ofc. Draper served the property owner with Chronic Nuisance related to the rental property for numerous complainants that have dated back over one year. He was told then eviction would occur, but it did not. Ofc. Draper followed up on the property and found further police responses and talked with neighbors again who stated the problem had not been resolved. Ofc. Draper contacted the property owner again and met with him on 09/22/10 and they signed a C/N Abatement Plan that included; no criminal activity for one year, and no CFS to the property related to Chronic Nuisance. The property owner signed the contract and stated he would evict this time based on the latest information.
- ■■■ E. 40th/Party House Nuisance property---This property has overlapping CFS with ■■■ E. 40th. Ofc. Draper has only two confirmed Nuisance related calls, but several complaints through C.O.P.S. SE about the property. Fight Calls, Noise and High Traffic at all hours are the general complaints. Neighbors further believe vehicle prowling and burglaries in the neighborhood are related to this property. Ofc. Draper has sent a letter to the property owner and requested a meeting to discuss the issues there.
- ■■■ S. Sky View/Neighborhood meeting pending---This property was brought to Ofc. Draper's attention about one year ago. It is an owner occupied home with two teenage boys. One neighbor has been vocal saying there is MJ usage and possible MJ sales from the home. The complaints are related to smelling MJ from the backyard, a boat in the driveway, teenagers coming and going at all hours, suspending driving, and the general neglect of the home compared to neighborhood standards. This has been a difficult project for Ofc. Draper to work on. There are very few CFS to the home, and only one neighbor calling in complaints, yet other neighbors are upset from what he has been told, but they refuse to become involved. Ofc. Draper is in the process of trying to put together a neighborhood meeting to learn and address concerns. Ofc. Draper has also been asked to discuss SAFE STREETS with them. At this time they are looking at the 4th or the 11th of October for a meeting.
- ■■■ S Inland Empire Way (the old Motor Inn Motel, now apartments)/Drugs---A neighbor asked Ofc. Draper for help with this property that seems to be overrun with drugs (Meth). Complaints of constant walk up and vehicle short stay traffic, drug paraphernalia in the area, and fights. Ofc. Draper's research shows that at least three of the eight units may have drug related activity since July 1st. Units ■■■ and ■■■ show police responses with mention of drug activity. Ofc. Draper is working with patrol on this issue. He is also contacting the property management company. This property is also said to be related to drug activity at ■■■ W. 26th. Ofc. Draper has also completed an FI for drugs.
- ■■■ W. 26th/Drugs---Same complainant from ■■■ S. Inland Empire Way also states traffic from ■■■ W. 26th comes and goes from the Inland Empire property. Tenants at this property have been contacted by police on calls at the ■■■ Inland Empire Way address. States subjects often seem high on meth. This property also receives constant short stay traffic. Ofc. Draper is working on this with patrol and has also completed an FI for drugs.



Meeting Minutes for Wednesday, September 29, 2010

- 4th and D / 5th and D Street (Prowler)---Ofc. Draper received a complaint that a 50 year old W/M has been hanging out in the area as children are getting off the school bus at 4th and D street. Ofc. Draper contacted this and other neighbors who several of which have also seen the individual, who lives at [REDACTED] W 4th. While investigating this, Ofc. Draper learned about another male watching children in the area that is unrelated. This second male is in a brown two tone van and shows up around 1600 hours at 5th and D Street. Ofc. Draper has asked all the neighbors to report this activity and he has been driving through the area in the afternoons looking as well. Ofc. Draper also informed a patrol officer that is trying to get by there more frequently as well. Ofc. Draper has completed an FI.
- [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] W. Thorpe Rd (off 195)/Prowler ---Two recent burglaries in the area. Neighbor to the complainant observed a male in a green truck in the driveway of his home and followed the vehicle out of the area in the middle of the day. Ofc. Draper has been in contact with a Sheriff's Deputy that works the unincorporated area just to the west. Deputy Gould has also heard of this vehicle that is registered to [REDACTED] S. Chestnut. Ofc. Draper is doing follow up on this regarding the house. The R/O of the truck has no criminal history. (This is in very close proximity to the next item at the Canyon Bluff Apartments, unknown if related).
- Canyon Bluff Apartments (Thorpe Road and West Wood Lane)/Vehicle Prowling ---Ofc. Draper was contacted by management saying vehicle prowling is on the rise and requested extra night time patrols to supplement the night time security they have hired. Ofc. Draper also spoke with him about education of the tenants about not leaving items in their vehicles. He dropped off several of the new vehicle prowling brochures as they experience a lot of break-ins about twice a year.

