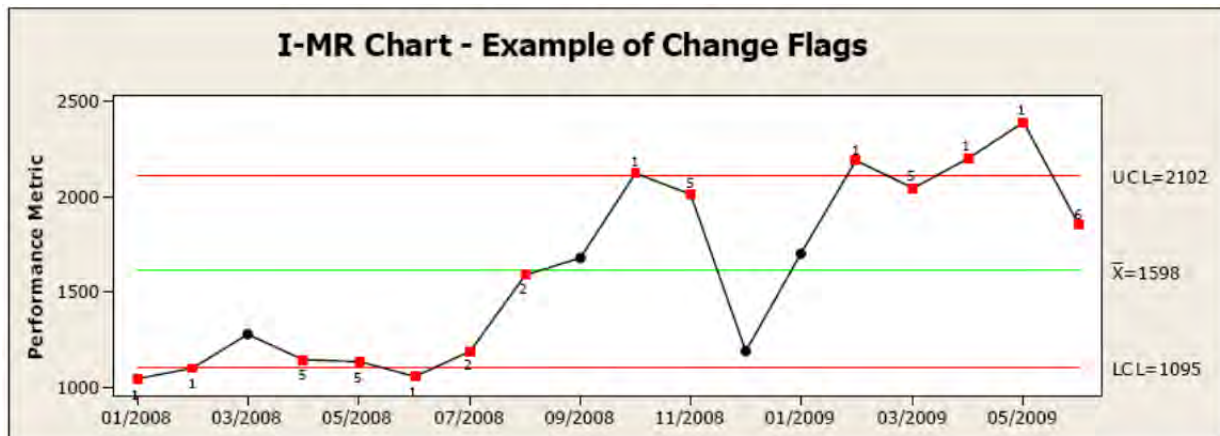
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# AIM Statistical Analysis for November 2011

Every month, the performance metrics for the various units of SPD will be analyzed with software<sup>1</sup> to determine if there has been any statistical change in performance. If a unit's metrics show no change that will simply be noted. However, if a change was noted, the graph will be attached along with a brief description of the metric in question. If a reason for the change is known, it will be noted. If the reason for change is unknown, further follow-up will be needed; results of that follow-up will be published the following month.

## Analysis Interpretation

The statistical software uses graphs to indicate when a statistical change has occurred. It flags that change with a red box and a corresponding number. Please use the following graph as reference for a translation of the various numbers and what they mean.



The green line indicates the average over the time frame displayed for the data set being measured. The two red lines represent three standard deviations both below and above the average. It is normal to have fluctuation over time; in general, a single data point within three standard deviations would be considered normal change (unless otherwise indicated).

Please reference the following for an explanation of what the different numbered flags represent:

1. One data point over three standard deviations from the average;
2. Seven data points in a row on one side of average (over or under);
3. Six data points in a row, either increasing or decreasing;
4. Fourteen data points, alternating up and down;
5. Two out of three data points in a row are above/below two standard deviations from average;
6. Four out of five data points in a row are above/below one standard deviation from average;
7. Fifteen data points in a row within one standard deviation from average;
8. Eight data points in a row above/below one standard deviation from average.

**What does a standard deviation mean?** When analyzing a data-set, it should be expected that there will be a varying range between different data points. Some data points are below average and some are above. Data that is within 1 standard deviation is representative of approximately 2/3 of the data; data that is within 2 standard deviations is representative of just over 95% of the data. The red lines in the above chart are the thresholds for 3 standard deviations from average for the data-set. This means 99.6% of the data falls between those two lines; this means it would be reasonable to expect the next data point to be within those lines almost 100% of the time. Therefore, any data above 3 standard deviations is an anomaly.

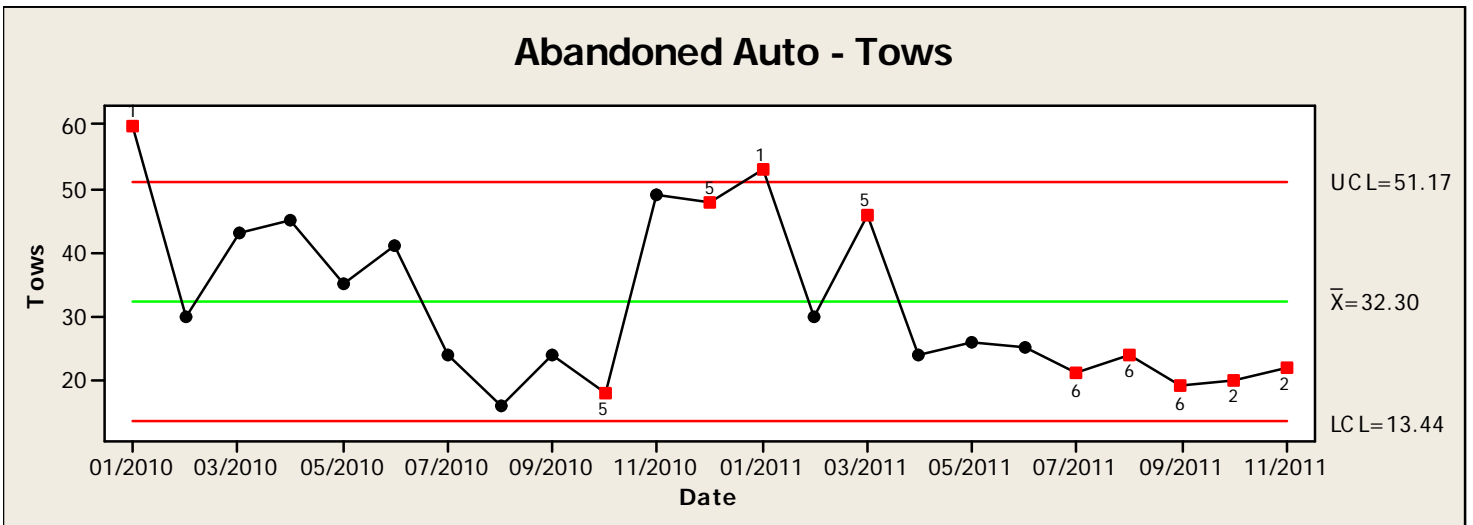

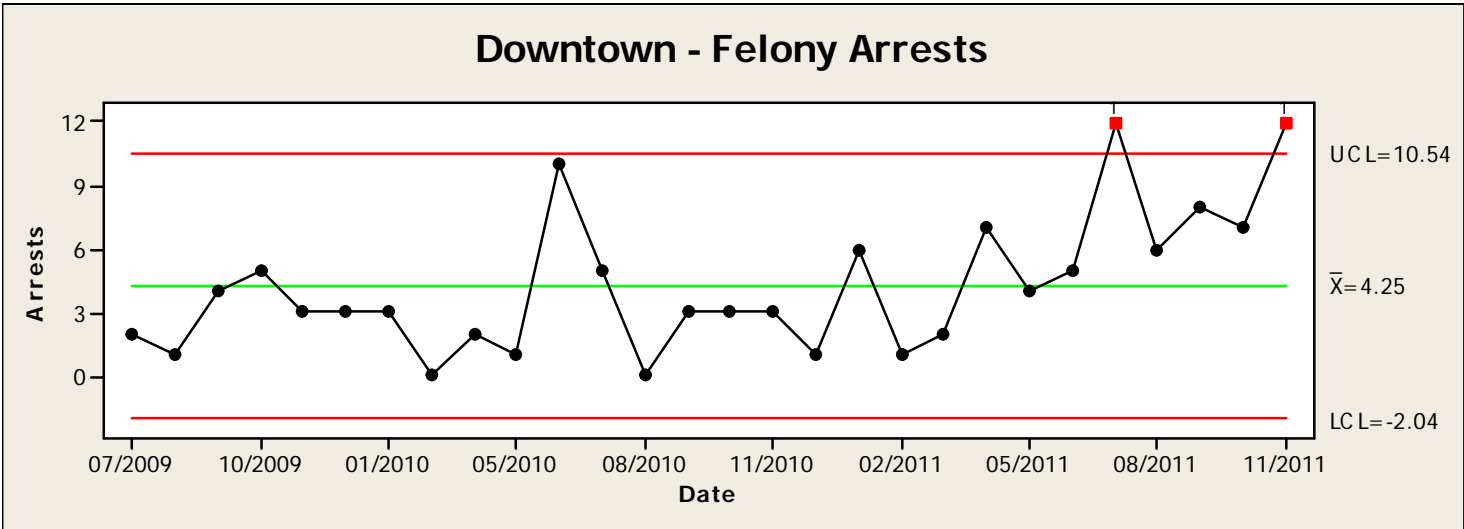
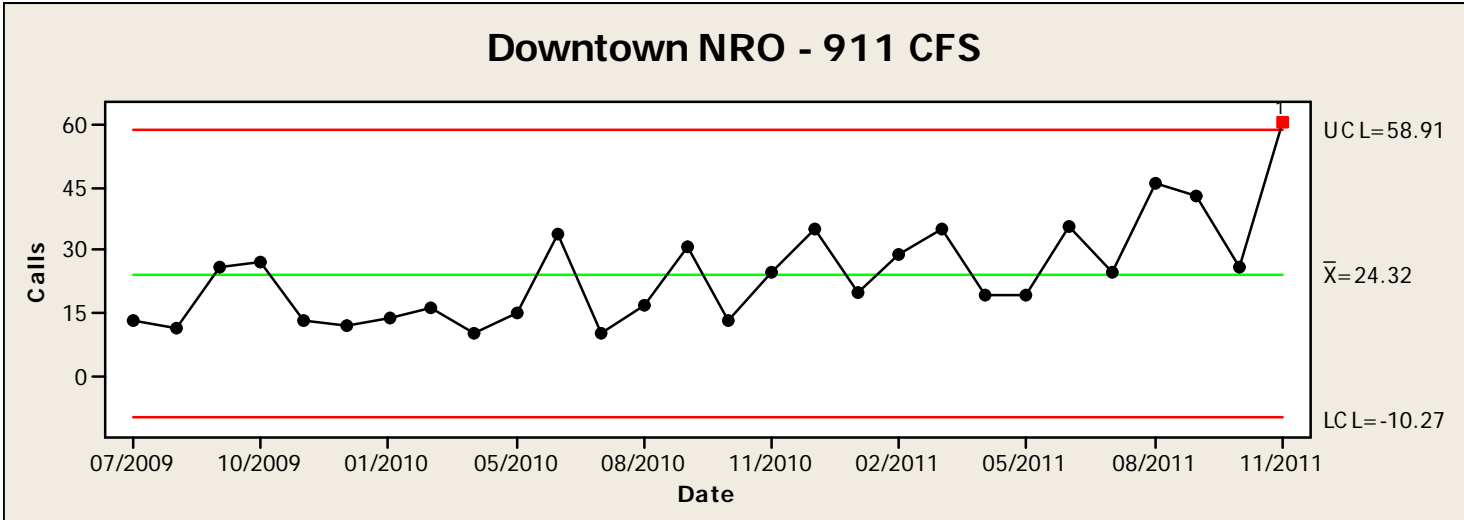

## **Downtown Neighborhood Resource Officer**

There are two metrics for this unit with anomalies for November. The first is *911 CFS*, which was well above the level expected. Correlated to that increase in 911 calls is the increase in *Felony Arrests*, which was also well above the level expected (please see graphs on following page). An increase in response to 911 calls by the Downtown Resource Officers due to limited availability of other patrol resources would create the opportunity for more arrests. No further

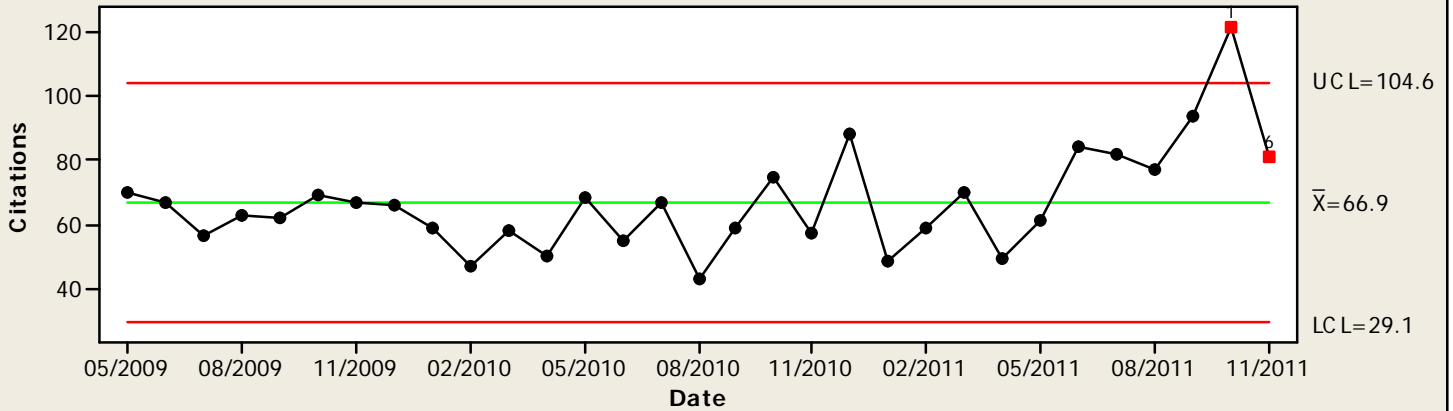
Performance metrics for this unit were not submitted for September, October, or November. Analysis will resume once data is submitted.