Team 10 – Power Shift

- Ofc. Wheeler assisted Cpl. Vigessaa with a vehicle pursuit and he ended up in a foot pursuit across I-90 and then caught the suspect, [REDACTED] behind [REDACTED] E. 3rd. [REDACTED] had a DOC warrant along with several others and Ofc. Wheeler also found Heroin on him. He was also in possession of credit cards belonging to someone else.

Team 3 also had guard duty at Sacred Heart Hospital on a suspect in a 1st degree Burglary and Eluding that occurred on graveyard. Officer Bartlett worked a directed traffic detail on Government Way. S.F.C.C. is back in session and students in route to class are speeding on Government Way. Officer Bartlett was able to work the special from 0730 to 0900. An officer involved shooting occurred on the north side of town at 0904. Units from the south side did respond north to assist. Units rapidly were tied up because of the shooting and guarding the prisoner at the hospital. Officer Coleman was able to work with Detective Reisenauer. They worked together checking on RSOs on the south side. They were able to check on eleven RSO addresses during the shift.

When he located one he was going to call in one of the other officers to assist and then transport to jail. He was unable to locate any ROPs, but he did write several citations. - Monday, 09/27/10, Team 3 again attempted to locate ROPs. Officer Mason using the Tahoe did a city wide special and attempted to contact the following individuals:

 - [REDACTED] [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] E. Rowan---Ofc. Mason was advised by the residence that [REDACTED] was kicked out two months ago. No forwarding address.
 - [REDACTED] [REDACTED] A neighbor advised she has never seen her. There are currently two young college kids live at the house and prior to that a young family lived there.
 - [REDACTED] [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] E. Central-- [REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] is living in a camper trailer at his dad's house. His [REDACTED] lives at [REDACTED] S. Van Marter Rd. Spokane County Sheriff officers checked the address and advised he was not there.
 - [REDACTED] [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] W. Greenwood Blvd---Officer Mason contacted [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] advised she kicked him out after [REDACTED] stole her checks and forged them. She did not know where he is staying.
 - [REDACTED] [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] N. Cedar---There were new tenants at the residence. No forwarding address for [REDACTED]
- Officer Mason returned to normal patrol after not being able to locate the above ROPs to assist with the heavy call load.
- Team 3 was guarding [REDACTED] [REDACTED] at Sacred Heart Hospital and were waiting for him to be released so he could be booked on 1st degree Robbery charge. [REDACTED] had ingested Cocaine prior to being transported to jail by the Sheriff's office. The felony PC was from a city case.
- Tuesday, 09/28/10, officers became tied up on a missing 13 year old that operates at the level of a two year old. This was the second time during the work week the team was searching for him. He is very mobile and crawled out a back window of his address on Grandview. Officers were able to locate him both times. Sgt. Giannetto contacted the Chaplain's Office and they will be contacting the family reference obtaining a bracelet with a GPS tracking device. Apparently radio was familiar with the child escaping on other occasions.

Team 7 – Swing Shift

- Officers spent about three hours on a CPS issue that was generated by a call from the FBI. Information was not clear and it took a good deal of time to sort out. CPS eventually took custody of the children due to them being reported as missing persons. There is information that there may be false reporting on this incident from another state. Ofcs. Kennedy and Howe doubled, but spent an excessive amount of time on this call and were unable to work on much pro-active activity.
- On 09/25/10, transients were fighting under the I-90 Division off ramp and one subject was charged with assault. This was a follow-up from an earlier assault in the Valley during the summer. This spot is a gathering point for transients and is difficult to handle. Citizens keep giving money to panhandlers and groups keep bringing clothes and food here. It makes it an attractive place to gather for transients to gather.
- The [REDACTED] family was reported to have made a threat to kill security at the Fred Meyer on Thor. About 15 minutes later a call came in from the Hastings on 29th that a group had done a shoplift. The plate came back registered to the [REDACTED] The vehicle description was the same as the Fred Meyer call, the license plate was off by one character (Q vs O)
- [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] [REDACTED] are squatting in a vacant house at [REDACTED] E Hartson. Personal items from both were located there when officers responded for a burglary.