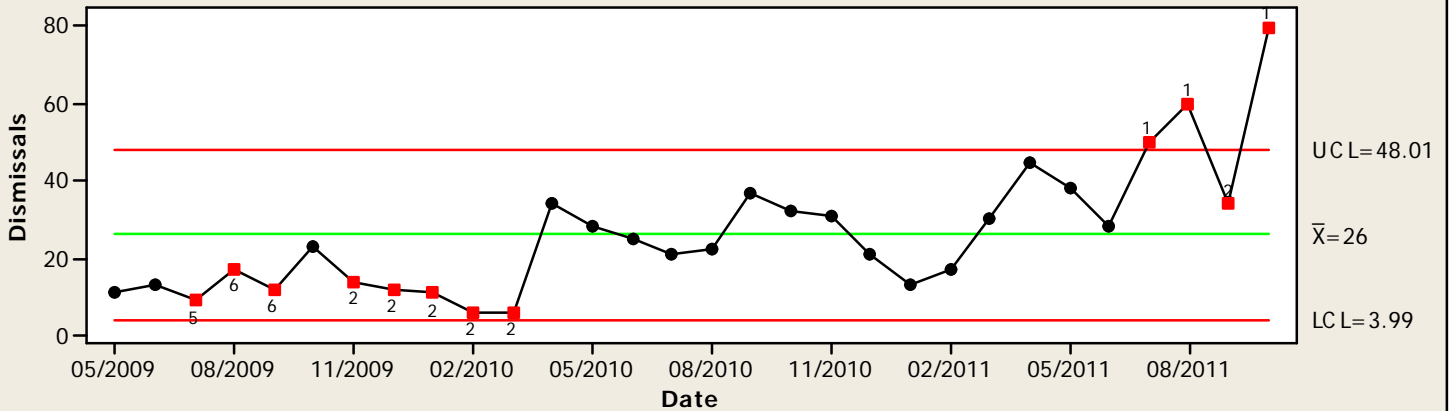

## Photo Red - Mission and Hamilton Citations



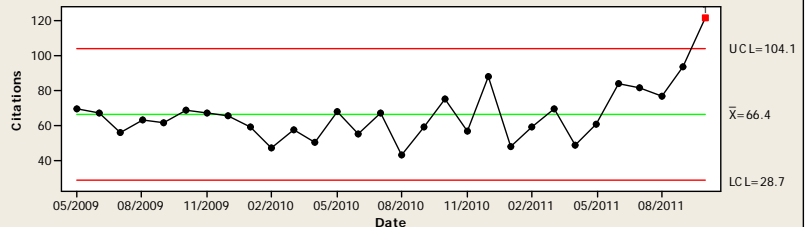
The *Dismissals* metric was well above the level expected for November. This was due to an error by our vendor; they had a delay in processing over the Thanksgiving holiday. This delay caused many citations to be past the ten day limit (citation must be issued within ten days of the violation). As such, many citations were auto-dismissed during this timeframe. No further explanation is necessary.

Follow-up was needed on *Mission and Hamilton Citations* (see thumbnail graph to right), which has been steadily increasing. The Traffic Lieutenant is developing a response plan to study the intersection to observe any driver behavior that may be contributing to this increase. The results should be available

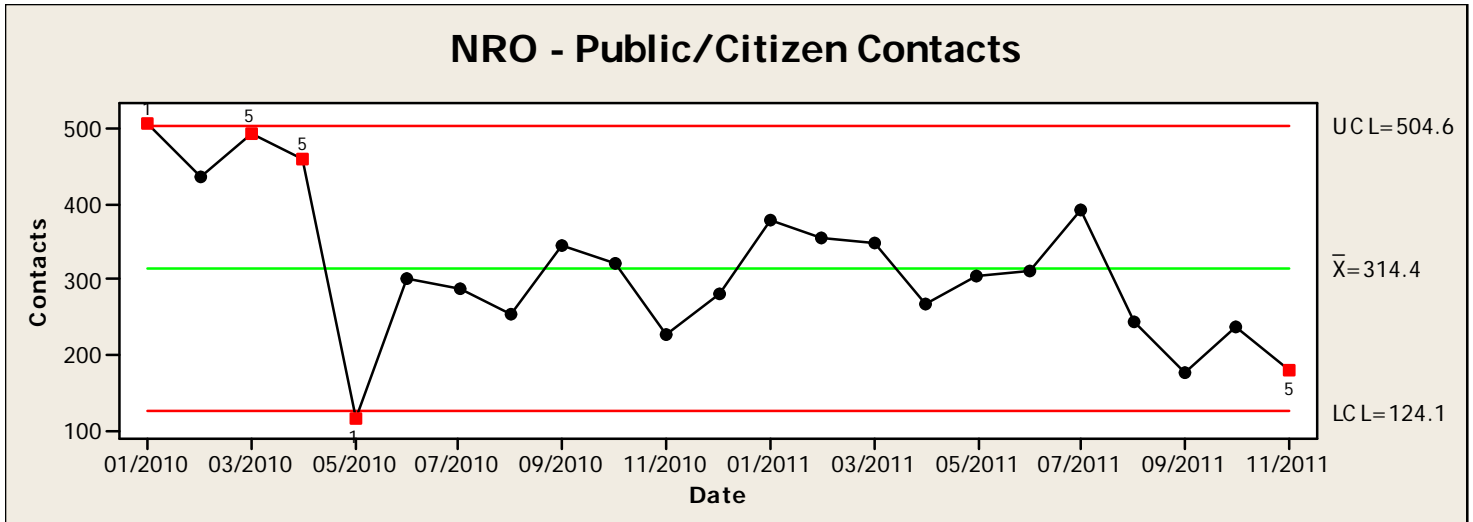
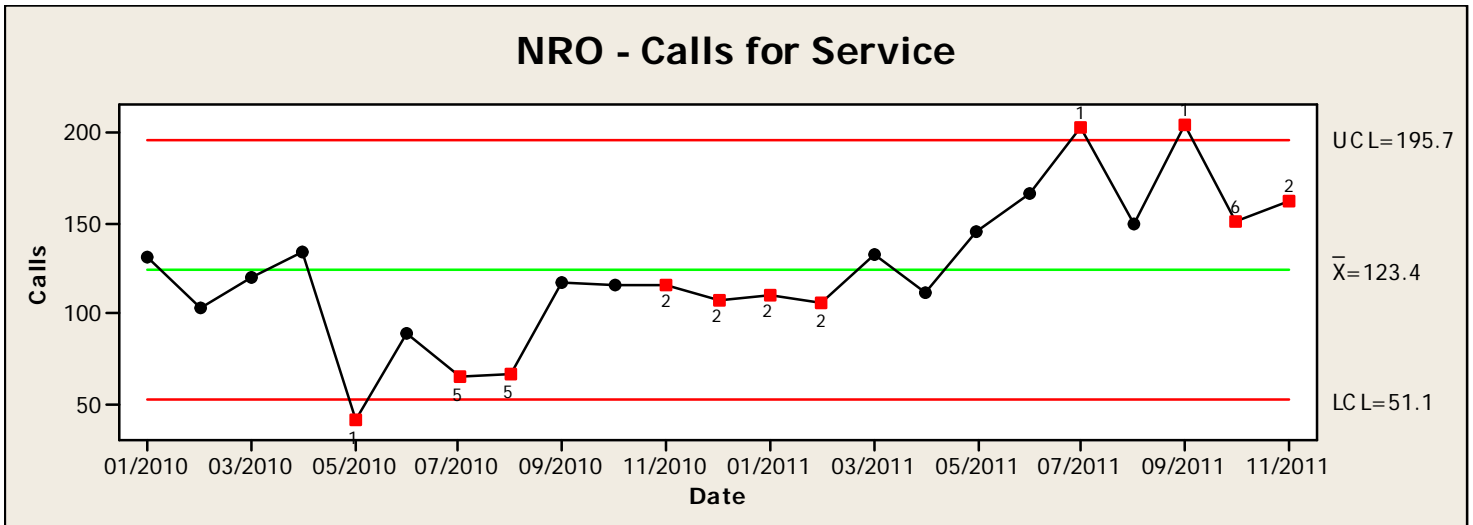

in next month's report. With the decrease in November, there is some speculation the new pedestrian traffic island that was installed on Hamilton south of Mission in the Gonzaga district could be the contributing factor to this increase; northbound drivers that stopped for pedestrian traffic may have been in a hurry to then make the light. Now that drivers have had several months to adjust to the traffic island, they may also be adjusting their behavior.

## Neighborhood Resource Officer

The *Calls for Service* metric continues to be above average for this unit. As explained in prior reports, this is due to the limited availability of Patrol units to respond to 911 calls. The NROs have been shifting responsibilities to ease the burden and provide good customer service to citizens. However, the *Public/Citizen Contacts* metric has been decreasing since August and is below the level expected in recent months. The mission of the NROs is to address neighborhood problems; follow-up is needed to determine how we can shift resources to allow them to do this.