Meeting Minutes for Wednesday, September 29, 2010

- On 09/27/10, Ofcs. Kakuda and Brasch were paired to work on Garry Park problems. Ofcs. Kennedy and Howe paired up and were working on two drug houses near Garry Park. Calls for service prevented much self-initiated activity

Team 11 – Power Shift

- Officers responded again to chronic Nuisance address [REDACTED] S. Ivory, this time on a gun call. The incident was referred to NRO Strassenberg. He ended up booking the homeowner later in the week for Nuisance.
- Officers responded to an assault with a vehicle call in Browne's Addition. Officers located the suspect vehicle and a pursuit ensued. It was quickly terminated when the suspect drove the wrong way on the under construction 2nd Ave. Officers quickly located the suspect vehicle and the suspect based on the victim's description. The suspect was charged with Attempt to Elude, two counts of 1st Degree Assault with a weapon, and one count of 1st Degree Assault with a vehicle.
- Officers made two separate stolen vehicle arrests. Both suspects have very extensive criminal histories: [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was booked for Possession of a Stolen Motor Vehicle and his passenger [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was booked for PCS-Meth. [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was booked for Theft of a Motor Vehicle.
- Officers followed up on a prowler call on an attempted bike theft. Officers ended up developing PC on two suspects for Burglary.
- Officers continued to do prowler checks on Pioneer Park on party and noise calls.
- Officers located and arrested the suspect in the Corbin Park Rape, [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was arrested for 1st Degree Rape, 1st Degree Kidnapping, and Criminal Impersonation.
- Officers Attempted to track down/arrest [REDACTED] [REDACTED] who is currently wanted for 1st robbery. Officers have continued to check many of the transient areas and the search is continuing.

Team 13 – Graveyard Shift

- [REDACTED] E. 40th---Party house with juveniles drinking and coming/going at all hours. Neighbors are calling in the complaints.
- [REDACTED] S. Ivory---Location has been a repeat problem for several neighbors that do not get along. Creating calls for fights and persons w/weapon. No single person/house responsible for all calls.
- 916 W. 1st "Mixx"---routinely getting calls for service on fights. Typically the fights are with large groups of intoxicated/disorderly subjects that are not law enforcement friendly.
- 1st/Howard "Raw"---They have begun to entertain the 18+ crowd, causing problems that used to occur at Club Uno. Will be continuously responding for intoxicated subjects under 21yrs, fights, and T-4 subjects. Lot to south and east are hangouts when the subjects are not inside.

2010 Collision Costs

This section was added to track the costs of fixing and/or replacing SPD Fleet due to collisions involving SPD vehicles. Data will be updated each month as new collisions occur and previous incidents' data becomes available (some collisions involve Risk Management and this may take several months to receive this data).

The following includes details from January to September 2010:

There were 32 reports of collisions or property damage involving SPD vehicles. Of these, 16 were Preventable, 9 were Non-Preventable, and 7 involved Legal Intervention.¹

Total cost to date is \$124,297.43. Of this total, \$29,148.49 was Preventable, \$53,516.83 was Non-Preventable, and \$41,632.11 was for Legal Intervention.

This total includes the replacement cost for two vehicles, both estimated at \$40,000 to replace. One was deemed Non-Preventable (citizen ran red light and hit SPD vehicle) and the other was for Legal Intervention (used to PIT a vehicle in a pursuit). Adjusted to exclude these estimated totals, cost for Non-Preventable is \$13,516.83 and cost for Legal Intervention is \$1,632.11.

¹ IA Terminology: Preventable – Officer at fault; Non-Preventable – Officer not at fault; Legal Intervention – Intentional use of a patrol car to end a pursuit.

SEPTEMBER DEBRIEF OF INCIDENTS

K-9 DEPLOYMENTS

Incident #1 – Officers were in pursuit of a stolen vehicle that crashed and the suspect fled on foot. The suspect was wanted for at least two felonies and was actively evading arrest. The suspect fled into the backyard of a residence that had no ambient light. The officer deployed his K-9 who located the suspect and contacted him on the right arm which allowed officers to take the suspect into custody without further incident.

Incident #2 – WSP Troopers stopped a vehicle and the back passenger ran from the traffic stop. He was later identified and found to have a felony DOC escape warrant. The suspect had broken down a fence to gain entrance to the back yard of a residence showing that he was motivated to escape capture. The officer began tracking with his K-9. The K-9 tracked directly to the suspect who was hiding between a tree and detached garage. The K-9 contacted the suspect on the left shin area initially, but due to the suspect's flailing, the dog lost the contact and made contact again with the right shin. Officers were then able to move to the suspect and take him into custody without further incident.

Incident #3 – The suspect was threatening to throw a brick through the window of his ex-girlfriend's apartment. The suspect also had a restraining order preventing him from being at the location as well as a felony DOC warrant where he was listed as a caution subject and violent offender. The suspect fled on foot and ignored all of the officer's commands to stop. The officer chased the suspect on foot with his K-9 who caught up to and apprehended the suspect, making contact on the suspect's stomach area. The suspect was not immediately compliant and the K-9 was removed once officers determined the suspect was not armed. The suspect was taken into custody without further incident.