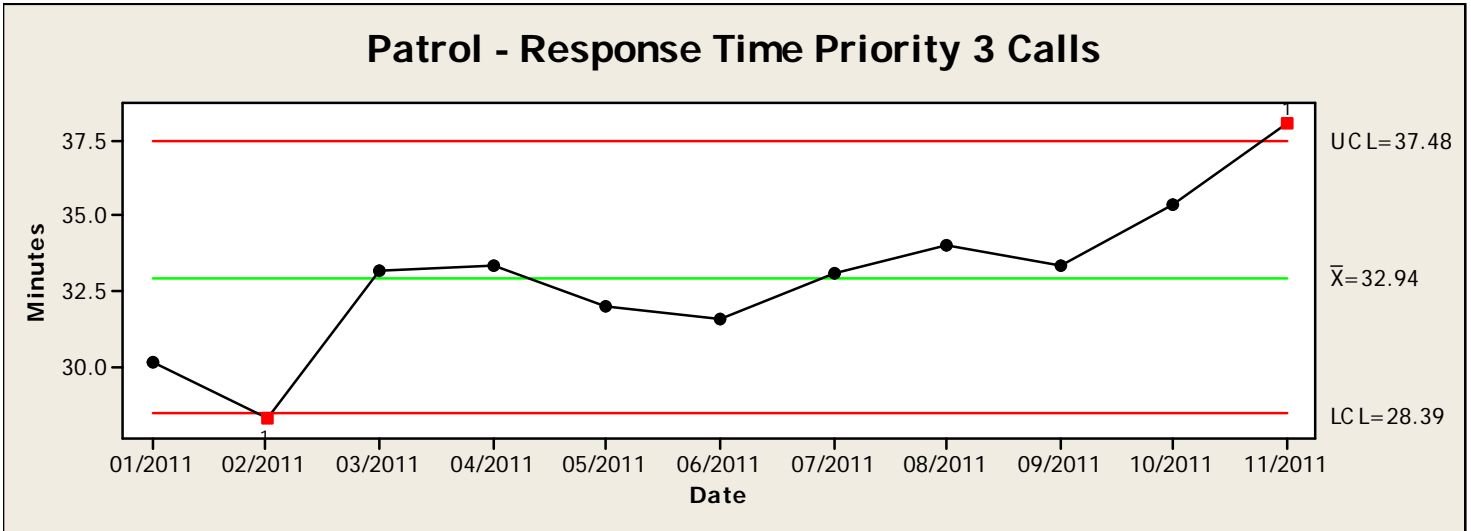

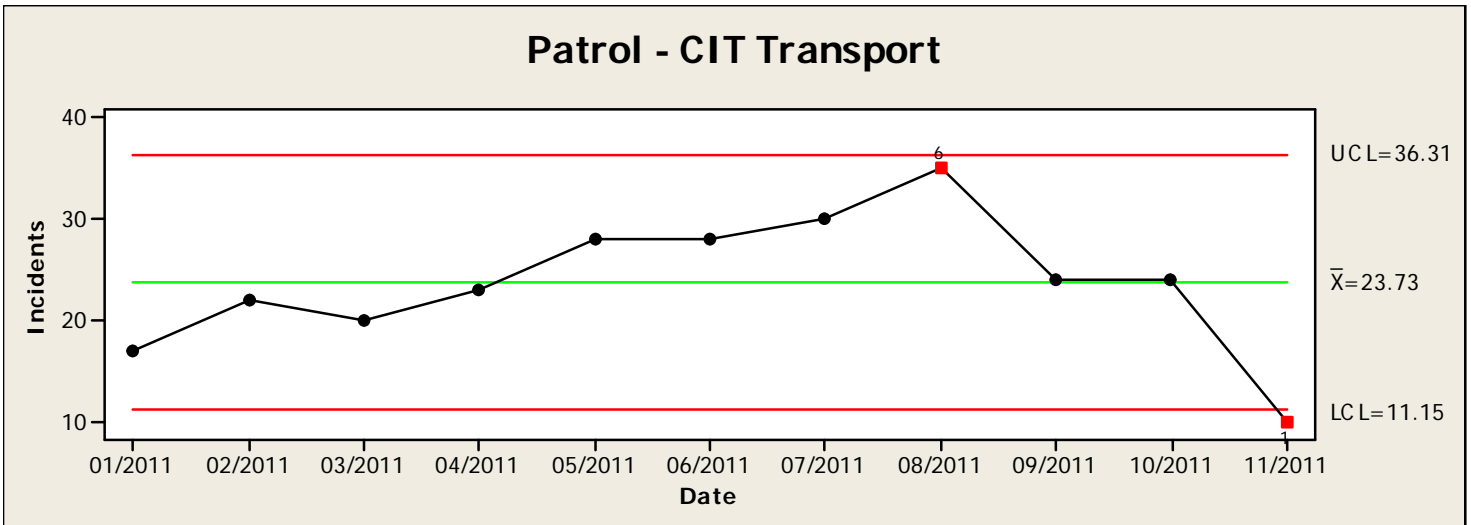

## Patrol

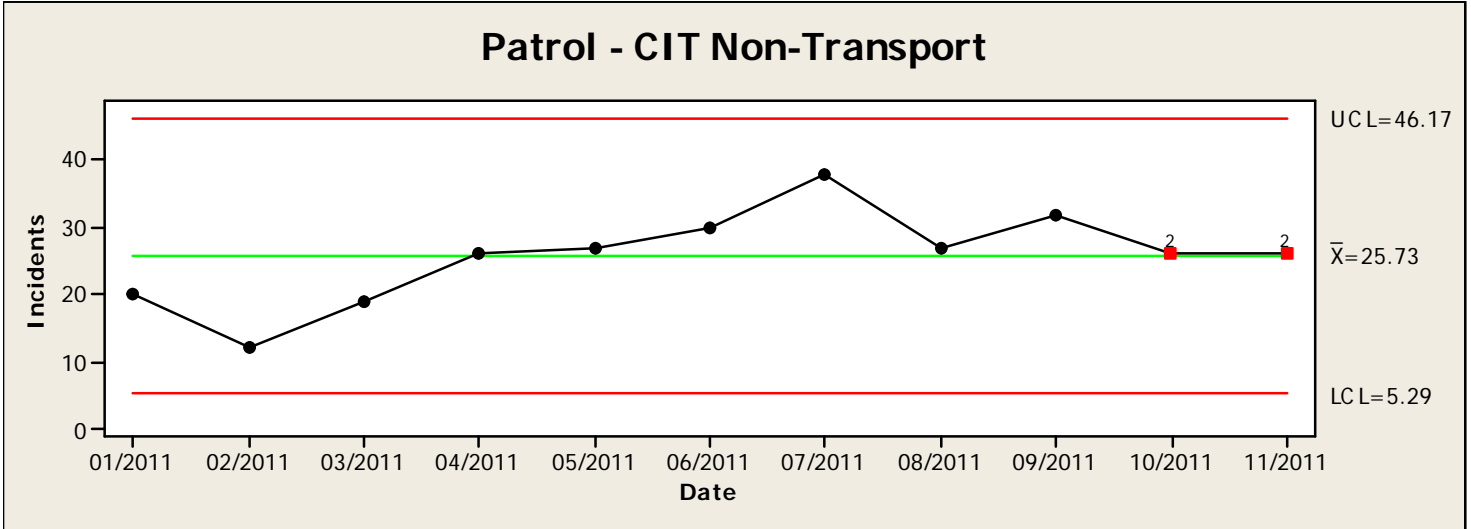
There were several metrics with anomalies for this unit for November. The first is *Response Time Priority 3 Calls*, which well above average. This was due to the implementation of two-man cars; officers pair up in one vehicle instead of individually driving their own car. This enhances officer safety as well as reducing fuel costs and vehicle wear and tear. However, it does decrease the response time to non-emergency calls since there may be fewer single units available (which is often all that is required for a priority 3 call). All patrol units were two-man units for the first two weeks of November; since that time, only half of the units are such. Response time to emergency calls was not affected; no further explanation is necessary. We do expect response time to priority 3 calls will continue to be above average.



The other two metrics are related and will be discussed together. The first is *CIT Transport*, which was well below the average expected for November. The second is *CIT Non-Transport* (please see graph on following page) which has been above average for April. These metrics measure contacts and transport of mentally ill individuals. The *CIT Non-Transport* metric measures contacts only. The *CIT Transport* indicates they were transported to a hospital or other mental health facility (or in rare cases, jail). The decrease in transports may be due limited beds available due to funding cuts at other agencies; further explanation is necessary.



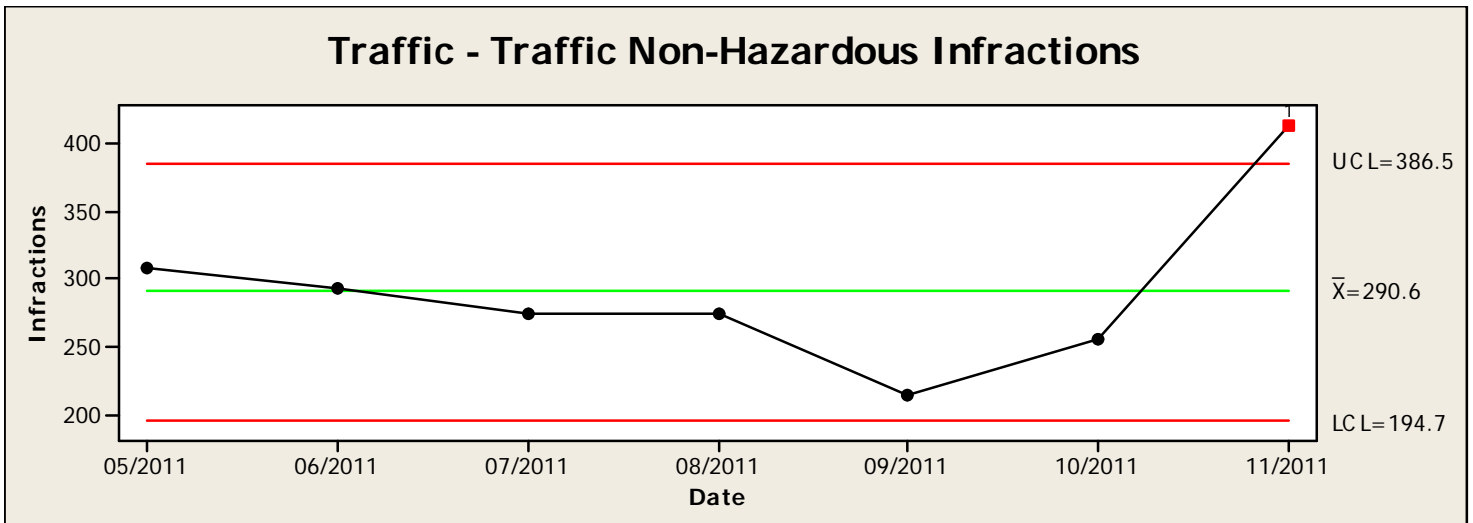

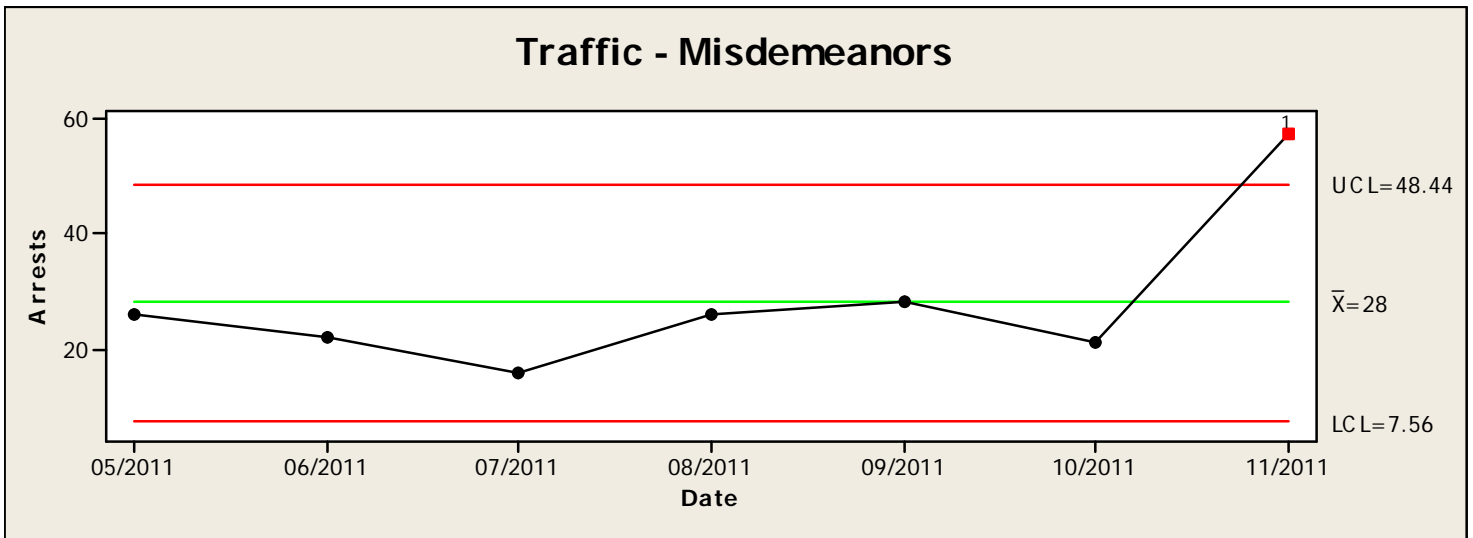
## Traffic

There were two metrics for this unit with above average performance for November; this may partially be due to the limited data set available. Due to the cuts made to this unit in May, only the most current data is being analyzed for a more accurate comparison of work production. With that in mind, *Traffic Non-Hazardous Infractions* were well above the average expected, which is positive, so no further explanation is necessary.



*Misdemeanors* (please see graph on following page) was also above the average expected for November. The reason for this increase is unknown, but since it is also a positive, no further explanation is necessary.

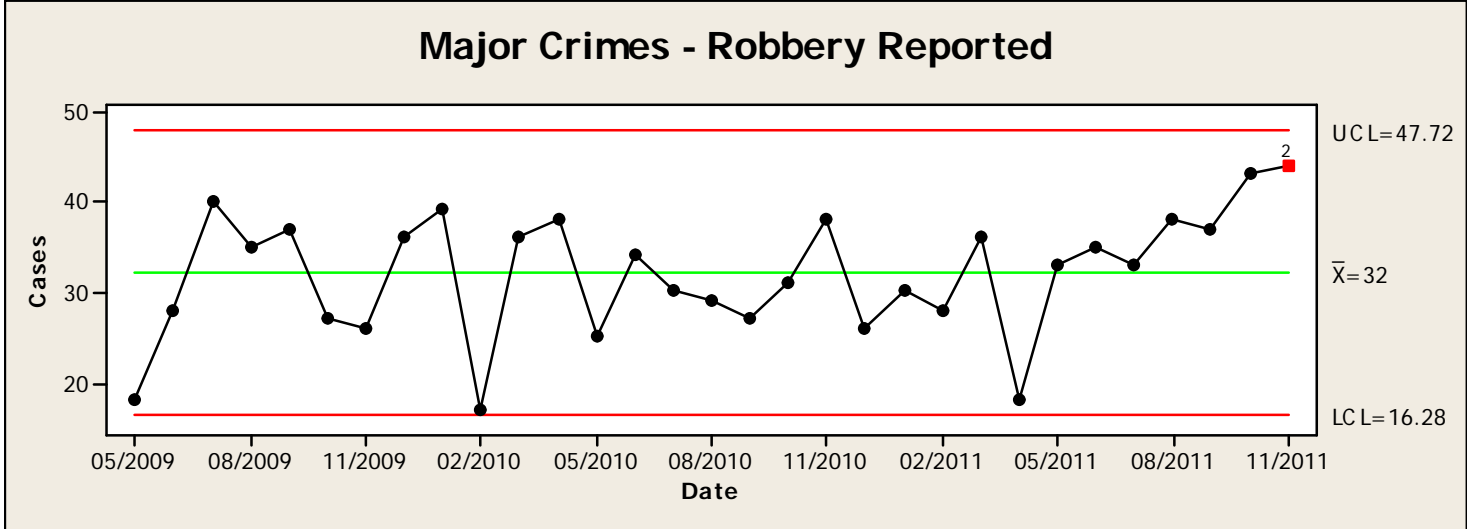

## **Major Crimes**

The *Robbery Reported* metric for this unit has been above average since May 2011 (please see graph on following page). This trend is confirmed through department Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) data; there has been nearly a 5% increase in robberies this year over 2010. This appears to be the result of the economy. In the early part of 2011, this was due to an increase in street robberies that did not appear related. In recent months, there have been more armed robberies. Crime Analysis and Major Crimes are analyzing to determine what cases are linked. We will continue to monitor; no further explanation is necessary at this time.

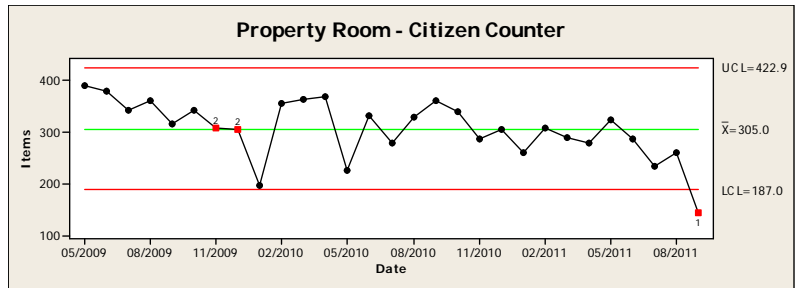

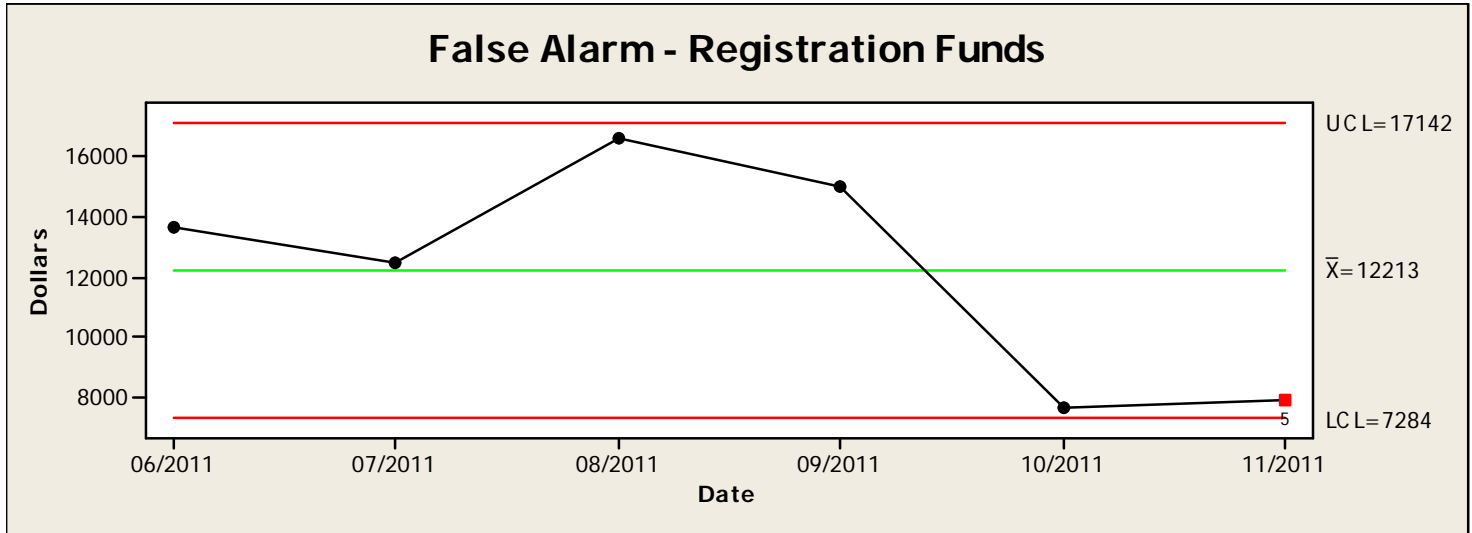


## False Alarm

There were several metrics with anomalies for this unit for November 2011. These appear to be inter-related. The first is *Total Paid*, which was below the average expected. However, *Residential Registrations* and *Registration Funds* (please see graph on following page) were also below the average expected, influencing the *Total Paid* metric. We will continue to monitor, but for now no further explanation is necessary.

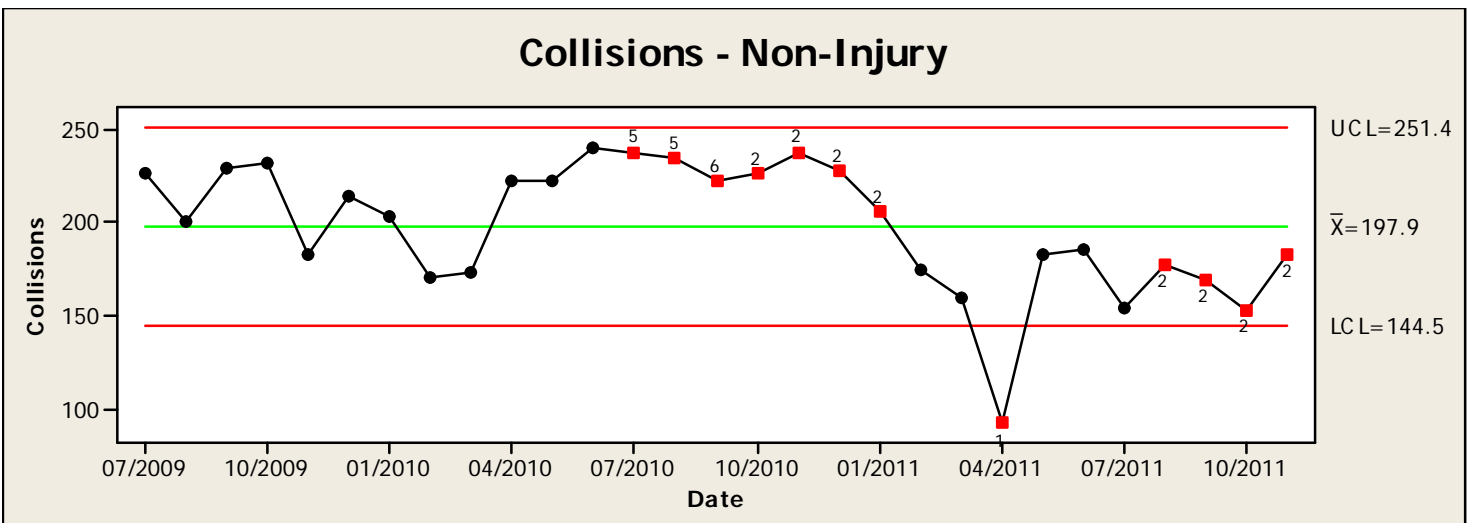

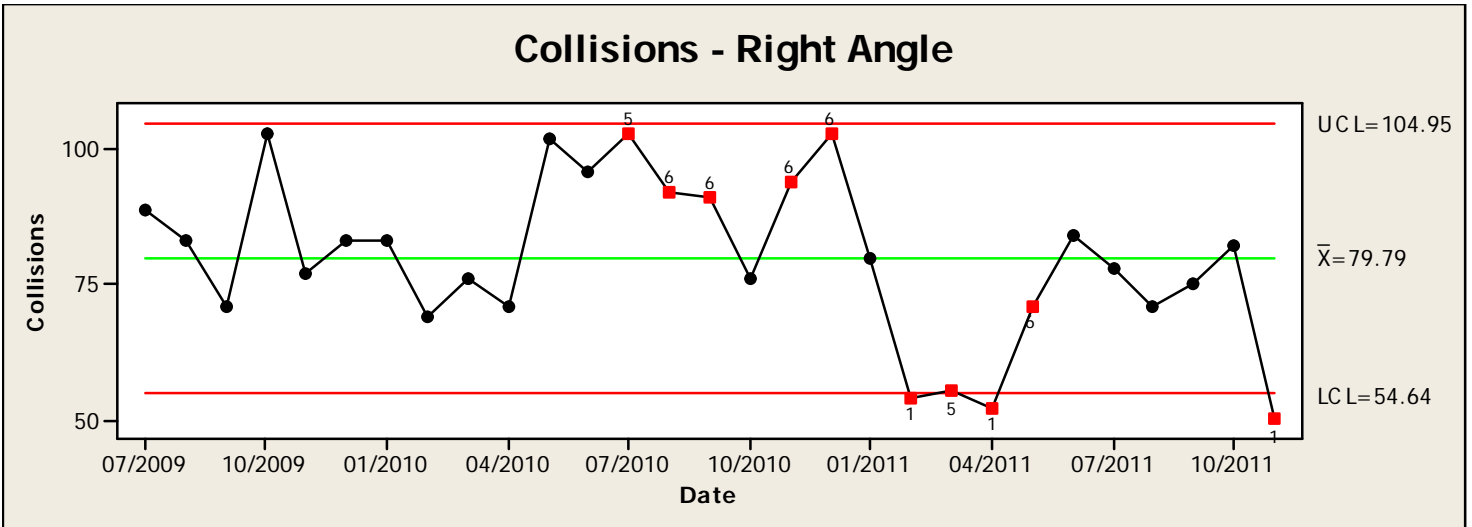
### Collisions

There were several metrics with anomalies for November. The first is *Non-Injury* collisions, which has been below average since February as this year. They did increase in November, so we will continue to monitor; with less traffic enforcement beginning in May, we are anticipating an increase in collisions in the spring of 2012.

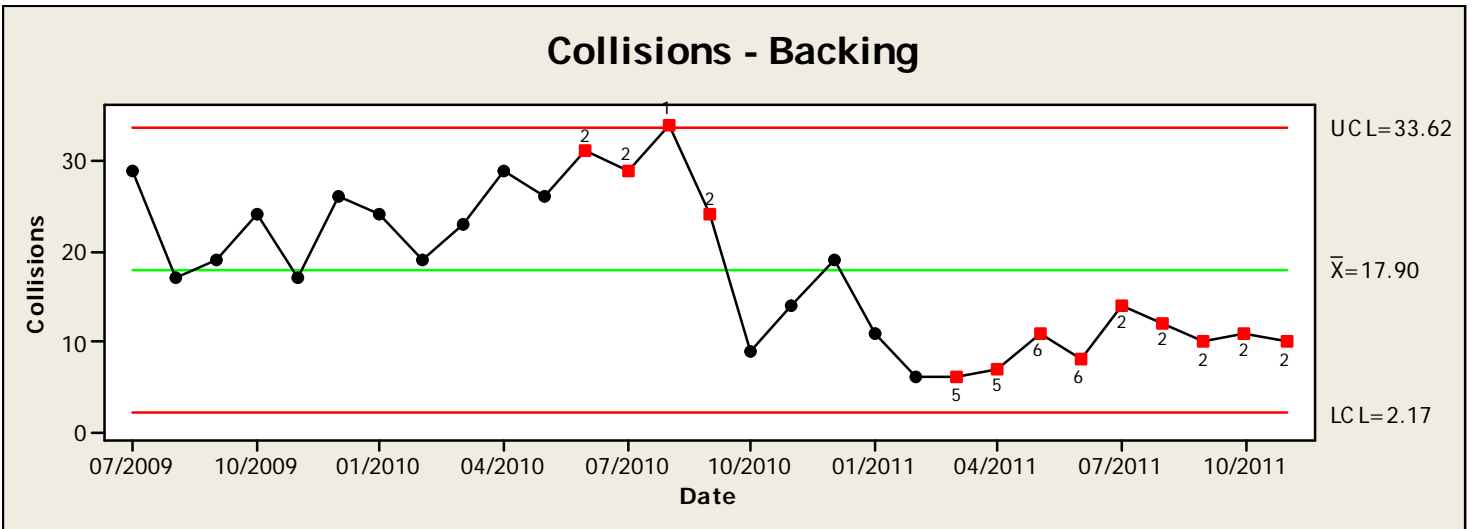

The *Right Angle* collisions metric was well below the average expected for November. This metric was also well below average February-April and then returned to normal, possibly due to construction season and heavier vehicle traffic during the summer months. At this time, no further explanation is necessary, though we will continue to monitor.