Incident #4 – The suspect was hiding in the attic of his residence and actively resisting arrest by doing so. The suspect had a felony warrant and a violent history of assaults and weapons. The officer gave multiple verbal announcements prior to deploying his K-9 into the attic. The K-9 searched, located and apprehended the suspect by contacting his right thigh. The suspect complied with the officer's orders to stop fighting the K-9 and he was taken into custody without further incident. The suspect admitted to hearing the K-9 announcements but did not believe officers would deploy the K-9.

TASER APPLICATIONS

Incident #1 – Officers were investigating a domestic violence situation in which the suspect attempted to leave despite lawful orders not to do so. A struggle ensued between officers and the suspect at the top of some very steep stairs. The suspect was actively resisting officers by holding onto a fence pole and struggling to break free of their efforts. One officer then applied a Drive Stun with his Taser to the rear part of the suspect's neck, which was effective and officers were able to control the suspect.

LATERAL VASCULAR NECK RESTRAINTS

Incident #1 – Officers contacted an intoxicated male who was walking with a little girl. Due to the age of the young girl, officers were concerned for her well-being. An officer had the male sit down on the curb. He tried to stand up and was escorted back to the curb. The male became angry, started swearing at the officers and stood up in a quick motion. The officers took arm control and the male became tense and rigid. He was able to get his left hand free and swung it backwards, hitting one officer in the face. The male then spun around and swung towards another officer, punching him on the upper left arm. One officer transitioned into a Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint and eventually rendered the male temporarily unconscious allowing officers to handcuff him.

Incident #2 – Officers were responding to a report of domestic violence and as they approached the location, the suspect was leaving in his vehicle. Officers attempted to stop the vehicle, which did not make any effort to stop. The suspect led the officers on a pursuit two to three miles into the mountains and finally stopped when it collided into a tree. The suspect fled from the crash and began to fight with officers as they contacted him. Both officers were reaching complete exhaustion and one officer utilized a Level 2 Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint rendering the suspect unconscious and allowing him to be handcuffed.

Incident #3 – An officer located a suspect that had escaped during a vehicle pursuit. The suspect was non-compliant and tried to flee into his residence. The suspect's domestic partner started to come to the aid of the suspect. To control the rapidly evolving situation and prevent injury to himself or the suspect, the officer utilized a Level 2 Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint and possibly rendered the suspect unconscious for a brief moment. The suspect was controlled and taken into custody without further incident.

Incident #4 – Officers responded to assist SFD with a combative juvenile with alcohol poisoning. The responding officer noticed that several medical personnel were trying to hold the subject down. The officer placed the subject in a Level 1 Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint, but the subject continued to be combative and it appeared he was about to kick a member of the medical personnel. The officer then transitioned to a Level 2 Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint and rendered the suspect unconscious allowing him to be restrained. Firefighters on scene stated that the use of force was more than justified and were impressed by the manner it was applied.

Use of Force Definitions

K-9 Deployments

In many instances, it is much safer for officers to search for suspects utilizing a K-9. Fleeing suspects demonstrate that they are willing to actively avoid capture and often have a plethora of hiding places in which to secrete themselves. The suspects have not been searched and it is unknown whether they possess weapons which could be used to ambush officers. The K-9s are able to locate suspects with much less risk to responding officers. The dog's sense of smell is also much more reliable than the officers' visual ability to conduct searches. The dogs prevent potential deadly force situations thereby making it safer for both officer and suspect.

Taser Applications and Lateral Vascular Neck Restraints

Taser applications and lateral vascular neck restraints are valuable tactics for officers to use when confronted with a resistive subject. Both tactics can prevent long, drawn out physical altercations which help to avoid excited delirium possibilities. When properly applied, the neck restraint and the Taser can end a fight quickly and make the apprehension much swifter; the longer the fight, the more potential for injuries to both officer and suspect as well as the possibility of excited delirium. Both tactics are likely to cause little to no injury and the recovery is quick when done.

The Taser can be applied in two ways; the drive stun, which is applied directly to the skin, or firing the probes, which will connect with a subject at a distance. There are two levels of neck restraints; Level 1 allows the officer to control the suspect and Level 2 allows the officer to render the subject momentarily unconscious giving officers several seconds to take the suspect into custody without further incident. Officers must take many things into consideration when determining whether to use a drive stun vs. firing the Taser or a Level 1 vs. Level 2 neck restraint. Severity of the crime, the threat the suspect poses and whether or not the suspect is actively resisting (assaultive or active resistance) – these questions are based on if a reasonable officer would feel the force used was appropriate.