The *Backing* collisions metric has been below average since October 2010 (with the exception of December). While this could be contributed to the general decrease in collisions across all categories, the previous technician who completed the data entry of the collision information retired approximately the same time the change occurred. The data is almost a mirror image of each other (above average and below average) around that date. For that reason, further follow-up is needed to determine if the change is due to a change in data entry procedure or if it due to a change in driver behavior.

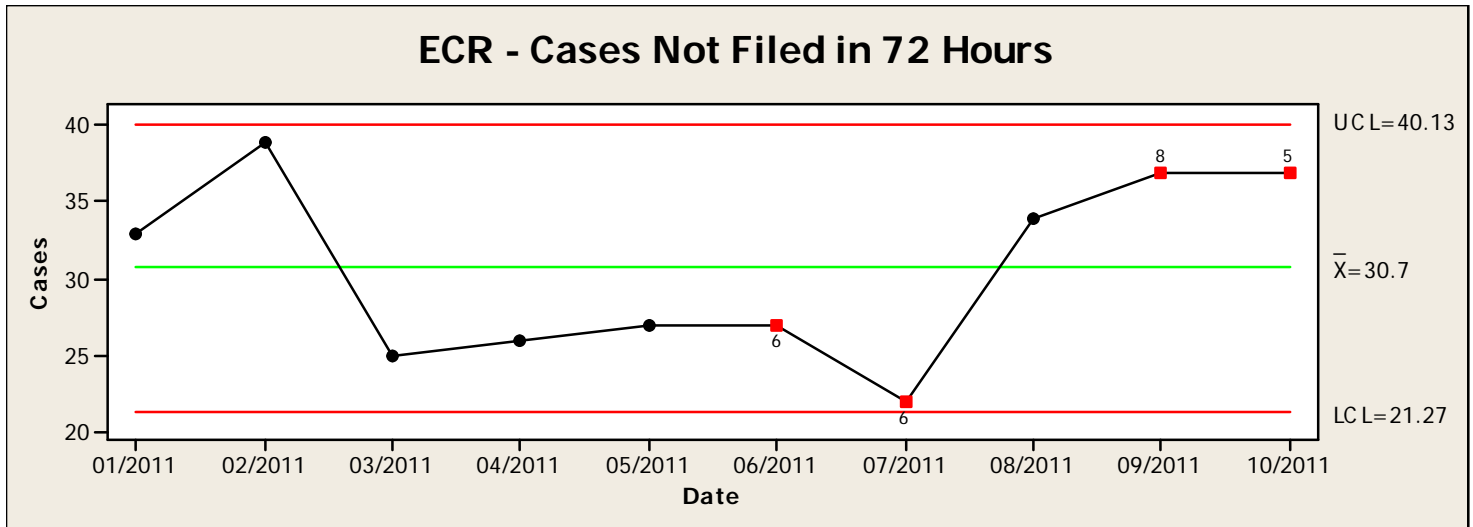

## Early Case Resolution

The *Cases Not Filed in 72 Hours* has been above the average expected the last two months. This is the metric behind Early Case Resolution – it is desirable to have cases filed within 72 hours. The number of cases filed has also increased during this time; however, a greater percentage of these have not been filed within 72 hours. Further follow-up is needed.

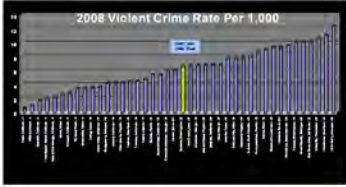

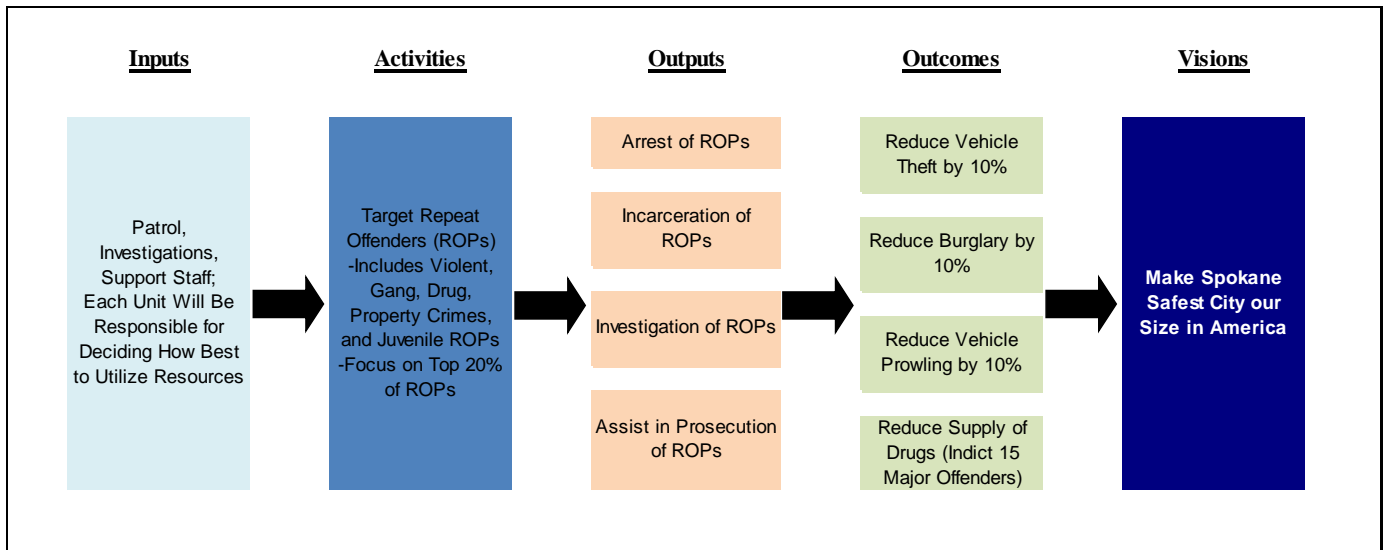


## 2011 Vision:

### “Make Spokane the Safest City Our Size in America”

The Spokane Police Department continues to work towards our vision of making Spokane the safest city our size (population 175,000 to 225,000) in America. To determine our success in this venture, we measure the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Part I<sup>1</sup> data law enforcement agencies report to the FBI.

Since the 2010 data for our comparison cities will not be released by the FBI until mid-2011, a different approach must be used to measure our success at making Spokane safer. The following logic model demonstrates how SPD plans to achieve this vision: by focusing on repeat offenders we plan to reduce Vehicle Theft, Burglary, and Vehicle Prowling (a subset of the Larceny category) by 10% compared to the prior 5-year average.



As part of AIM, a monthly report card will be included to show the most recent UCR data for the three property crime categories as well as an update on drug supplier indictments.

<sup>1</sup> Part I crimes include Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny, and Vehicle Theft. Arson is also a Part I crime, but as that is not tracked by SPD, that data is not analyzed.

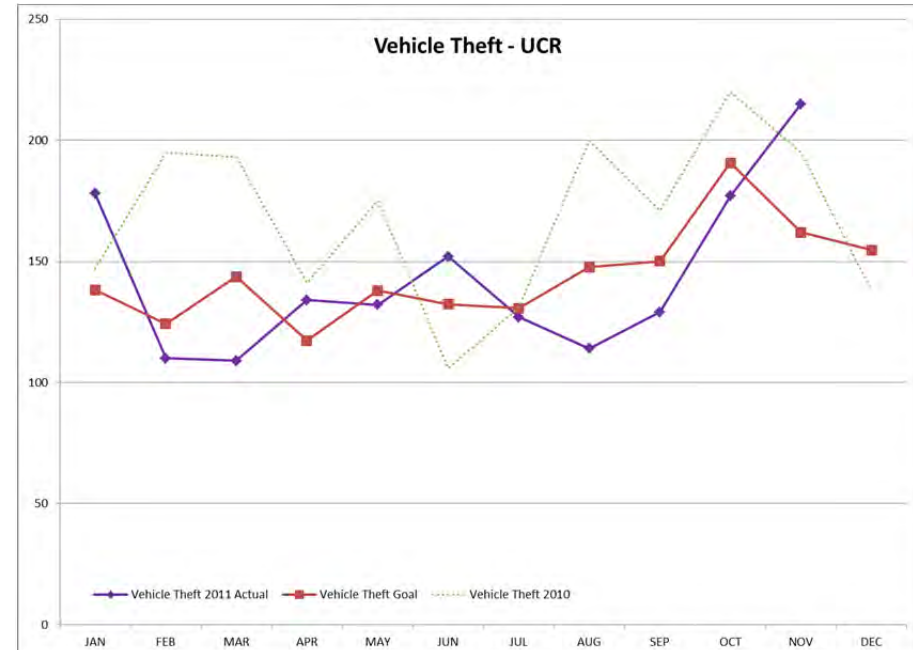
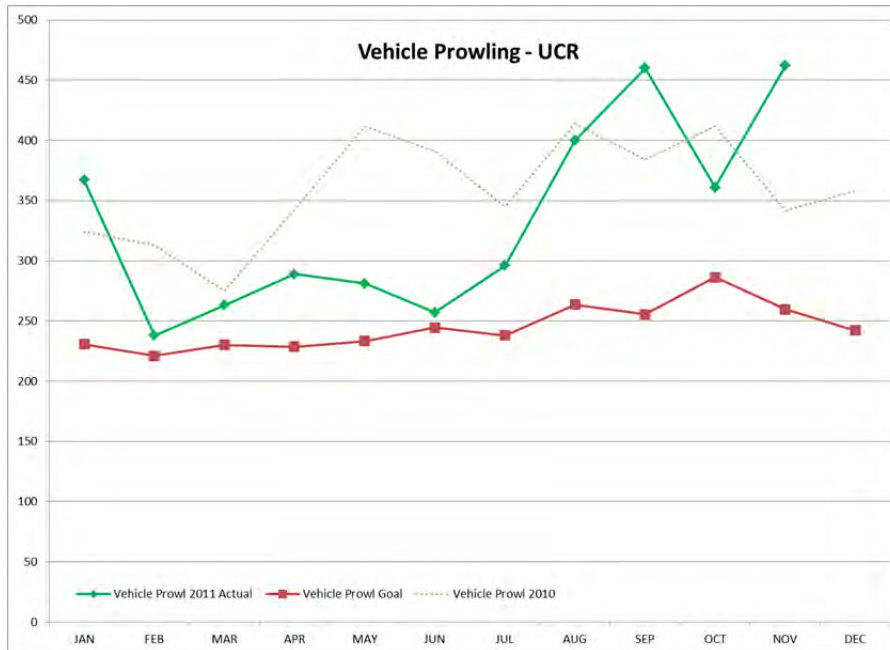
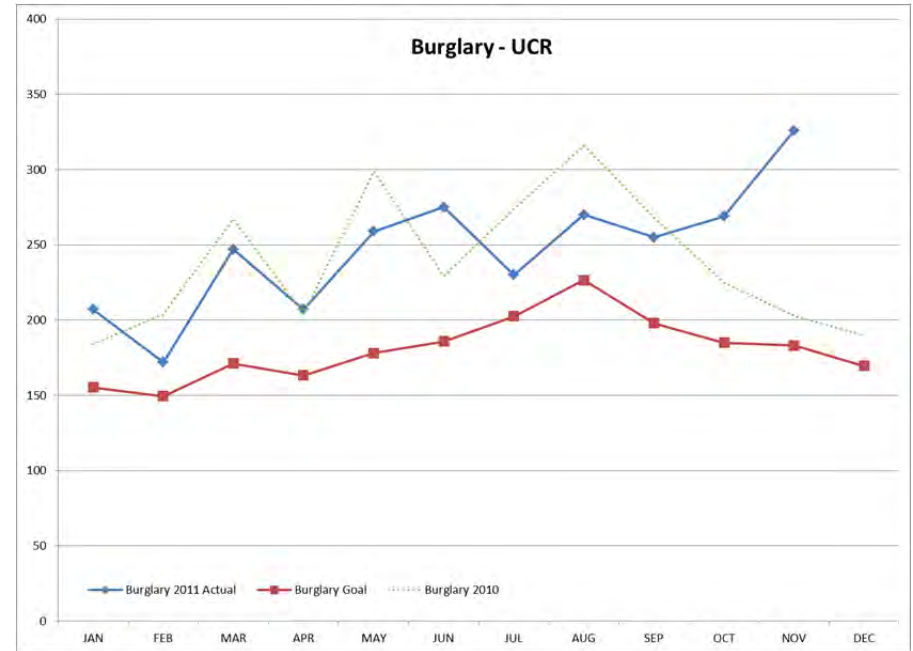

*We continue to meet goals for Vehicle Theft, though we have seen dramatic increases in past two months. Burglary continues to increase, though it typically trends down this time of year. Vehicle Prowling also increased to previous highs.*



UCR (Unified Crime Reporting) data is the standardized reporting data required by the FBI; this is the most accurate measurement, but the data runs approximately one month behind. Current year data is compared to the prior 5 year average.

#### WEEKLY UPDATE

PACT officers were able to locate the wanted suspect who was likely responsible for the vehicle activity in the downtown area. Officers also showed a police presence in the downtown area to address the vehicle prowling activity.

The Emerson/Garfield, West Central, and Nevada/Lidgerwood neighborhoods were hotspots for burglary activity this week, and the increase is mostly in garage burglaries. Two subjects are likely responsible.

PACT, Patrol, and TCU made several key arrests last week, and six other wanted subjects were recommended for Patrol and PACT to focus on arresting this week.

#### Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU)

- A well-known vehicle thief was arrested by PACT on a TCU detective’s probable cause – her bond was also surrendered and she’s still in jail
- Vehicle theft numbers for the week have stayed low: 30
- Patrol and PACT had a number of car theft arrests last week – 10 total

#### Major Crimes Unit (MCU)

- An arrest was made in a recent Safeway robbery
- All leads regarding the rape at SCC have been exhausted



## Meeting Minutes – 11/09/2011

### Special Investigations Unit (SIU)

- Detectives served a search warrant on a crack cocaine dealer in East Central Spokane, and the dealer was booked for PCS – no noteworthy evidence was recovered
- Detectives closed a heroin investigation in West Central Spokane – the SWAT Team handled the entry and secured the residence – the primary suspect was located and arrested, and detectives recovered heroin, cash, and a handgun

### Gang Unit

- Gang Unit detectives are working on two stabbing cases involving gang members or affiliates
- The Gang Unit is still working on their long term federal investigation

### Patrol

- Short stay traffic has picked up at a house where a search warrant was recently served
- Day shift patrol officers had a good arrest using the AutoVu system – the officer received a “hit” on a vehicle and initiated a traffic stop – he took the male and female occupants into custody, and later discovered a large amount of stolen property in the vehicle that was traced to several burglaries in Kootenai Co. – detectives from Kootenai Co. responded for interviews regarding several other burglaries they were working on – detectives advised that the couple were likely part of a burglary ring they were being hit with for months – extensive interviews were conducted with outstanding help once again from a TCU detective
- A subject was arrested after a foot pursuit and officers found he had several shaved keys on his person that he was using to access vehicles in the area
- An address was identified as a good dope house and the information was passed on to SIU

### **NRO ROUND-UP**

#### Officer Ottmar – Southeast/Southwest

- There have been reports of fighting and over-service at the Revolver Bar (227 W. Riverside) - Ofc. Ottmar will be monitoring the calls, and the Special Police Problems Officer was contacted and will start focusing on this business to see if it is a chronic problem
- Ofc. Ottmar was notified of a renter that was growing marijuana, and there was a lot of short stay traffic and people leaving with large duffle bags – SIU assisted and executed a search warrant on the residence – marijuana and crack cocaine was found/seized, and the owner of property was sent a letter notifying them
- A location downtown had a graffiti problem that was partially cleaned up by city crews
- A subject is becoming a chronic nuisance, as he has been going into downtown businesses and ordering food/drinks, and then has no money – Ofc. Ottmar has notified several officers and requested enforcement action when possible

#### Officer Taylor – Northwest

- Ofc. Taylor has been in contact with the owners of a well-known drug house and they have been working on evicting the problem tenant – any other noted activity at the location should be forwarded to Ofc. Taylor
- SIU arrested people out of an address in September, but the activity is picking up again
- The Indian Trail burglaries have slowed down, but there is still theft and vandalism type crime in the neighborhood

#### Officer Thomas – Northeast

- Short stay traffic has been reported by neighbors at four addresses



**NOTEWORTHY PATROL TEAM EFFORTS**

PACT Team Patrol Officer Efforts

- Power shift PACT arrested 11 subjects on new charges and/or outstanding warrants, as well as recovered two stolen vehicles

South Side Patrol Efforts

- A day shift patrol team received daily calls for service on several of the more notable transients, covering everything from aggressive panhandling, to public intoxication, to trespassing, to pedestrian and vehicle interference, to overt sexual behavior and lewd conduct – two subjects were most often addressed, and locations were spread throughout the downtown core, with banks, businesses and passersby equally offended
- Officers monitored another loud protest march involving Occupy Spokane where in excess of 150 people loudly chanted as they marched a route with stops at the downtown banks, City Hall, and Riverpark Square – while boisterous, the organizers kept the crowd from walking in the street or against ‘DONT WALK’ signals, and they finished their loop in about an hour, with only a few choosing to goad the monitoring police
- Day shift patrol continued monitoring identified hotspots for stolen vehicles and vehicle prowling and used their available time between calls to prowl check the indicated areas during the indicated time frames – while no arrests resulted officers did provide a visible presence
- Two other particularly noteworthy drains on calls for service regarding criminal activity and order maintenance issues were the Carlyle Hotel (208 S. Post) and the new Grocery Outlet (1617 W. 3rd Avenue):
  - The Carlyle requested and received police response multiple times per day on people harassing, panhandling, threatening or just loitering
  - The Grocery Outlet was still dealing with their grand opening, and management acknowledged that their customers were 'rougher' than they'd expected – in addition to shoplifters, store personnel were assaulted, insulted and intimidated by the more inebriated and transient members of the community, not including conflicts with petition gatherers collecting signatures for a marijuana legalization initiative
- There were several unusual calls for service regarding illegal sexual behavior requiring police response:
  - Two transients had sexual relations in an alley visible to neighboring businesses, and were contacted and addressed
  - An officer took a report alleging that an employer was requiring oral sex as a condition of continued employment to the employee and the call was forwarded to detectives for follow-up with insufficient evidence for an arrest
  - Officers responded to a location where a subject called to report that he had been raped by a machine for the past seven months and that the "mother board" was wanting to know the dimensions of his genitalia – he was not found at that time, but appeared downtown several hours later claiming that he'd been listening to a "rape machine" for several months and wanted us to contact the President – the claims were determined to be unfounded
- There were also several significant driving related calls that were addressed:
  - South side day shift assisted the north side in the physical arrest of a juvenile after he stole a vehicle belonging to the neighbor of a friend – the juvenile ran from officers when a traffic stop was attempted, and drove into an Avista power pole and two fences before burying what was left of the car into the side of a garage, then ran on foot, bit a citizen, and fought with police
  - Officers assisted in the arrest and investigation of a DUI and Hit & Run of a subject after he consumed 15 Ambien and tried to drive home



## Meeting Minutes – 11/09/2011

- Officers also wrote several high speed infractions including a 55 in a 30, and another 60 in a 30 – an officer arrested a female for Possession of a Stolen Motor Vehicle, and PCS/Meth following a suspicious vehicle stop
- Officers forced their way into an apartment after a suicidal female barricaded her door and attempted to set several items in her room on fire with exposed electrical cords shoved into wall outlets, filling her room with smoke, and necessitating a SFD response
- Officers responded several times to Grocery Outlet, Trader Joe's, and others regarding the appearance of aggressive petition gatherers regarding an initiative to legalize marijuana since they get paid by the signature – all calls resulted in explaining the rights of the store, and the petition gatherers and were handled with education and mediation
- Officers arrested a subject for 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Burglary, and discovered he had an outstanding warrant for theft
- Hotspots were identified for commercial burglaries and stolen vehicles
- Security of one of the hospitals advised they have been experiencing thefts from patients' rooms
- A head on collision occurred where the suspect was driving northbound in southbound lanes at high rate of speed and struck a Fed-Ex truck – collision investigators were called out
- Officers responded to the suspicious death of a 21 year old female DOA – Major Crimes detectives were called out and assisted with the investigation
- There were numerous calls for service on Halloween and police response was slowed to most of them as a result of two-man cars; however, with enough staffing and utilized properly, two-man cars are more effective than a single patrol unit
- A robbery at knife point occurred at Safeway (1616 W. Northwest Blvd.) – the suspect was seen by several witnesses and a plate was given on the suspect vehicle – day shift PACT unit followed up the next day and made two arrests
- Power shift officers conducted a thorough investigation of a robbery that had occurred where a woman had been robbed at knifepoint – officers developed probable cause to arrest an experienced juvenile criminal who was picked up two days later by downtown NROs
- Graveyard officers report continual domestic violence (DV) incidents at a residence – a power shift officer helped graveyard officers on the latest call where a female had become so enraged with her boyfriend that she set their apartment on fire – officers arrested her for 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Arson (DV), and him for Violation of a DV Protection Order
- Officers responded to a burglary with shots fired after the resident awoke at 1:00am to the sound of someone trying to kick in his front door and greeted two intruders with his .38 handgun – a shot was fired when one suspect attempted to assault the homeowner, but luckily the bad guy was only grazed – both suspects briefly escaped, and officers launched a hunt for them to check on the welfare of the suspect who got shot, and to get their side of the story – both suspects were found within one hour, and one was arrested for DUI – it turned out to be a dispute over a woman and maybe some weed
- Officers responded to a burglary in progress call at a business – [click here](#) for full press release
- A patrol corporal assisted with the investigation of a serious collision when the driver of a stolen car ran a red light at high speed – officers helped with tracking the suspect who fled on foot, and arrested him a few hours later for multiple felonies
- Officers continued to patrol Cannon Hill and Browne's Addition reference vehicle prowlings and stolen vehicles, and are also keeping an eye on problem motels
- An officer responded to a robbery where the complainant was beat up at a local park and \$20 was taken from his pocket by four males – the suspects left, and officers have continued to patrol the park on a regular basis
- Officers responded to a report of domestic violence where the complainant reported that her boyfriend had been arrested earlier in the day for fighting with a neighbor, but had been released and had kicked on her front door – the suspect arrived in a small black SUV and he was driving around the neighborhood – officers located the SUV, but the driver refused to stop and officers did not pursue the fleeing vehicle – the suspect later caused a collision in the SUV, which as it turns out was stolen two blocks from the County Jail – a K-9 track was unsuccessful at locating the suspect – the suspect continued to contact the

complainant via phone and with the help of the complainant the suspect was later located and arrested for vehicle theft, attempt to elude, and felony hit and run

- Officers responded to a burglary and arrested a subject on an outstanding DOC warrant
- Officers contacted a suspicious person who a confirmed gang member, and was discovered to have three outstanding warrants for his arrest which he was arrested for and booked into jail
- Officers have been working/responding to the Ridpath Hotel (515 W. Sprague) throughout their work week reference trespassing incidents – this has been a continual downtown problem and officers have trespassed a couple of people and issued a couple of citations

### North Side Patrol Efforts

- Two subjects were arrested after an extensive investigation by north side day shift officers – a call was received from a complainant that stated his roommate had stolen some guns from a neighbor – after determining that a burglary had occurred at the neighbor's home, officers began surveillance on the complainant's home waiting for the suspected roommate to come home – the roommate and his girlfriend did return, and were found to be in possession of some of the stolen firearms – search consent was granted and numerous stolen firearms were discovered throughout the home in hidden locations – this was an extensive investigation with extensive interviews conducted with a well written report
- Officers continue to contact and transport a female who has mental issues to the hospital – each contact results in officers physically controlling her
- The very intoxicated transients downtown are becoming more of a problem
- Officers have responded several times to a location to assist MHP, and are noticing that the mental/MHP calls are drastically increasing
- Shoplifting at Rosauers (1800 W. 3<sup>rd</sup>) has increased
- Officers responded a couple of times to calls of people sleeping in a van in an alley, and several junk cars and boats in the backyard of the residence
- Two males, one with a knife, tried to get a 10 year old girl in their vehicle
- Officers responded to the Monroe Street Bridge where a friend of a suicidal subject was recognized as a Repeat Offender (ROP) who had an outstanding DOC felony warrant for escape – he was taken to jail and booted, and officers returned and assisted with the suicidal subject
- A subject was arrested after he was found in a vehicle, parked behind several closed businesses – the subject was arrested on three outstanding warrants and Possession of Dangerous Weapons (brass knuckles)
- Casey's Bar is back open and officers getting calls there again – one night officers were getting noise complaints, and the next night they responded to a female who had been standing in the alley for about an hour and found that she was extremely intoxicated and confused
- There were some reports of mail thefts in the area west of Indian Trail and Francis
- A ROP was accused of a 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Burglary and the complainant stated he kicked in the door and assaulted an occupant – no probable cause established, and the ROP is currently wanted for felony PCS
- A male was contacted and arrested for violating a DV order as well as Assault/DV, and at the time of his arrest, he was in possession of heroin and hydrocodone pills – the male is extensive with drug and theft contacts and was also found to have arrest warrants upon contact
- Officers developed probable cause to charge a suspect with three counts of 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Trafficking in Stolen Property, and 2nd Degree Theft after he took possession of several vehicles under the guise of repairing them – TCU is investigating
- A female was contacted on a local bridge a suicidal subject – the Hostage Negotiations Team (HNT) was called out and officers negotiated with her for a couple of hours – negotiations were deteriorating rapidly so a tactical plan utilizing less lethal beanbag munitions and flash diversionary devices was implemented, and she was safely taken into custody
- Two males were contacted after a hit & run roll over collision in a wooded area – one was arrested for DUI, Hit & Run, Obstructing, and Reckless Driving; while the second was arrested for Obstructing and PCS/Cocaine

#### WEEKLY UPDATE

There was an increase in vehicle theft this week. Two areas were notable hotspots; Hillyard and Emerson/Garfield. Crime Analysis is also seeing some thefts occurring from warming up vehicles in the morning. There have also been countless arrests, and many suspects appear to be new players.

Crime Analysis has also noticed some incidents of pop machines being pried into that may become an issue in the future.

#### Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU)

- The suspect involved with breaking into vacant house and stealing copper wire has been charged with four burglaries and more charges are pending
- A detective is working a series of burglaries

#### Major Crimes Unit (MCU)

- Two MCU detectives were at trial last week; one was for four charges of robbery and the defendant was found guilty – the second was for one charge of rape and the defendant was found guilty
- A suspect who was charged with two counts of 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Robbery and was the suspect from SWAT standoff, plead guilty to robbery

#### Special Investigations Unit (SIU)

- A guilty verdict was returned on a stranger to stranger rape investigation from 1/1/2010

- Detectives are working several new cases; two new abuse cases, a computer porn case, a statutory rape, and a case of a neighbor abusing a young child

### Gang Unit

- The gang unit is still involved with their long term federal investigation
- A detective has developed probable cause to arrest an individual for 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Assault – the suspect stabbed a male because they got into an argument over two gangs

### Patrol

- PACT arrested a female who was in possession of a stolen car and is possibly involved with several burglaries
- A patrol team has noted that there have been a few churches that have been burglarized on the south side
- Both Swing and Power Shift Commanders noted their teams made numerous arrests this week – see Noteworthy Patrol Team Efforts below

### **NRO ROUND-UP**

#### Officer Redmon and Officer Downing – Downtown

- SPD has responded to 15 plus calls concerning a female with mental health issues in the past few months – the female is very uncooperative and will resist – calls with her this week concerned her talking in gibberish, carrying a brick and suitcase; in the case were flowers, rocks and feathers – upon contact she was also armed small sharp rocks. In the past she has laid down in the middle of the roadway attempting to get run over and walks out in front of moving vehicles.
- Another subject with mental issues has been trespassed all over downtown and recently has been caught and arrested in Davenport properties
- A frequent downtown chronic offender for disorderly conduct, lewd conduct, trespassing, and theft now has five plus theft arrests in the downtown area and any further would qualify him for retail theft with extenuating circumstances
- A downtown apartment complex is a frequent problem for police; a well-known vehicle prowler lives here, and several other criminals hang out in the apartments – the new apartment manager is pro-police and attempting to clean up the complex

#### Officer Douglas – West Central

- Heroin and stolen property have been reported coming in and out of a residence
- Suspected drug activity has been reported at a triplex and several neighbors are complaining they are frequenting the upstairs unit
- Drugs, stolen property, and stolen cars are problems at a house that has been a project for the past year – any calls for service that are valid should either end with an arrest for nuisance, or let Ofc. Douglas know so she can go back and attempt to find them for the arrest. There are 13 people reported to be living in this house. Neighbors are having another meeting towards Safe Streets and abatement
- The owner of a reported flop house has not done anything with the chronic nuisance notice – Ofc. Douglas cannot arrest the owner for Nuisance since he has not evicted the problem –any arrests for Nuisance on calls for service would be appreciated, or let Ofc. Douglas know so she can go back and arrest the tenant.
- A chronic nuisance was served on a property owner who is anti-police – neighbors may be working towards abatement.



**NOTEWORTHY PATROL TEAM EFFORTS**

PACT Team Patrol Officer Efforts

- Power shift PACT arrested 10 subjects on felony or misdemeanor warrants and/or charges

South Side Patrol Efforts

- Arrested a subject for possession of controlled substance and a DOC warrant
- Arrested a subject for Possession of a Stolen Vehicle, felony Violation of Order of Protection, and 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Burglary
- High calls for service were reported in three areas according to officers
- Numerous calls this week to check on the welfare of subjects in a Mental Health Crises – no particular area of town, but spread all over – AMR transported subjects to Sacred Heart and Deaconess, and Sacred Heart was on critical status part of the week
- A subject was arrested for the burglary of a residence after he entered the house, took a shower, and made him something to eat – he was wearing a pair of pants from the resident that lived there
- A subject was arrested out of a stolen car and there was probable cause to also arrest him for stabbing his mother and stealing money from her
- Two vacant addresses have squatters frequenting them, and there is lots of gang graffiti inside one
- Officers responded to a drive-by shooting and the victim said that this was in relation to another case where he was also a victim
- Officers responded to a malicious harassment call where there were racial slurs/graffiti written on the door – there are currently no suspects named or mentioned
- Officers followed a blood trail to locate stabbing suspects – the victim had large lacerations across the back of the neck – MCU detectives responded to assist with the investigation
- Officers caught up with a suspect after he ran from a traffic stop armed with a 9mm handgun – he jumped in the Spokane River and was eventually pulled out by fire personnel, and officers spotted the handgun he dumped in about two feet of water
- Officers contacted the owners of the new Grocery Outlet at 3rd and Maple as they are having problems with intoxicated transients loitering in the lot causing disturbances
- Reports of possible child luring were investigated – there were two complaints with very similar suspect descriptions – the case was passed on to SVU to investigate
- Officers responded to a suicidal female that was very agitated and was hanging over the railing of a bridge at times – a distraction was used and she was taken into custody without being injured
- A subject was contacted and arrested for an outstanding warrant out of another jurisdiction
- Power shift patrol officers have been conducting prowl checks of a construction site that has been having burglary issues
- The Occupy Spokane protestors were contacted at Monroe/Riverside and there were no violations to report
- Officers responded to a theft call where the victim explained that his phone was stolen by a male at the listed location and the suspect fled in a truck – the victim provided the license plate number of the truck and it returned stolen out of Coeur d'Alene the officers located the truck but the truck failed to yield to them – they did not pursue the vehicle according to the current pursuit policy – based on the information they gathered on the suspect, the County was able to locate and stop the suspect later in the evening, and arrest him for Possession of a Stolen Vehicle, City Theft, and Fail to Stop

North Side Patrol Efforts

- A day shift patrol officer was called to investigate a complaint that an elderly couple's grandson was stealing from them – the officer was able to determine, with confessions, that the grandson has stolen thousands from the couple's accounts and had pawned an extensive list of property – the officer spent an

entire day on the case and recovered an extensive amount of property – the suspect was booked for 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Theft, Theft of a Firearm, and 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Trafficking in Stolen Property

- North and south side officers were able to locate and arrest a suspect who violated a no contact order and assaulted his ex-girlfriend, and then took her vehicle without permission – the victim advised that the suspect might be heading to Holy Family to see his ill mother, and officers located the suspect vehicle in the Holy Family area and initiated a traffic stop – the suspect was charged with Possession of a Stolen Vehicle, felony Violation of Order of Protection, and 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Burglary
- Officers arrested two subjects at a location; one for an outstanding DOC warrant, and the second for several domestic violence related warrants
- A power shift patrol team has noticed an increase of stolen vehicle recoveries and prowlings in an area over the last couple of weeks – it is unknown who the suspect(s) are at this time
- A power shift patrol team arrested eight individuals on outstanding felony warrants, and four individuals on outstanding misdemeanor warrants
- Officers attempted to stop a stolen vehicle, but the suspects took off and officers did not pursue – the suspect continued to drive recklessly with no officers chasing nor in sight of the vehicle – about 20 minutes later a call was received that the vehicle had crashed – it was clear the suspects obviously didn't care whether they were being chased or not and continued to drive recklessly for a lengthy time with no officers in sight – no suspects arrested at this time
- Officers stopped a subject in a stolen vehicle and there was a reported stolen mountain bike in the back of the vehicle – the subject wouldn't provide any information as to how he acquired either vehicle – he was arrested for Possession of a Stolen Vehicle, and 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Possession of Stolen Property – he also had ID from two other subjects in his possession that officers were unable to locate
- Officers responded to the call of a shoplifter that had fled from Kohl's at Northtown – officers contacted several non-compliant subjects and arrested two – one was arrested on warrants, and the suspect was arrested for shoplifting
- An extensive criminal was arrested for Eluding and PCS/Meth after a pursuit – the suspect admitted to a Meth addiction and delivery of Meth for his habit
- Officers had a suspect attempt to elude them in his vehicle, and later fled on foot – he was located about an hour later with the help of a K-9 – the suspect has been on the run for about two months, and had two outstanding felony warrants for his arrest
- Officers responded to an armed robbery at the Erotique Boutique – [click here](#)
- A subject was contacted as a suspicious person/possible vehicle theft suspect – the subject lied about his name, but was identified through a tattoo search and was found to have a DOC warrant
- Three suspects were involved of an armed robbery – there is a drug history between the three suspects and the occupant of the residence – they took the victims debit card and EBT card in the course of the robbery – two of the three have been arrested for the robbery, and there is probable cause to charge the third for the same

#### WEEKLY UPDATE

Crime Analysis advised that there are still a couple of burglary hotspots; commercial burglaries in the downtown area and garage burglaries in the northwest. Vehicle theft numbers are still high as well with three hotspots identified and passed on to patrol.

Crime Analysis advised that they have gotten a lot of good follow up information from PACT and Patrol on the recommended targets that were put out in their weekly presentation.

#### Targeted Crimes Unit (TCU)

- TCU has executed warrants on two cars locally and recovered property from burglaries that occurred in Kootenai County – investigation is ongoing
- A Repeat Offender (ROP) that was arrested a couple of months ago on an outstanding warrant remained in jail and his DOSA has now been revoked – he was sent back to prison for several years
- Two ROPs were arrested on new charges – TCU is doing follow up on one Possession of a Stolen Vehicle/Eluding case
- TCU booked a ROP on a new Identity Theft and Forgery case today – the ROP was already in jail on a DOC violation

#### Major Crimes Unit (MCU)

- MCU detectives are working on several new cases: an auto/pedestrian fatality, two shootings, and a robbery that occurred over the weekend – [click here](#) for the full press release on one shooting that occurred at the Quality Inn; MCU detectives are being assisted by the Gang Unit with this investigation

### Gang Unit

- The Gang Unit is continuing their work on a long term federal investigation

### Patrol

- Two NROs joined Day Shift PACT to work on a vehicle prowling issue and arrested a male on several counts
- Officers were able to locate and arrest a vehicle prowler in the Garry Park area after witnesses identified the suspect as the male who had broken into multiple vehicles – officers were able to tie the suspect to the other crimes including Malicious Mischief

### **NRO ROUND-UP**

#### Officer McIntyre – Nevada/Lidgerwood

- Five possible drug houses were reported to the C.O.P.S. Shop in a three week period
- Ongoing problems between two neighbors are escalating and they are refusing to mediate
- Noise, nuisance, domestic violence, and patrol calls have been explained to the new management at the Rosewood Club (401 E. Magnesium)

#### Officer Thomas – Northeast

- Drug activity is suspected at five different locations

#### Officer Strassenberg – East Central/Garry Park

- Drug activity is still occurring at two problem locations
- DOT advised that most if not all of the vacant homes will be torn down in the next two to three months – the homes have created a large amount of calls due to theft and transient issues

#### Officer Taylor – Northwest

- Drug activity has been reported at a grocery store in northwest Spokane

#### Officer Redmon and Officer Downing – Downtown

- Transients sleeping and damaging a loading dock downtown and the business would like prowl checks at night and in the early morning
- A frequent downtown street kid, who is a victim in a recent case, appears to be downtown with large groups of his friends who have been armed with pipes and baseball bats looking for possible retaliation
- Neighboring businesses of The Vault, a new bar that just opened at 120 N. Wall, are complaining about vehicles parked illegally on Wall at night blocking the street
- Three Crosswalk kids have been identified as causing issues downtown recently
- Two subjects were arrested for 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Assault – one is a frequent problem downtown and at STA
- An elderly prescription drug dealer was recently arrested for selling his pills at the STA Plaza and has been suspected of this activity for a few years – the subject used to frequent the Plaza daily, usually hanging out with known prostitutes, but has now been trespassed
- Wall St. and Spokane Falls Blvd. issues have decreased due to the colder weather
- Occupy Wall St. protester numbers have begun to decline as well, and is likely due to the new location up north and the colder weather



**NOTEWORTHY PATROL TEAM EFFORTS**

PACT Team Patrol Officer Efforts

- Between day and power shift PACT, officers arrested 29 subjects on outstanding warrants, five subjects on new charges, and recovered six stolen vehicles

South Side Patrol Efforts

- A day shift patrol officer stopped an occupied stolen vehicle and arrested the driver – along with being charged for the stolen vehicle, the driver also was charged with eight counts of 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Possession of Stolen Property – inside the vehicle he was driving were six stolen credit cards and a stolen check book that were stolen in a burglary
- The same patrol officer advised he has recovered three other separate stolen vehicles in an area downtown since the start of November
- A swing shift patrol team arrested two subjects on outstanding warrants
- Several burglaries and vehicle prowlings have occurred in a specific area – suspect vehicle information was provided and passed on to day shift PACT
- There are several transients that sleep under the railroad bridge and there have been problems with thefts, burglaries, and missing gas from vehicles
- A residence has been identified as a flop house and the subject that lives there is allowing juvenile runaways to stay there and is enabling all of the kids that show up
- A residence is becoming an issue with multiple domestic violence calls
- A power shift patrol team noted that there is a continuing escalation of stolen vehicles – one officer spotted a stolen car and the suspect ran, but was apprehended with help from a Patrol Sergeant – the officer also recovered another stolen vehicle at a different location
- Power and graveyard shift officers dealt with a mental health patient who had shot two neighbors with a BB gun, which is something that has occurred in the past – the subject refused to come out of his apartment and remained a threat – Mental Health Professionals had been trying for two days to serve a commitment order on the subject – a search warrant was obtained and executed, and officers arrested the subject without incident, as well as seized three BB guns
- An officer busted a marijuana grow on Thanksgiving following a domestic dispute between the roommates who were growing pot – the subjects were identified and plants were seized – arrests pending further investigation by detectives
- Power and graveyard shift officers had a standoff with a male who was high on meth and trying to bait officers into shooting him – officers used impact munitions and a K-9 to take him into custody on outstanding warrants
- Prostitution activity is still down in the East Sprague corridor and is likely the result of the weather – officers will continue to monitor the situation for changes
- Throughout the week officers have conducted prowl checks in the area of Manito Blvd. as there have been a series of reported occupied burglaries in the area
- Officers responded to a location three different times due to the resident allowing various folks to flop at the address who then fight with each other – on the second and third response, officers located two fugitives and a female who is a registered sex offender
- Officers have still noticed a continually growing pile of garbage left unattended at Monroe and Riverside on a triangle island – the garbage is left unattended in the early morning hours, especially when cold
- Officers responded to a residence looking for a drug endangered child who was left at the location by the heroin addicted mom who was taken to jail – two subjects live at the location, and one provided information about the child's whereabouts – the child was located two blocks away, and appeared to have been moved between three houses that day by various drug users and/or prostitutes



## Meeting Minutes – 11/30/2011

- Officers responded to a number of locations on a vehicle recovery call where the registered owner had located their stolen vehicle – officers contacted a male who was later arrested and booked into jail for Forgery, 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Theft, Theft of a Motor Vehicle, Assault/DV, and an outstanding DOC warrant
- Officers responded to a threat call where they contacted a male who has been a constant problem in the downtown area – officers have responded to a number of calls involving the male – the male was located and arrested for 3<sup>rd</sup> Degree Assault, Disorderly Conduct, and 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Trespass
- Officers responded to a residence on a domestic violence call – the male suspect was eventually arrested for two counts of City Assault/DV and PCS/Crack – the crack weighed in at 14.69 grams

### North Side Patrol Efforts

- The Spokane Fire Department responded to an attic fire and later discovered a marijuana grow operation in the basement and called SPD – responding officers wrote a search warrant for the location and found 25 plants in the grow – paperwork was submitted for his arrest
- A male had burglarized a residence, was interrupted by the homeowner, and fled on foot – day shift officers located the male suspect at a chronic nuisance house, where he was arrested for outstanding warrants, 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Burglary, Unlawful Possession of a Firearm, and Theft of a Firearm – officers also wrote a search warrant for the location and recovered the victim's property
- Day shift officers monitored the Emerson/Garfield area due to a recent spike in burglaries and made three arrests, as well as identified two other suspects
- Two suspects stole a chainsaw from a residence – they were located and arrested by day shift officers
- Officers responded to a location where the property owner has been trying to illegally evict squatters who moved in with permission while he was serving a jail sentence – 10 individuals were observed living in the residence, and there are allegations of domestic violence, assault, and drug activity occurring on the premises
- Several man hours were spent assisting with follow up investigations, sitting with prisoners, and security at crime scenes on the multiple shootings that occurred on graveyard over the weekend
- A suspect broke into a residence and stole marijuana from the resident who has a medical marijuana card – after a short foot pursuit, and an even shorter swim, officers were able to fish the suspect out of the river
- Foot traffic and short stay vehicles have been reported at a large garage on a property
- Drug activity has been noted at two addresses where there is possibly stolen property
- Officers responded to a possible burglary in progress – upon officers' arrival, a male was located in the house who stated he was renting the home and had keys – due to prior criminal history at the location, it could become a problem location in the future
- A gas station was robbed at knifepoint, and a K-9 track was completed, but the suspects were not located
- A power shift patrol team arrested seven subjects on outstanding felony warrants
- Officers took a stolen vehicle report and a few hours later spotted the vehicle driving recklessly – the driver and sole occupant fled on foot and was apprehended a short distance away – he was arrested for Possession of Stolen Vehicle and PCS/Meth
- Officers stopped a stolen vehicle and arrested a male for Possession of Stolen Vehicle and PCS/Meth – the male had numerous car keys on his person and a small hammer with glass fragments on it
- Officers responded to a stabbing where the suspect had fled the scene in a vehicle – officers quickly obtained the suspect vehicle description and broadcast that to other officers who spotted the vehicle and arrested the suspect without incident – there was a domestic violence relationship between the suspect and victim, and the suspect was arrested for 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Assault/DV
- Officers responded to an address on a reported domestic violence with a weapon call – one of the family children called to report that the parents were arguing and her stepdad now had a gun held to his head – the male blocked a vehicle's exit from the garage to prevent the victims from leaving – he shut the garage door onto the car damaging both the door and the car – he was arrested for three counts of Unlawful Imprisonment/DV



## Meeting Minutes – 11/30/2011

- Officers responded to a domestic violence call and developed probable cause to arrest a male – search of the male incident to arrest revealed a variety of Schedule II narcotics and meth – the male was booked on all charges
- Officers responded to a possible domestic violence order violation and once it was determined a violation was occurring, a male was arrested and discovered to be carrying a loaded handgun in his rear pants line
- A graveyard patrol officer conducted a suspicious person stop and a pat down revealed an Altoids container in his pocket – the male was asked to remove it, which he did, and officers discovered marijuana and two meth bindles with meth inside – the male was arrested and transported to jail – at jail an inventory of his backpack revealed a loaded pistol, and he was booked on that charge as well
- Officers conducted a traffic stop and the driver was arrested for driving with a suspended license – at jail, an inventory of her purse revealed a baggie of meth and a loaded handgun – she was booked for those offenses as well

## **NOVEMBER DEBRIEF OF INCIDENTS**

### **K-9 DEPLOYMENTS**

**Incident #1** – A K-9 handler responded to assist officers in locating two of three commercial burglary suspects that had fled on foot when police arrived. Patrol officers had already captured one of the three suspects. Prior to deployment of the K-9, a perimeter was in place and verbal announcements had been made. The K-9 tracked, located, and apprehended the suspect by contact on his leg as he was hiding in a small alcove of a building. The suspect was taken into custody by backup officers without further incident. The third suspect was not located.

**Incident #2** – A K-9 handler responded to assist Spokane County deputies with a DOC Escape suspect that had fled on foot and hidden in the crawlspace under a house. Prior to deploying the K-9, the suspect indicated that he was going to give up and come out from his hiding space. As the suspect exited he failed to comply with the commands and directions of the deputies and resisted arrest. The K-9 handler saw that the deputies were unable to control the suspect and warned the suspect several times to stop fighting or the K-9 would bite him. The suspect continued to resist and the deputies were unable to control him so the K-9 was applied to the suspect's leg. The K-9's control of the suspect's leg and added distraction of the applied dog assisted the deputies in their ability to get control of the suspect. The K-9 immediately released upon command and the suspect was taken into custody.

**Incident #3** – A K-9 handler responded to assist officers with a DOC Escape suspect that had been contained after fleeing into his residence. Prior to deploying the K-9, officers attempted to take the suspect into custody after deploying a specialty impact munition. The suspect failed to comply with officers' commands and directions and resisted arrest by actively fighting with them. The K-9 handler saw that the other officers were unable to control the suspect and warned the suspect several times to stop fighting or the K-9 would bite him. The suspect continued to actively resist and the officers were still unable to control him so the K-9 was applied to the suspect's leg. The contact was brief and failed to stop the suspect from fighting with the officers so the K-9 handler transitioned the K-9's hold to the suspect's foot. The K-9's control of the suspect's leg and added distraction of the applied dog assisted officers in their ability to get control of the suspect. The K-9 immediately released upon command and the suspect was taken into custody. (See Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint Incident #1 below for additional information on this incident).

### **NO TASER APPLICATIONS IN NOVEMBER**

### **LATERAL VASCULAR NECK RESTRAINTS**

**Incident #1** – Officers responded to a residence to arrest a DOC Escape suspect that had been contained after fleeing into his residence. The male exited his residence and was immediately confrontational, yelling, "Come on you little [expletive]; I'll kick all of your [expletive]" at the officers. While yelling, the suspect would flex his arms in front of his body like a body builder causing the veins in his neck and forehead to protrude. Two different times, the suspect reached into his waistband and then quickly pulled his hand out and pointed it at officers as if to appear he were accessing a weapon. An officer accessed a 40mm less lethal launcher and loaded it with an impact munition. The decision to deploy the less lethal munition was made based on the suspect intentionally attempting to provoke a deadly force encounter by acting as if he were armed, his assaultive behavior in challenging officers to fight, and because the confrontation was too volatile to expect a satisfactory outcome through further negotiations. The officer deployed the munition striking the suspect on the left leg, which stunned him and caused him to be distracted as officers approached. The suspect still did not give up and another officer placed him into a Level 1 Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint from the front causing the suspect to fall to the ground. He was taken into custody and handcuffed. During the struggle, the suspect also incurred a K-9 contact. (See K-9 Deployment Incident #3 above)

**Incident #2** – Officers responded to a warrant call and upon contact, the wanted subject started running. A responding officer grabbed him by the arm and took him to the ground. The suspect continued to struggle and refused to follow commands to put his hands out to his sides. The officer then applied a Level 1 Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint and used his body weight to control the suspect. He was then handcuffed. A Patrol Sergeant contacted the suspect at jail who stated he knew that the officer was doing his job and that the situation started because he had "overreacted."

## ***Use of Force Definitions***

### ***K-9 Deployments***

*In many instances, it is much safer for officers to search for suspects utilizing a K-9. Fleeing suspects demonstrate that they are willing to actively avoid capture and often have a plethora of hiding places in which to secrete themselves. The suspects have not been searched and it is unknown whether they possess weapons which could be used to ambush officers. The K-9s are able to locate suspects with much less risk to responding officers. The dog's sense of smell is also much more reliable than the officers' visual ability to conduct searches. The dogs prevent potential deadly force situations thereby making it safer for both officer and suspect.*

### ***Taser Applications and Lateral Vascular Neck Restraints***

*Taser applications and lateral vascular neck restraints are valuable tactics for officers to use when confronted with a resistive subject. Both tactics can prevent long, drawn out physical altercations which help to avoid excited delirium possibilities. When properly applied, the neck restraint and the Taser can end a fight quickly and make the apprehension much swifter: the longer the fight, the more potential for injuries to both officer and suspect as well as the possibility of excited delirium. Both tactics are likely to cause little to no injury and the recovery is quick when done.*

*The Taser can be applied in two ways; the drive stun, which is applied directly to the skin, or firing the probes, which will connect with a subject at a distance. There are two levels of neck restraints; Level 1 allows the officer to control the suspect and Level 2 allows the officer to render the subject momentarily unconscious giving officers several seconds to take the suspect into custody without further incident. Officers must take many things into consideration when determining whether to use a drive stun vs. firing the Taser or a Level 1 vs. Level 2 neck restraint. Severity of the crime, the threat the suspect poses and whether or not the suspect is actively resisting (assaultive or active resistance) – these questions are based on if a reasonable officer would feel the force used was appropriate.*
